

### It's Alive!? | Transitional Kindergarten (TK)

Look over there! Is it... alive?! Learn what living things are while touring the Garden with an experienced Garden Guide. There's so much to see as you walk through the Garden grounds to investigate the differences between living and nonliving things.

#### Program Overview

Students will be divided into groups of no more than 10 students for each group. Each group will then be paired with one of our volunteer Garden Guides who will take the group on a walking tour of the Garden and facilitate different activities. Activities include an interactive sorting exercise where students will sort objects into categories of either "living," "nonliving," or "came from living" thing; the other activity included is a group scavenger hunt and tally-keeping which takes place during the walking tour. Chaperones are expected to assist with some of the activities by managing the materials, along with managing student behavior so that our Garden Guide can focus on facilitating the tour and activities.

Please review our <u>pre-visit materials</u> prior to your visit. As a reminder, be sure to have your class dress for the weather, wear comfortable walking shoes, and carry water bottles. Refillable water stations are available in the Garden.
