This is a nonpartisan newsletter.

A peripheral story that you may or may not be aware of is one of educational revisions to the social studies curriculum of the State of Michigan public school system. As the news story runs, the four Republicans are in favor of the changes, whilst the four Democrats are dead-set against it. According to Bridge Magazine, the changes include a downplay of: core democratic values, the historical value of the NAACP, Roe v. Wade, the Ku Klux Klan, climate change, and the like. Even the title of the article I read is "History Gets a Conservative Twist in Michigan Social Studies Standards."

I'll admit, I scratched my head. Why would core democratic values be downplayed by Conservatives? That seems contrary to everything I know about American political partisanship. And the fact that all four Democrats on the State B of E are opposed to it tells me there's more to the story than meets the eye.

Yes, just what I thought. Wherever the 142-page draft for Michigan K–12 Standards in Social Studies mentions the phrase "core democratic values", the draft substitutes "democratic" for "republic." So the opposers of the draft, the news outlet, the Democrats opposed to the rephrasing, are trying to make us believe that the changes downplay core democratic values, when in reality the changes simply conform the nomenclature to reflect reality: the United States of America is a republic, not a democracy. (For example, page 11, C2 is changed from "Understand values and principles of American constitutional democracy," to "Understand the core values and principles of our unique form of government, called a constitutional republic.")

They wish to make the Standards factually correct. How terribly controversial.

I next did a quick search for "NAACP," and found that of the three references, two were taken out. The first was in a parenthetical list of examples that looks like this: (e.g. NAACP, etc...). Lists like these were removed *from the entirety of the document*, offering educators the opportunity to fulfill the standards in their own unique ways. The second was in the Appendix, the whole of which was removed.

Egads. Call Al Sharpton.

I did the same search for Ku Klux Klan, Roe v. Wade, and climate change. The same situation presents itself. Every time a controversial issue is "removed" or "downplayed" by the standards, it is a part of *exempli gratia*, meaning "for example." Other "for examples" include League of Nations, Versailles Treaty, rationing, liberation of concentration camps, President Reagan, religious rights, and Cleveland.

Note the following: Among the 793 Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod elementary schools nationally, 501 of these schools (63%) are accredited through "National Lutheran School Accreditation." And among the 86 Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod high schools nationally, 61 of these schools are accredited through "NLSA."

Now get this: Among the 18 Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod elementary schools of "*LEAP*" here in the Great Lakes Bay Region of Michigan, all 18 (100%) have worked for hard and have earned National Lutheran Schools Accreditation! The Dreaded Name

BOKO HARAM. This terrorizing name has been in the news for a few years with an evil reputation that frightens many Nigerians and causes Christians around the world to be in prayer for our brothers and sisters facing Boko Haram's terror.

Shocking statistics tell a very sad tale of almost 55,000 widows and more than 52,000 orphans because of Boko Haram's efforts to create a purely Islamic territory in northern Nigeria. Many of these broken people are Christian. Almost 50% of all Nigerians are Christian, yet in northern reaches of the nation only 4% are Christian which makes those believers targets of terrorists. It is becoming apparent that of those targets, many, if not most are young girls.

These girls are often raped repeatedly, forced to marry members of Boko Haram. Others are forced to become Islam and used as slaves while some become terrorist bombers.

Although attacks from Boko

Within a 2017 eight month period 84 children were used in this manner. Of those 56 were reportedly girls, many under the age of 15.

While we cherish our children, terrorists do not. They are used and abused indiscriminately. This is so difficult to imagine, much less understand.

PRAY FOR THE PERSECUTED

Pray that those enduring such awful afflictions will remain faithful throughout these terrible times. In the 2018 June issue of "Voice of the Martyrs" they ask that we pray specifically for 5 points needing our attention.

1. "Pray for Christians in northern

3. Pray that Christians will exemplify Christ's love so powerfully that Boko Haram militants will turn to Jesus for salvation.

4. Pray that front-line evangelists will be encouraged and strengthened in the Lord as they proclaim Christ in difficult and dangerous places.

5. Pray for the perseverance of Christians who face continual threats of violence."

And 6. Pray that we may be worthy of the name of Christian as we live our daily lives for our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

St. Paul Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes of April 12, 2018

(APPROVED)

Chairman Ben Helmreich called the meeting to order at 6:33 p.m. Ben led Council in an opening prayer.

Council members in attendance: Ben Helmreich, Rich Doan, Tom DePrekel, Scott Weiss, Jack Lustila, John Schlicker, David Schultz, Virginia Hutter, Jean Begick, Greg Behmlander, Andy Wiess, and Pastor Matyas.

Minutes-A motion passed approving the minutes from the March 15, 2018 Council Meeting as corrected.

Treasurer's Report-Andy Wiess, Board of Business Chairman, presented the Treasurer's Report. March financials reflect a profit of \$6,859.27. Unexpected expenses (organ repair and website upgrade) added to our YTD \$18,000 deficit. The Treasurer's Report will be filed for audit.

Committee Reports

Planning Committee Report-Pastor reported that the Planning Committee met last week with architect Doug Kueffner to discuss the priorities for the Ministry Center. The Committee also had an engineer evaluate the school parking lot. Dan Bourdow will be soliciting additional quotes for the scope of work needed to be accomplished at the parking lot.
