TOWN UPDATES | SCHOOL TAX SEASON

It's that time of year again. The 2026–2027 school tax warrants were signed this week and delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, officially beginning the school tax collection process. Residents should look for the bill in the mail around September 1 and be reminded that the first half of school taxes is due on or before September 30.
