BUYING GREEN IS TAKING ACTION FOR WILDLIFE



What is one of the least green purchases you can make? **Ivory.** Wildlife trafficking, a 7-10 billion dollar industry, is decimating wildlife populations worldwide. Trafficking is harmful to humans, too – they are often run by syndicates who have links to other illegal activities, including narcotics, weapons, and terrorism. Ivory dominates this market. 96 elephants a day are being killed for their tusks, and in 10-15 years they may be forever gone from the African landscape. Shockingly, the United States is one of the largest retail markets for ivory pieces, and *San Francisco is second only to New York in imports*. With the passage of **AB96** in 2015, banning the sale of all ivory in California, we hope to stop those markets and pressure other states and countries to pass similar laws. Now that it is illegal – If you see something, say something. Report any ivory for sale to **California Department of Fish and Wildlife.**

==== GET THE FACTS ==

- In 2013, total retail industry sales in the United States amounted to about 3.08 trillion U.S. dollars. That's a lot of buying power!
- A 10% shift of the produce to local use from one state's farms would save 310,000 gallons of fuel on an annual basis, and would also reduce CO2 by 7.3 million pounds.
- Shade grown coffee leaves habitat intact for birds and other wildlife, compared to the typical sun-grown, which causes deforestation. Shade-grown requires little or no chemical fertilizers, pesticides or herbicides, and natural nutrients offer a healthier and tastier option.
- General purpose cleaners are responsible for approximately eight percent of total non-vehicular emissions of Volatile Organic Compounds, contributing to poor indoor and outdoor air quality.
- During the recent recession, conventional building shrank
 17% but green construction skyrocketed 1,700%; organic food leapt ahead 238% in the same period



EASY WAYS TO BUY GREEN

- Buy local. Farmers markets are a great resource for fresh, delicious produce! Go to ecologycenter.org to find a Farmer's Market near you.
- Purchase items in bulk. This means less packaging per item, and you can sometimes customize how much you buy, leading to less waste.



- **Buy with wildlife in mind.** Support businesses that have made a commitment to wildlife and the environment.
- Choose sustainable seafood. Download the Seafood Watch app or pick up a consumer guide (available at the Zoo) to know the best options for a healthy ocean.
- Green up your home improvement projects. Everything from batteries, to paint, to appliances have 'green' options. Do some research to find which choices have the least environmental impact.



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
