The 80th anniversary of Victory over Japan (VJ Day), marking the end of the Second World War, is taking place on Friday 15 August.

Following Victory in Europe (VE Day) in May 1945, British and Commonwealth troops continued the fight against Japanese forces in Asia and the Pacific.

The dropping of two atomic bombs on Japanese cities - one in Hiroshima on 6 August and the other three days later on Nagasaki - resulted in enormous devastation, bringing the six year global conflict to a rapid end and introduced the ever-present threat of nuclear war.

The human cost of the Second World War was overwhelming, leading to death and destruction for millions of people on both sides.

80 years on, we will come together as a nation to pay tribute to the British and Commonwealth veterans, the Second World War generation and those who paid the ultimate sacrifice to secure freedom and peace.

National two-minute silence to mark VJ Day 80


Members of the public are encouraged to participate in a national two-minute silence at noon on Friday 15 August to mark the 80th anniversary of the end of the Second World War.

A Service of Remembrance will honour and remember those who fought and died during the Second World War in the Far East at the **National Memorial Arboretum** in Staffordshire, which will be broadcast live on BBC1 from midday.

Government buildings and High Commissions across the globe will also be lit up on 15 August to commemorate VJ Day.


Commonwealth War Graves Commission Every Story, For Evermore Tour




Great Faith: Stories of Sacrifice and Contribution


