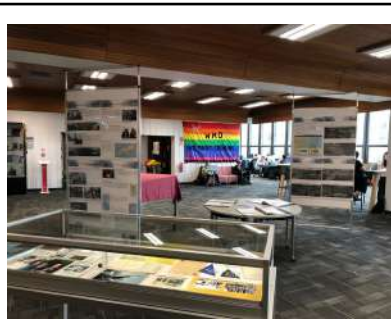

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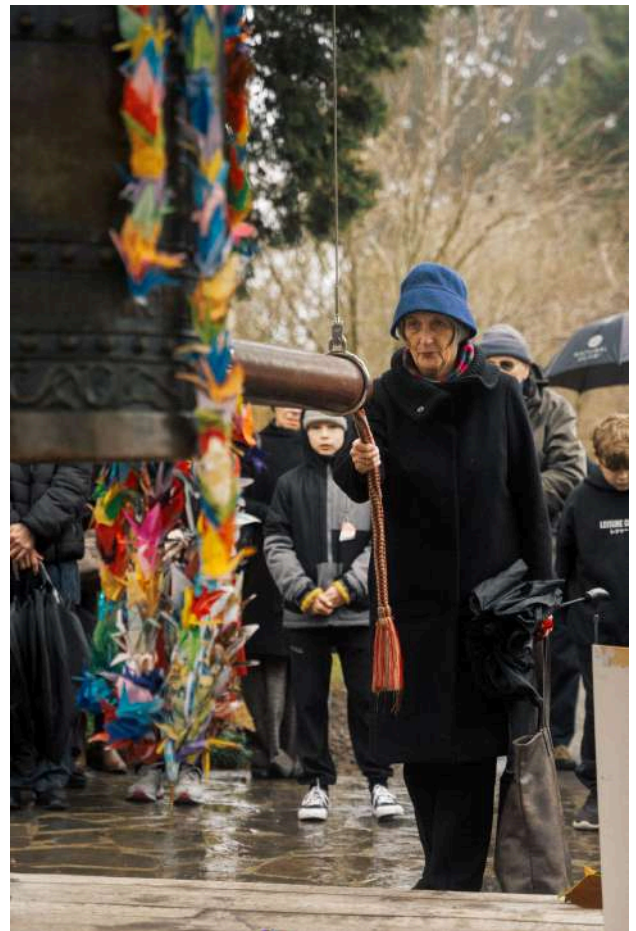
Executive Summary

As we reach the second half of 2026, the Disarmament and Security Centre | Te Whare Maukāroko reflects on a year of meaningful activity (July 2025-July 2026), growing challenges, and renewed purpose. It's been a busy year so far at the DSC as we work hard to secure funding for our projects and keep the day-to-day operations of our small but active NGO going. We need to reach young people with the message of peace and ensure the lessons of history—and the horrors of war—are never forgotten or repeated.

In an increasingly volatile global environment, our work to promote disarmament, peace education, and Aotearoa New Zealand's nuclear-free values remains as vital as ever. The war in Iran and wider Middle East, ongoing genocide in Palestine, the militarisation of the Pacific, and global increase in military spending highlight the necessity of our mahi. This year also marks the 30th anniversary of the World Court Project, and the 81st anniversary of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki—events that continue to shape global calls for nuclear disarmament. In January 2026, the Doomsday Clock was set to just 85 seconds to midnight, the closest it has been to global annihilation, a stark warning that the threat of nuclear conflict—either by accident, miscalculation, or direct order—remains dangerously high. In this context, the DSC has worked hard to uphold the lessons of the past while creating space for public dialogue, education, and action.

Our Disarm Kōrero series serves as our most widespread channel for educating the public. In July, we hosted our 27th session, 'The World Court:

From Nuclear Weapons to Climate Justice' focusing on an intergenerational reflection of 30 years since the ICJ Nuclear Weapons Opinion, and the Climate Movement it inspired. The event featured two compelling Aotearoa-based speakers—Dr Kate Dewes and Solomon Yeo (Solomon Islands)—who shared personal insights on their experiences in these two campaigns. Chaired by DSC Research Fellow Dr Marcus Coll, the kōrero powerfully highlighted the importance of hard working citizens and advocacy in bringing about change.



