## Pre-War:

James was born in Manchester in 1917.

## Wartime experience:

James became a prisoner of war when Singapore fell to the Japanese on 15 February 1941. He was transported to Thailand, as part of H Force, to work on the Thai/Burma Railway.

No Camp stated. Letters should be addressed as on attached slip, until a camp address is received. Should you receive an address, please inform this Office at once.</p>		
<p>Should any other information be received concerning him, such information will be at once communicated to you.</p>		
<p>Instructions as to the method of communicating with Prisoners of War can be obtained at any Post Office.</p>

Sadly, James passed away on 17 September 1943, at the age of 26, after being in the camp hospital in Kanburi, suffering from Malaria and Dysentry.

Jame is buried in the Kanchanaburi War Cemetery, Thailand. Plat 2. Row E. Grave 41.


