

Old business:

1255 Meriweather Avenue

The applicant is the owner of a single-family residence (SF-6 zone) seeking to add a covered deck in the rear yard. The addition requires a variance of 4'4" on the side yard setback and 30' on the rear yard setback. The application includes sufficient information, including numerous letters in support from neighbors (though not all contiguous neighbors). The only letter of opposition is from the Mt. Lookout Community Council. The Zoning Committee is taking no position at present.

New business:

1107 Paxton Avenue

The applicant is the owner of a single-family residence (SF-10) seeking to add an enclosed vestibule on the east side of the home that exceeds the maximum building envelope for the Hillside Overlay District. At the moment, the application does not contain sufficient information for the Zoning Committee to take a position.

Hillside Overlay District Presentation

The Zoning Committee heard a presentation by Tom Lienhart of Clifton and Eric Russo, Director of the Hillside Trust, on the need for the City of Cincinnati to review and update the Hillside Overlay District evaluation and permitting process. Approximately 17% of Cincinnati's land is on structurally unique hillsides, which require some additional protections to prevent landslides and shifting. The Zoning Committee is reviewing the information shared and may present a motion or recommendation to the full Board at a future meeting.

Cincinnati Recreation Commission: Joe Berta shared that:

- They are now operating on school year hours (9:00 a.m.-9:00 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9:00 a.m. -3:00 p.m. on Saturdays).
- The Eastside Rec Center is partnering with Brazee Street Studios on a giant glass mural that will represent aspects of the three communities that the center serves. Community members can purchase a bumblebee, flower, or bird that they can make and add to the mural.
- The center is currently serving 190 kids from Hyde Park School in their after school program.
- The center is hosting a meeting tomorrow night for parents who are looking for better child care solutions.

Hyde Park School—Assistant Principal Eugenie Woods noted that:

- They have had a great start to the school year, and they have a total of 645-650 students in the expanded building.
- The school is particularly focused on two new initiatives: establishing the school's garden and getting their library set back up. Please contact the school if you would like to assist with either effort.
- The school will be hosting its annual student read-a-thon in October. Students will read for donations.
- The community is always welcome to stop by and see the school and find a way to volunteer.

Withrow University High School

Belinda Carson reported that:

- Withrow's first day of school went very well. Approximately 85% of students are coming to school in their uniforms.
- Parent-teacher conferences will be held on September 11th.
- Withrow currently has an interim principal and is continuing to search for a permanent principal. The school will be interviewing 3 candidates tomorrow. They hope that the new principal will be able to start on October 1st.
- Work is continuing on the new resource coordinator storage area. This Saturday, the Purcell
 Marian football team is coming to help paint the classroom. The school is looking for
 donations of extra painting supplies, such as brushes, drop cloths, and rollers.

John Zinsser, Save Hyde Park Square

- Last Thursday, Cincinnati City Council voted to repeal its April 23rd vote on the zone change.
- SHPS wants to thank HPNC trustees and zoning community for partnership in conversations with the developer. They also thank everyone who helped to make this happen. They are hoping to continue that partnership with HPNC into the future.
- The developer has announced their intent to file a new plan with the city. He noted that SHPS's interests remain clear—defend our zoning and advocate for reasonable height variances. They encourage the developer to respect the 50 feet height that the current zoning requires.
- Please consider signing up for the mailing list and or consider donating to HPNC towards legal fees. Please remember that more than 1/3 of the people who circulated petitions came from outside Hyde Park.
- Question—what is the status of the Hyde Park plan?
 - Sean McGrory who is on the Hyde Park Plan committee, stated that the committee is still working to refine one area of the plan that concerns the future land use map. He noted that they have requested some data from the city's planning department, and they are scheduled to meet again later in September. Once the committee finalizes the plan, they will present it to HPNC. They hope to have it ready to present at the October meeting. He notes that the plan had to be reworked in light of Connected Communities, which is a city

ordinance. Neighborhood plans must go before both the city's Planning Commission and City Council for approval.

3. New Business

Hyde Park Square Business Association (HPSBA) meeting: R. Sweeney reported that:

- The HPSBA is working on a new website that they hope to launch soon.
- The tree lighting on Hyde Park Square will take place on November 22nd. From 4:00-7:00 p.m.