We've also remained active in commemorative and educational work. In collaboration with students, community groups, and partner organisations, we:

- Supported the continued growth of UCDisarm at the University of Canterbury, with support on the General Executive, an active stall at Clubs Day and a range of events and initiatives throughout the year
- Supported UCDisarm in screening *Sitting on the Fence*, a powerful documentary about the New Zealand Government response to Palestine at the University of Canterbury, as well as organising an *Election Edition* event planned for on campus in September 2026;
- Celebrated and raised awareness of the 5th Anniversary of the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (22nd Jan 2026);
- Travelled to the International Peace Research Association (IPRA) Conference in Taranaki in November 2025, where our team (Lucy Stewart, Dr Marcus Coll, and Dr Kate Dewes) presented a panel on disarmament education and engaged with peace researchers and iwi, coinciding with the anniversary of the invasion of Parihaka
- Coordinated an 80th anniversary ceremony at the World Peace Bell in Christchurch on August 10, 2025, with music, readings, and reflection; and organised this annual commemoration for August 9th, 2026.
- Curated a three-week peace heritage exhibition for the 2025 Christchurch Heritage Festival, which was held in October at the University of Canterbury.
- Worked closely with the Christchurch Museum team to research and curate an exhibition on Canterbury's Peace and Disarmament movement for 2027.
- Organised and curated an exhibition to mark the 30th anniversary of the World Court Project, which is taking place at the home of the DSC - Te Whare Maukāroko in September 2026.

Despite our achievements, serious challenges remain. In the current funding climate, government support for disarmament education is dwindling, with our core funding (DEUNIF) disestablished in 2026. We are working hard to adapt, diversify funding sources, and continue our mahi through innovative educational initiatives, exhibitions, and partnerships, but the headwinds are strong and the future uncertain.

Throughout it all, we have drawn strength from our community—students, educators, peacebuilders, and everyday people who believe that Aotearoa's nuclear-free identity, independent foreign policy, and peace education is worth defending. Our work is driven by hope, by history, and by a vision of a more peaceful future. We are proud of what we've achieved together so far in 2025/2026, and we hope to continue in the years ahead.

Our Mission

1. Promote peace and disarmament education throughout the education system and the wider community.
2. Provide a resource centre for alternative thinking on disarmament and security issues both within Aotearoa New Zealand and internationally and to disseminate research through publications, websites, and conferences.

Promote a climate of peace in Aotearoa New Zealand.

Lucy Stewart (Programme Manager)

Lucy holds a Masters of Professional Studies degree in International Relations and Human Rights (MPSIRHR) from the University of Auckland. She spent three years teaching children and adults in the Kurdish region of Northern Iraq. Since returning to Aotearoa New Zealand, Lucy has worked for over 10 years in the disarmament field in various not-for-profit organisations. Lucy was on the New Zealand civil society delegation to the United Nations for the negotiations on the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons in 2017, and was awarded the Quaker Loxley Peace and Service Award in the same year for her work with the Disarmament and Security Centre. From 2022-2024, she served on the New Zealand Public Advisory Committee on Disarmament and Arms Control (PACDAC).



Dr Marcus Coll (Research Fellow | Project Lead)

Marcus spent seven years studying and working in Japan and holds a Bachelor of Arts in Japanese (Bunkyo University Tokyo), a Master of Diplomacy, and a Doctorate in International Relations (Canterbury). His doctoral research involved interviewing and researching survivors of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, Indigenous rights activists, religious and military leaders, peace campaigners, and others who were instrumental in shaping New Zealand's nuclear free identity. He has recently completed a project titled 'Ōtautahi Christchurch: From Protest to Peace City' documenting local peace and anti-nuclear history as part of the Christchurch City Council's Intangible Heritage Project. Marcus recently taught a semester-long disarmament course as an Adjunct Professor of International Relations in the Department of Social Sciences at the University of the Philippines Manila.

