





This record is a master roll of servicemen. Walter's entry gives his age as 31 which he turned in June 1939.

- Walter Ernest Young was born in 1908 in Blackwood, Monmouthshire to Walter Ernest and Mary Ann Young. He was the third eldest of 12 children. He trained as a hairdresser and cycled to Oxford in search of work. There he met and married his wife, Doris.
- In 1939 Walter signed up for National Service and joined the 35 Light Anti-Aircraft Regiment RA¹ becoming Lance Sergeant 1483240.
- Walter's last letter to Doris is dated 28 November 1941. He wrote it was the first Christmas they had spent apart in their married life (then 9 years). The port stop mentioned could be Durban, South Africa, given the references to a captain's daughter Captain Sir Thomas Sheppard was a WWII admiral².
- Did the letter reach Doris in 1942? On 15 February Walter was taken prisoner of war in Singapore. In October, 600 British prisoners of war there were loaded on to a ship said bound for a prison camp in Japan. The POWs headed instead south of the equator to Rabaul, New Britain in Papua New Guinea. In November the 517 fittest men were shipped to Ballalae Island to build a secret runway.
- Many prisoners died from overwork and disease or were killed by allied air raids. A raid on 12 March 1943 may have killed 300 when their encampment was bombed. In June 1945 another heavy US raid convinced the Japanese the island was about to be invaded so they executed all surviving prisoners. 5 March 1943 is Walter's official death. His sons, Morris, Trevor and Kenneth were 6, 8 and 10 years old.
- After the war ended a mass grave was discovered by Australia and the remains of over 400 men were removed and buried at the Bomana Commonwealth War Cemetery in Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea³. Walter is commemorated at the Singapore Memorial and at The National Arboretum.
- Doris never remarried. As records were official secrets for 50 years, she died knowing little of Walter's fate. Her sons found the letter in her home years after her death. The last picture of them together also remained on her bedroom wall until 2020.

By the time you receive this letter, Christmas for you will be well and truly over and I hope you had an enjoyable one, although for the first time since we have been married, we had to spend it apart.

I am more than sorry that this had to be but under the circumstances of course could not be helped. Let us hope we will be able to spend next Xmas together and perhaps make up for lost time.

I feel sure that Morris, Trevor and Kenneth would have a good time because being young world affairs would not worry them in the least and I know when I was home last you were well prepared for Xmas.

By the way dear, let...

... (me) know if mother came to stay for Xmas or any of the family.

Well dear now to write a little about myself.

I believe I have lost a bit of weight, but I am likely to lose a bit more yet but seeing that I can afford to lose some I don't think it matters much as long as I feel fit as I do at the present.

We made another call to a port and this time we got three days shore leave and I don't think I enjoyed myself better and some day I hope to visit that place again.

I made some very good friends while we were there. One in particular has promised to write to you and I believe....

... she will. I say she because her name is Miss Sheppard, she is a nice young person and has a very nice house.

I know this because I went there to dinner for two of my evenings and of course met her parents who are very nice people, her father is a retired naval captain. Miss Sheppard herself is an architect and incidentally has a very nice car which came in way useful as I was able to see the sights of the town and the country in real comfort.

The people of that town gave us a really good welcome a most hospitable type of people,

We left that port two days before Xmas which was real bad luck for us, as I am sure we...

... would have had a real good time there. As it was, we spent Xmas on board ship this did not turn out too badly under the circumstances, still it left a lot to be desired.

We are still on the high sea and so I have not received any mail from you, and I do not expect any until a month after we reach our next station(?) but, do write regular as they will, at some time, I expect catch up with me.

Well dear remember me to Morris, Trevor and Ken and give them my love also remember me to the rest of the family.

I must close now dear so cheerio until next time.




Prisoner of war card



This Japanese Prisoner of war card confirms Walter's place of capture as Singapore and prison camp. Note he gave his mother-in-law's address as the 'destination of report' so she would be able to support Doris with sad news.


