



SUGARING & THE SEX TRADE

Sugaring describes a business-like transaction most often between a sugar daddy—a wealthy older man—and a sugar baby—a young woman—where the latter's 'companionship' is exchanged for cash. Marketed to sugar daddies as a legitimate way to find connection and to sugar babies as a lucrative and empowering financial opportunity, the truth is not so simple.

In reality, website's like seeking.com know exactly what they're selling: prostitution repackaged. While a privileged few profit, sugaring sites and 'daddies' target economically vulnerable young women to feed the demand for these transactional 'relationships.' The inherently unequal power dynamic between sugar daddies and babies is primed for traffickers and predators can exploit, often targeting young girls.

PREYING ON VULNERABILITY

In 2020, the top occupation of sugar babies on seeking.com was listed as STUDENT, 2.48 million of whom are based in the US, and A THIRD of whom use that money specifically for TUITION.1

Seeking.com (formerly Seeking Arrangements) gave account advantages to sugar babies with an ".edu" email.

PROSTITUTION REBRANDED

Trafficking victims are being advertised on sugar dating websites by pimps. Some sugar daddies are unequivocally sex buyers, writing on buyer review forums publicly advertising how to prey on and exploit young, vulnerable women.3