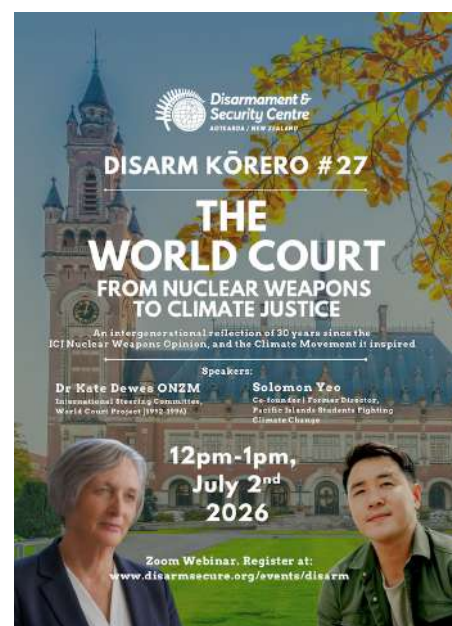

Key Highlights of the Reporting Period

Disarm Kōrero

We've hosted four very successful Disarm Kōrero sessions during the reporting period: *Hiroshima Nagasaki 80 Years On*; *Nuclear Ban 5 Years On*; *Palestine/Gaza and what prospects for peace?*; and *The World Court: An intergenerational reflection*. These sessions have canvassed topical issues with expert speakers, and we've seen some of our biggest audiences. We're delighted to say that this particular initiative is one of our flagship projects. The Disarm Kōrero sessions are designed as a discussion session, rather than your usual webinar. We have a guest speaker introduce the topic and speak for roughly 20 minutes on the topic. We then open the floor to questions and discussion. Due to the wealth of experience and expertise within the disarmament community here in Aotearoa, we always have a very lively and informative discussion. For most of these sessions we now record the speaker presentations and [post these after the event on our website](#), as to serve as a resource for the community. The recordings of these sessions are now being used by other groups as a basis for their meetings and discussions.



Tertiary and Public Education

Over the reporting period the DSC team delivered several guest lectures on a range of disarmament related topics at universities and community spaces across the motu. These Universities included the University of Canterbury, Victoria University of Wellington and Soka University of Tokyo, as well as to the Quaker Peace and Service Aotearoa New Zealand Annual General Meeting. The team also presented at the 2025 International Peace Research Association Conference (IPRA) in Taranaki, the topic of our panel presentation was *Disarmament in Action: A Case Study from Aotearoa New Zealand*. IPRA brought together about 180 peace researchers from across the globe and it was the first time that the conference had been held in New Zealand, and also the first time the conference had been held on indigenous lands. It was a fantastic opportunity for the DSC team to share our work, the history of disarmament education in Aotearoa, and network with other practitioners from across the globe. 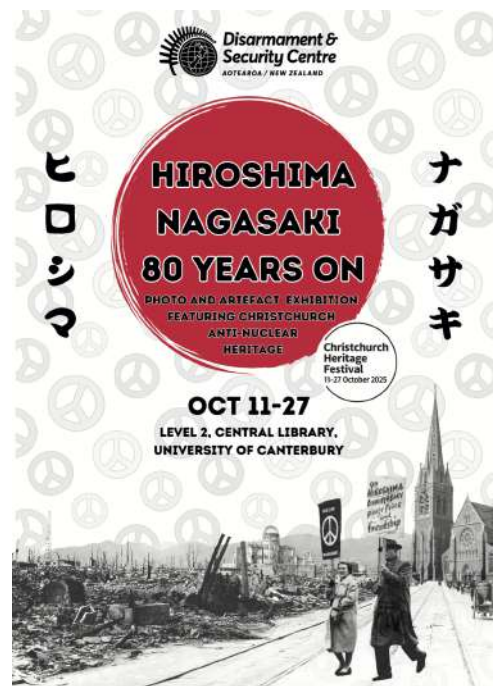
We tailor our presentations to fit various university courses, and also the knowledge and level of the students. Further lectures are scheduled for later this year at the University of Canterbury, Selwyn Library, and to the Christchurch City Council's Community Development Advisory group. Most of these invitations to give guest lectures to university classes are repeated yearly and it is heartening to know that our DSC team are valued by the community and academic staff at universities across the country for our expertise and experience in a range of disarmament topics. It also highlights that there is a need for further teaching and academic engagement in this field.