Changi Prison, Singapore Camp Roll 1941



Walter's is the last entry on the Changi Prison nominal roll in 1941.


The transcription document details the record as 'Soloman Island unaccounted for prisoners of war who embarked at Singapore.' Note several entries for the 35 LAA. Walter was held here for 245 days until 18 October 1942 when he was one of 572 men taken to New Britain, destined for the Soloman Islands.

On the roll list for New Britain



An extract from the nominal roll of the 572 prisoners of war.

The transcription refers to the 'Far East 600 party overseas from Changi on 18 October 1942' and that Walter was on the Kenkon Maru ship (pictured) which was scuttled by the US and sunk on 21 January 1943, near Bougainville, as here. 500 of the fittest were sent on the ship in November 1942, destined for the Soloman Islands.

Of interest is reference to the war diary of <u>Thanbaya Hospital</u>, Burma.




Alfred (Alf) Baker recorded this 4-hour interview which are published online in perpetuity by the Imperial War Museum.

Recorded as several sound files of his time as a prisoner of war, Alf was also captured in Singapore and taken to Changi Prison, and shared the journey with Walter, up to the journey to Rabaul. He also recorded his memories in his book "What price Bushido."




On the Far East nominal roll

This is another nominal roll of men captured as prisoners of war. OVL means 'overland' and dated 18 October 1942 confirming his embarkation at Singapore as one of 500 prisoners of war sent to the Solomon Islands.



Unaccounted for Prisoner of War



This is a handwritten record of unaccounted for prisoners of war who embarked at Singapore on 18 October 1942 signed by Sergeant Major C Bryant. The men are in two lists: six including Walter are listed as prisoners of war and seven are listed under the heading N/T for 'No trace.'






Unaccounted for Prisoner of War

This is a nominal roll of 18 prisoners of war unaccounted for.


There are two versions. The small version below has Walter's rank hand-corrected. The larger version left is later and has been further annotated with 'no doc' crossed out and by the side 'still POW OS' (overseas).

Information regarding the building of the air strip at Ballalae Island was kept top secret by the Japanese.





Unaccounted for in 1943



This is a typed nominal roll of men who were unaccounted for in 1943. The entry for Walter reads that he is still a prisoner of war overseas. This looks to be the typed version using the list above, with Servicemen Yarrow and York listed above Walter.

Walter's family mourn


This picture was taken after the family had been informed that Walter was missing presumed dead. The picture is taken in the garden of 33 High St Blackwood, Bedwellty, Wales, home of Mary Ann, Walter's mother (centre). Walter's father had died in 1935.

Trevor remembers the moment Doris received the news at home in Spencer Cresent. Her mother Lily came to their house (she was told first given Walter had given her address) with two uniformed army officials. Morris ran up the garden and could not speak. Trevor tried to comfort his mum.

Morris, aged 10, Ken 7, Doris 32 and Trevor 8 years, had visited to mourn the news with Mary Ann around 1943? There would also have been a memorial service.



Prisoners of War posted as missing



Note the document reference includes 'SS' for secret service? All of the information in these records were withheld from the public until the 1980s? Neither Doris nor the family would have known none of this detail about what had happened to Walter.

Death Index Card



This is the Japanese index card of allied Prisoners of War. It confirms the place of death as NEI - Netherlands East Indies. Walter died around 43 days after the ship he was on was sunk off the coast of Bougainville.






War Widow's pension

Doris Young, war widow

Walter was officially pronounced dead as of the date 5 March 1943. Walter and Doris had been married 11 years and Doris was 33 years old with 3 sons to bring up.

In 1946, Doris was granted a widow's pension payable from the following September. It consisted of a pension of £1 and 16 shillings and another £1 and 13 shillings for the children per week. This would be £125 in total in today's money.

Note it stated that if Doris were ever to remarry she would cease to be eligible for a widow's pension.
