



# Project Overview for Local Area Coordinators

Local Area Coordinators are volunteers who engage, assist, and support land managers to undertake fox and rabbit control—through baiting and shooting—on their own properties. This work is carried out with guidance from a central coordinator and forms the backbone of the *local action for regional results* approach.

This model also provides strong opportunities for sponsors and partners to connect with an engaged and strategically important community. Each year, around 25 Local Coordinators promote and run events across the majority of the Agricultural Zone of Western Australia. Their local efforts are strengthened by broad media promotion from the central program.

## Coordinator Responsibilities – Shooting Events

1. Register as a Local Coordinator at [www.redcard.org.au/registration](http://www.redcard.org.au/registration).
2. Identify landholders willing to host participants.
3. Choose a suitable location for tallying and breakfast/social activities.
4. Promote the event locally.
5. Register participants through your organisation.
6. Record results.
7. Submit tallies—including participant numbers—to [www.redcard.org.au/results](http://www.redcard.org.au/results).

## Coordinator Responsibilities – Hotbaiting Period

1. Register as a Local Coordinator.
2. Provide landholders with baiting forms and accreditation information.
3. Landholders complete accreditation and are then able to lay 1080 baits.

Across both shooting and baiting activities, coordinators are encouraged to:

- Seek local sponsorship for prizes.
- Build community engagement through social events.
- Strengthen regional collaboration and awareness.