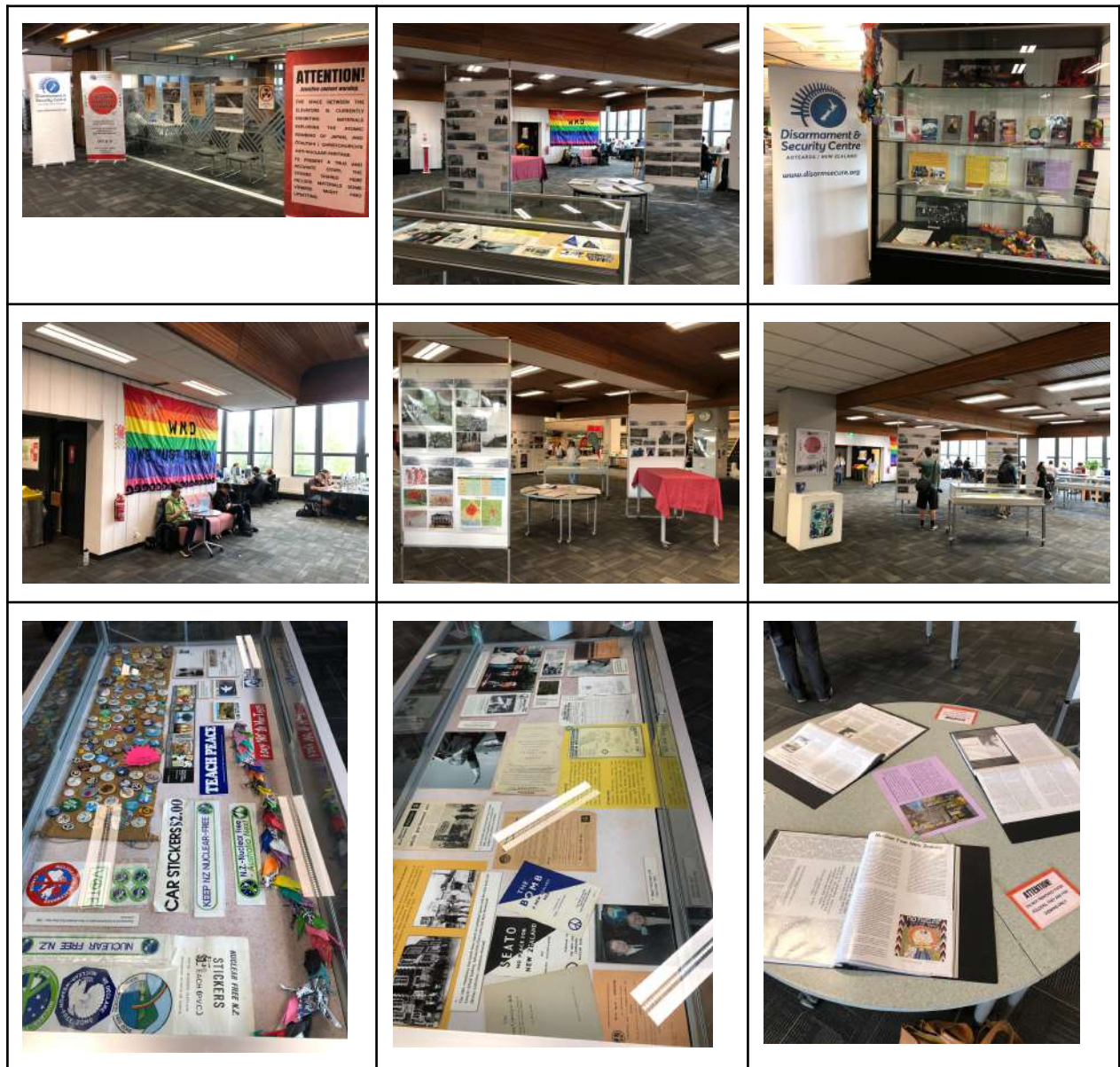


Heritage Festival Event 2025 - Exhibition: Hiroshima Nagasaki 80 Years On

As part of the Christchurch City Council Heritage Festival, the Disarmament and Security Centre held a Photo and Artifact Exhibition featuring Christchurch Anti-Nuclear Heritage from October 11 - 17th on Level 2 of the Central Library, at the University of Canterbury. The exhibition was a huge success with a significant number of students, UC staff and general public viewing and interacting with the exhibition. The exhibition spanned the ground floor of the library, which is a major thoroughfare for students. Comments from the UC Library staff members were that it was one of the most popular exhibitions they had hosted, which had attracted a high level of engagement. The exhibition focussed on the impact of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and the rich legacy of anti-nuclear activism in Ōtautahi Christchurch and Waitaha Canterbury. Featuring materials from the Hiroshima Peace Culture Foundation, the Macmillan Brown Archives, and Christchurch City Libraries' digital heritage platform. The exhibition wove together survivor testimony, archival images, and artefacts from Aotearoa's peace movement.



Thanks to support from the Embassy of Japan Japanese Consular Office for providing an extensive photo exhibition to mark the 80th anniversary of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. The DSC added to these materials to highlight the peace heritage of Canterbury, much of which had been inspired by the stories of the hibakusha (atomic bomb survivors) from Hiroshima and Nagasaki.



Kaitiakitanga of New Zealand World Peace Bell passes to DSC

In April 2025, the Disarmament and Security Centre formally became the kaitiaki (guardian) of the New Zealand World Peace Bell, following the dissolution of the Aotearoa New Zealand Chapter of the World Peace Bell Association. A small but significant ceremony was held on Monday, 28 April in the Christchurch Botanic Gardens to mark the official transfer of guardianship.

This peaceful and symbolic handover represents both an honour and a responsibility. The Bell—one of only 25 in the world—has long stood as a public reminder of the need for global cooperation and peace, especially in memory of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.



We extend our deep appreciation to those who have supported the Bell over the years, including Members of the NZ Chapter of the World Peace Bell Association, Christchurch City Council and local iwi Kāi Tahu, who have upheld the kaupapa of peace alongside the city's residents.

