KEY REGIONS



WINELANDS

Just one hours drive east of Cape Town lies the winelands; a gourmand's dream with endless fine restaurants, acres of vineyards and an amazing array of hotels to choose from. This was one of the first areas of South Africa settled by Europeans and the region's three main towns — Franschhoek, Stellenbosch and Paarl — form a triangle that you can easily visit all in one trip.

THE GARDEN ROUTE

The Garden Route is a stunning 200km stretch of coastline in the Eastern and Western Cape Provinces and is a popular self-drive route. Most drives will start in Cape Town in the west & the full length of the route reaches Port Elizabeth in the east, a distance of around 800kms if sticking to the N2 motorway. The road is flanked by a picturesque mountainous back drop on one side and the Indian Ocean on the other with numerous lovely towns, beautiful beaches, indigenous forests and beautiful flowers (hence the name).

EASTERN CAPE

The Eastern Cape is the province at the eastern end of the Garden Route. The main hub and airport is Port Elizabeth but the province is most famous for its excellent private game reserves. These are between 1-2 hours drive from Port Elizabeth and are a fantastic end to a Garden Route self-drive & perfect for families due to the fact that they are malaria free.

KWAZULU-NATAL

KwaZulu-Natal, a coastal South African province, is known for its beaches, mountains and savannah populated by big game. The safari destination Hluhluwe-iMfolozi Park, in the northeast, is home to black and white rhinos, lions and giraffes. Going on safari in KZN is a natural extension to visiting the Zulu Battlefields, Umhlanga Rocks beaches or even the Drakensberg Escarpment. Durban is an Indian-influenced harbor city and a popular surfing spot. Cultural villages around the town of Eshowe showcase the traditions of the indigenous Zulu people.

KRUGER & NATIONAL PARK

Kruger National Park, in northeastern South Africa, is one of Africa's largest game reserves. Nearly 2 million hectares of land that stretch for 352 kilometres (20 000 square kilometres) from north to south along the Mozambique border, and has a high density of wild animals includes the Big 5: lions, leopards, rhinos, elephants and buffalos. Kruger now forms part of the Great Limpopo Transfrontier Park - a peace park that links Kruger National Park with game parks in Zimbabwe and Mozambique

GREATER KRUGER NATIONAL PARK

The vast Greater Kruger Area comprises the main Kruger National Park and the private game reserves that are situated along the unfenced border. Due to the lack of fences between the national park and the private reserves the wildlife is free to roam. One of the main advantages of a safari in the private reserves is that there are limited number of people as one has to be staying in one of the private lodges and for this reason, you will experience a less crowded safari with no more than two game vehicles per sighting.

MADIKWE / PILANESBERG

The Madikwe is the fifth largest game reserve and is also one of the lesser-known parks in SA. This hidden-gem is regard as one of the best conservation areas in SA offering the Big 5 in an 680km² park. The Pilanesberg National Park is only a 2 hour drive from Johannesburg meaning guests can enjoy a safari experience at a relatively short distance from the city and its international airport. Both of these areas are in a non-malarial area which makes them ideal for families.
