Deep Hope:

My deep hope is that we would see the grand narrative of Scripture and understand our role in light of His story.



Long Term Learning Targets:

• We can exercise our role as followers of Jesus in light of His example.

• We can wrestle with the idea of how God can be good in an unjust world as we explore Habakkuk and discern how it fits in the grand narrative of Scripture.



Curricular Outcomes:

Acquire and utilize practical tools to study the Bible in an accurate and meaningful way while allowing the Spirit to change our hearts. This change leads to action.



Habit(s) of Learning:

Gracious Communicating- Students have to graciously communicate in a way that is kind and helpful in order to fulfill the needs of the residents at the Neumann Senior Center during our event. They will carry on this way of communication as they interact throughout their pen pal journey.

Joy-Filled Collaborating- Students will bring joy to both the residents and their classmates as they complete the FLEx and continue their relationship with their pen pal. They will also work together as they connect with residents in an intentional way, serve them, and continue to engage with residents through the pen pal program.



Students will see that we are all created in the image of God. We can reflect God's image by seeing the beauty in others and honor them by listening, serving, and knowing them. Students will prayerfully recognize the value in all people even if relatability is not initially obvious.

We are meant to live in unity with one another, seek justice for one another, and see value in one another. It is delightful in that when we function as God intended and love others as He first loved us, relationships flourish. The brokenness comes when we cannot see beyond our personal narrow perspectives or lived experiences and judge or look down on others. Ultimately, through Jesus we have restoration available. We can create a culture of healing and love by exercising the example we see in Christ.



Storyline:

His Story. Our Role

We are actively living out our role as Jesus followers by serving others, by moving towards the often overlooked, and speaking and walking in love.





Throughlines:

Justice Seekers:

Students will move toward those who are often overlooked. They will serve residents, offer a listening ear, and continue on a relationship showing them the value they deserve.

This will help them reflect on God's view of justice and how Jesus exemplified a spirit of service and humility always.

Image Reflectors:

Students reflect the image of Christ through their acknowledgement and care for others. They practice their role as followers of Jesus by emulating His example and reflecting His character in their actions.

Students get to put action to their belief. They get to live out the story rather than simply seeing the story.



Throughlines:

Community Builders:

Students will serve residents at the Neumann Senior Housing who live in our community. They will foster and prayerfully maintain a relationship with residents.

This will give them a tangible way to share the goodness of God with others and build a bridge to a group of people that they otherwise would not likely interact with.



Formational Learning Experience:


Real needs: Value, Acknowledgement, Honor

Real people: Low-Income Seniors at the Neumann Senior Center in the Fishtown neighborhood in Philadelphia.

Real work: Organizing an event that provides pizza, entertainment, and socialization for seniors through a bingo event with pizza and refreshments. Students will continue their relationship building with the residents by participating in a pen pal program.



This whole idea came after a student asked me about providing an opportunity to do a service project. I told her I would help make it happen if she took some initiative to brainstorm ideas and make the initial connection. She came to me with a list of thoughts and we settled on serving at the Nemann Senior Center. She made the initial phone call and connected with Shantell, the Director of Events at the senior home. I then took over communication for logistical reasons. This was inspired as a student-driven project.








NURTURE