Under DSC's stewardship, the Bell will remain a site of remembrance, reflection, and action. The transfer of kaitiakitanga reaffirms DSC's ongoing commitment to peace heritage, public education, and intergenerational responsibility, ensuring the Bell continues to ring out for future generations. Several successful community events have taken place at the Bell during the reporting period, such as the annual Parihaka commemoration in November, the Peace Run in February, the commemoration of the Mosque shootings in March.

University Club

UCDisarm, the campus club which DSC staff established in 2021, has been having a steady year which has seen a growth in students to over 80 members. The DSC team has continued to nurture and support the club to maintain its steady presence on campus, maintain its club affiliation under UCSA and to hold a number of events and initiatives. The Club Executive is running smoothly, with some keen and committed students, and Lucy Stewart, DSC



Programme Manager, also stands on the Exec to provide long standing institutional support. The UCDisarm team has held a stall at both Club Days which are held at the beginning of each semester. Clubs' Day is a great opportunity to network with other clubs, chat with fellow students and raise awareness about disarmament issues. The Club maintains active social media platforms which serves as the key way

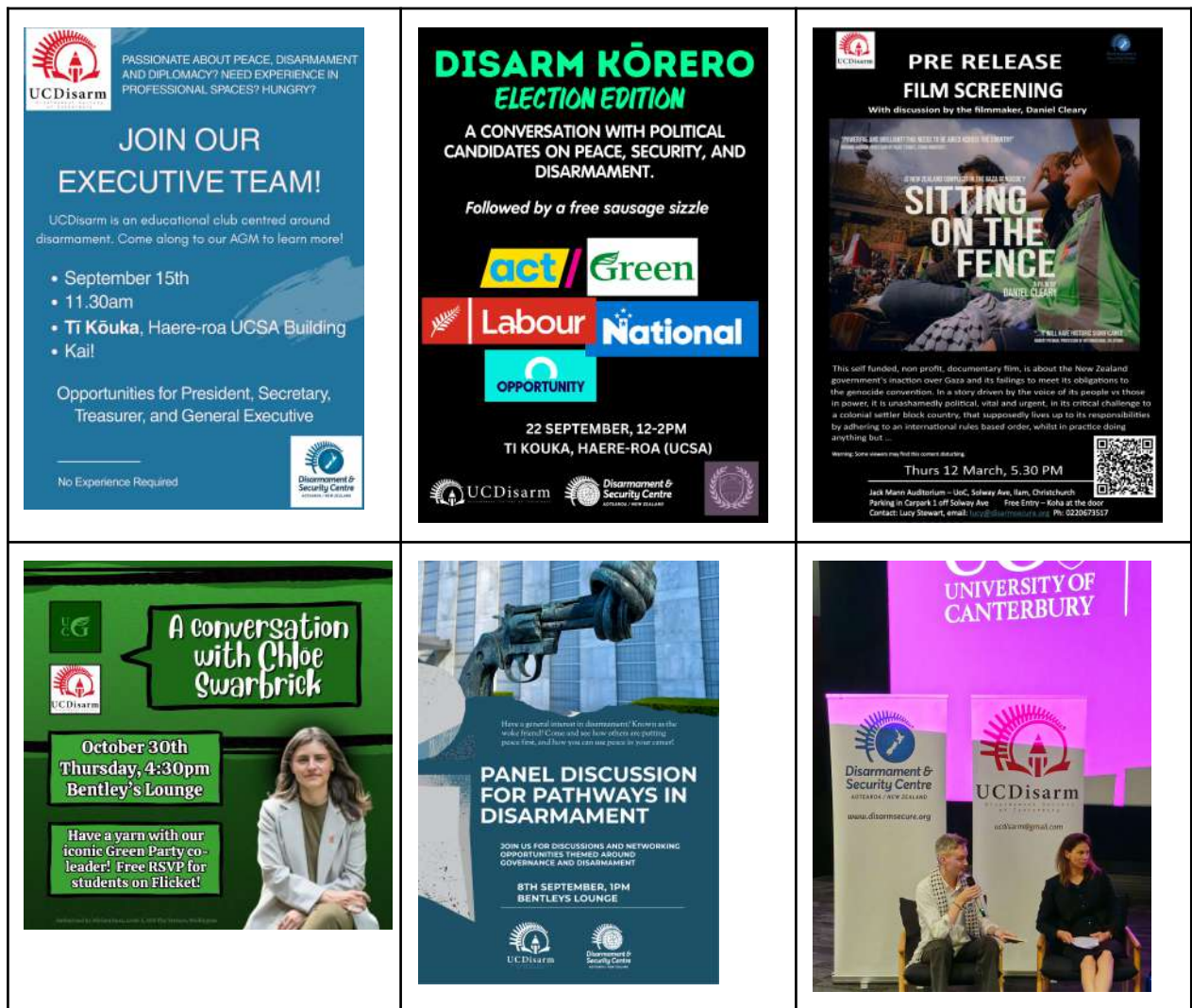
students communicate and build community through the club, as well as promoting disarmament education.

The Club has held a number of very successful events and initiatives over the reporting period, providing a number of high quality spaces for students to engage with issues of peace, security and disarmament. A standout event for 2026 was the [film screening of *Sitting on the Fence*](#), a powerful documentary about Palestine and the NZ Government response. The event was held at the Jack Mann Auditorium at the University of Canterbury and the film Director, Daniel Cleary flew down from Auckland to speak at the event. Our flagship event for 2026 is our *Disarm Kōrero: Election Edition* Event, which will be held on Tuesday September 22nd, where we are hosting a range of political candidates to discuss their party's disarmament policy and position and answer questions. This event is being held in collaboration with UCPolitics Club.



International Mahi and Outreach

Fuji Travel Group visits Christchurch

In January 2026, a Japanese peace delegation of 15 visited New Zealand, travelling throughout the country to engage with local peace organisations. The visit was facilitated through Liz Remmerswaal of World BEYOND War. Kate Dewes, Marcus Coll, and Olivia Shimasaki of the Peace Foundation joined the delegation for an evening discussion, with Marcus providing Japanese-English interpretation.



The delegation expressed a strong interest in learning about the history of New Zealand's peace movement, particularly the contributions of Kate Dewes and Robert Green and their longstanding relationships with hibakusha (atomic bomb survivors). The visit fostered valuable international connections, and the delegation indicated an interest in returning to New Zealand in the future, with the hope of visiting Heritage House and continuing these exchanges.

Publication: The Oxford Handbook of Protest Politics

Dr Kate Dewes was invited to author a chapter, "*Aotearoa New Zealand Nuclear Free: Protest to Policy*," for *The Oxford Handbook of Protest Politics*, to be published in 2027. She will be co-authoring this with Marcus Coll, drawing on witness testimony and archival research, the chapter examines how grassroots activism shaped New Zealand's nuclear-free policy. An abstract was submitted in May 2026, with the full chapter due in December 2026. The publication highlights the Centre's work in disarmament education and preserving Aotearoa New Zealand's anti-nuclear heritage for an international audience.

Marking 30th Anniversary of ICJ Advisory Opinion | World Court Project

July 6th, 2026 marked the 30th Anniversary of the World Court Project, which culminated in the International Court of Justice Advisory Opinion on the legal status of nuclear weapons. This anniversary has been celebrated and highlighted in peace and disarmament spheres across the globe. Due to the fundamental role that Christchurch locals, and DSC Founding Directors (Dr Kate Dewes and Commander Robert Green RN Ret'd) played in this movement the DSC has also been involved in several initiatives to celebrate this anniversary. The Anniversary has been marked in the following ways:

- Kate Dewes was interviewed for a podcast on the subject by Dr. Deepshikha Kumari Vijn (PhD, MSc, MA, Oxford University) Executive Director | The Lawyers Committee on Nuclear Policy (LCNP), which will be published in the near future.

- The DSC is holding an interactive 'walk-through' exhibition marking the 30th anniversary of the 1996 International Court of Justice (ICJ) Advisory Opinion on Nuclear Weapons. The exhibition will be held at Te Whare Maukāroko (House of Peace), 35 Rata Street, Riccarton, the home of our former co-directors, Dr Kate Dewes and Cdr Robert Green RN (Ret'd) over September 24th and 25th, 2026. Heritage Project: Preserving Aotearoa's Nuclear Free and Peace Heritage

The Centre continues to deliver its heritage project, *Preserving and Promoting Aotearoa's Nuclear Free and Peace Heritage*, led by Dr Marcus Coll. The project remains on track despite receiving approximately two-thirds of the funding originally requested. A second round of Lottery funding was not awarded to DSC in 2026; however, the project continues through careful prioritisation, institutional partnerships, and support from collaborators and some alternative funding sources. Dr Kate Dewes continues to provide invaluable expertise, archival knowledge and support, while Lucy Stewart has contributed to project planning and coordination.

2026 Exhibition: *Christchurch to The Hague: 30 Years Since the ICJ Nuclear Weapons Advisory Opinion*

A key upcoming milestone of this project is *Christchurch to The Hague: 30 Years Since the ICJ Nuclear Weapons Advisory Opinion*, an exhibition and public programme to be held at Heritage House – Te Whare Maukaroko in September 2026. The exhibition will commemorate the 30th anniversary of the 1996 International Court of Justice Advisory Opinion on nuclear



weapons, featuring materials from the Macmillan Brown Library and Canterbury Museum collections, including photographs, documents and artefacts. The programme will include engagement with

University of Canterbury students, alongside outreach to heritage organisations, public officials, peace movement members and the wider community.

2027 Exhibition: Hīkoi: Actions of Resistance, Striving for Peace

Planning is also well advanced for two major public exhibitions in 2027. *Hīkoi: Actions of Resistance, Striving for Peace* has been confirmed for the Mair Gallery at the Centre of Contemporary Art Toi Moroki in Christchurch (May–August 2027), with ongoing collaboration with Canterbury Museum on research, curation and public programming. The exhibition will contribute to a permanent peace exhibition in the redeveloped Canterbury Museum from 2029.

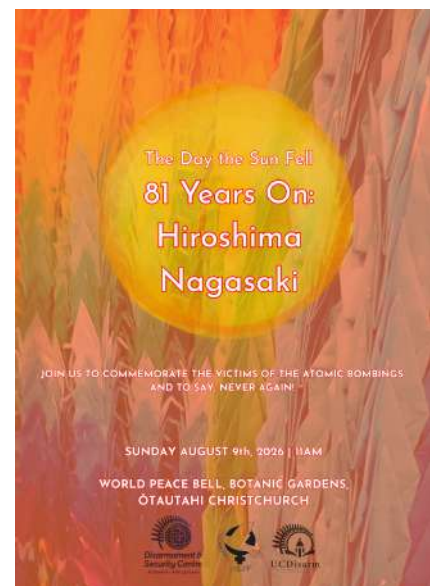
2027 Exhibition: The Christchurch Story: 40 Years of Nuclear-Free Aotearoa

A second exhibition, *The Christchurch Story: 40 Years of Nuclear-Free Aotearoa*, has been preliminarily approved for Te Pito Huarewa Gallery at Tūrangā Library (August–November 2027), bringing together collections and expertise from Christchurch City Libraries, Canterbury Museum, Macmillan Brown Library and the Canterbury Stories Digital Heritage Repository. Both exhibitions provide significant opportunities for public education and heritage preservation, with host institutions supporting venue, marketing and operational costs while DSC provides research, interpretation and content development.

Events and Initiatives

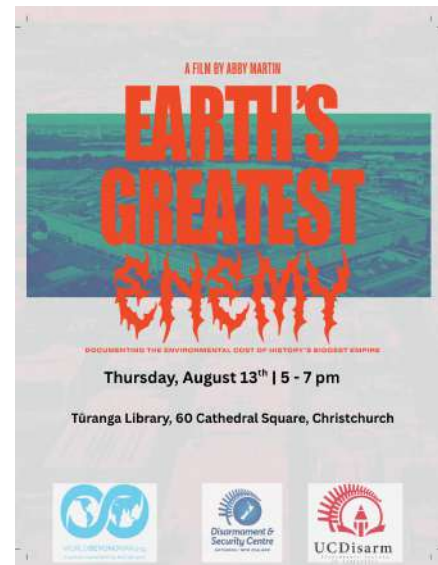
The Day the Sun Fell: 81 Years On: Hiroshima & Nagasaki

This year marks 81 years since the atomic bombings of Hiroshima (6 August) and Nagasaki (9 August). The DSC is proud to support a series of commemorative events across Aotearoa that honour the victims and survivors (*hibakusha*) and reaffirm our collective commitment to a nuclear-free world. On Sunday, 9 August, 11am, we will be holding our annual remembrance and reflection at the World Peace Bell in the Christchurch Botanic Gardens. The ceremony will include readings, music, and the ceremonial ringing of New Zealand's only World Peace Bell. Speakers and attendees will include the Japanese Consul General, local MPs, City Councillors, and members of the local peace and anti-nuclear movement. In a time of rising nuclear risks and regional tensions, it is more important than ever to reflect on the horrors of nuclear war and uphold Aotearoa's long-standing nuclear-free stance, and this event is an ample opportunity to educate the community on this. Special Film Screening: Earth's Greatest Enemy

In collaboration with UCDisarm and World Beyond War (Christchurch Chapter), the Disarmament and Security Centre is co-hosting two screenings of *Earth's Greatest Enemy | Documenting the Environmental Cost of History's Biggest Empire*, a film by Abby Martin. The first screening is being held at Tūranga Library on August 13th, and the second screening is being held at the University of Canterbury, on Thursday September 10th.



Public Outreach

Over the 2025/26 year we continued to build on our relationships with other non-government organisations working in peace and disarmament in Aotearoa New Zealand and abroad for example, we are a long term member of the Peace and Disarmament Collective Aotearoa (Formerly the Peace Foundation International Affairs and Disarmament Committee), and we actively participate in their bimonthly meetings. We also engage with NZ Government officials working in the disarmament space, as well as with the representatives of PACDAC (Public Advisory Opinion on Disarmament and Arms Control). We also assisted students, educators, academics, researchers, and the public who were interested in our resources and disarmament materials. We maintained our social media, website and newsletter giving updates on disarmament and peace and in promoting our resources and materials and new materials and content from our partners in disarmaments.

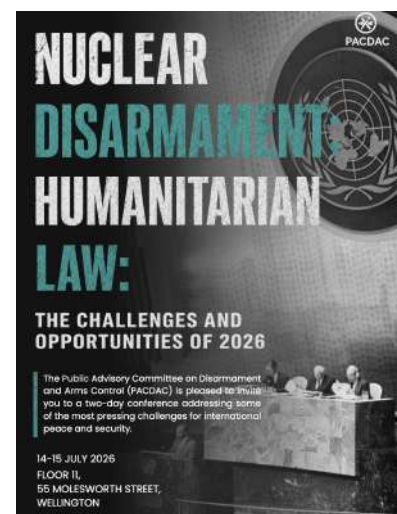
2026 Otago Foreign Policy School

From 26–28 June, Marcus Coll attended the 60th Otago Foreign Policy School in Dunedin for a three-day programme exploring the challenges facing the international rules-based order and New Zealand's role within it. The conference brought together scholars, diplomats, government officials and emerging leaders to discuss issues including nuclear disarmament, peacebuilding, climate action and international justice. Discussions highlighted the importance of New Zealand maintaining an active role in upholding international law and multilateral institutions, particularly as global cooperation faces increasing challenges. This conference also included a presentation from DSC Chair Prof Treasa Dunworth on New Zealand's positions on various issues of international law.



PACDAC Conference on Nuclear Disarmament & Humanitarian Law

Lucy Stewart attended the PACDAC conference in Wellington over July 14 and 15th representing the DSC. The conference was organised by the Public Advisory Committee on Disarmament and Arms Control, alongside the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and it brought together a range of disarmament practitioners from Government officials, academics, lawyers, NGO professionals, students, journalists and the general public. The focus of the conference was to discuss the progress and challenges of the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW) and plan for the Meeting of States Parties, which is happening in November this year. The conference was a valuable experience to learn from other disarmament practitioners and to share and brainstorm solutions to the disarmament challenges that we face, such as global political tensions, numerous active conflicts, increases in militarisation and the challenges to international law adherence.



What's Ahead? Significant Challenges to our Mahi

In Budget 2025, the government announced it will halve—and then fully cut—funding for the Disarmament Education UN Implementation Fund (DEUNIF) by July 2025. This decision threatens the future of consistent, long-term disarmament education in Aotearoa New Zealand.

In response, the DSC wrote a letter with support from over 80 signatories—including former Prime Ministers, Ministers for Disarmament, MPs, academics, and civil society leaders—urging Minister Louise Upston and other relevant ministers to reverse the decision. While PADET funding for small projects remains intact, DEUNIF has been the only consistent government support for public-facing disarmament education since 2004, and has aided the running of the DSC since that time. The letter highlights the risks of this cut:

- Undermining New Zealand's international disarmament leadership
- Weakening our nuclear-free identity and education sector
- Limiting public engagement amid rising global nuclear threats

Despite its modest \$200,000 annual budget, DEUNIF has enabled impactful initiatives—such as youth outreach, exhibitions, academic research, and survivor testimony preservation—that bring our peace and disarmament heritage to life.

This loss comes as we mark key anniversaries:

- 40 years since the Rainbow Warrior bombing (July 2025)
- 80 years since Hiroshima and Nagasaki (August 2025)
- 5 years since the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear weapons came into force (January 2026)
- 30 years since the ICJ nuclear weapons ruling (2026)
- 40 years of our nuclear-free legislation (June 2027)

We believe most New Zealanders value our nuclear-free stance and support educating the next generation about peace and disarmament, and we will continue to do our best to carry this legacy forward. Even with DEUNIF, however, funding has always been a perennial challenge. The financial burden this places on our small team is significant and increasingly unsustainable—especially in the current climate of rising costs and reduced public funding. Without greater support, the ability to retain staff, let alone maintain high-impact work, is at real risk, and reliance on volunteer time is untenable to continue the mahi going forward in the short to medium term.

A bequest or legacy included in your will is a simple and effective way to support the DSC in our work. It is an investment in the future of disarmament research and education in Aotearoa New Zealand. If you already have a will it can be amended by adding a codicil.
