What is the Church? teaching notes

>Understand the Church

Ephesians 1:22—23 "God has put all things under the authority of Christ and has made him head over all things for the benefit of the church. 23 And the *ekklessia* which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all"

note on context: "The sequence of thought here seems to be: by his resurrection and ascension Christ is exalted to be Lord of all, he is head of all things for the church; the church is his body intended to express him in the world; more than that, the church is intended to be a full expression of him by being filled by him whose purpose it is to fill everything there is"

Greek word Church = *Ekklēsia* "gathered assembly" A local congregation of believers (e.g., 1 Cor 1:2) And the universal church (e.g., Eph 1:22–23)

"Local and Universal"
"Gathering and Going"

Ephesians 5:25 for husbands, this means love your wives, just as Christ loved the church. He gave up his life for her 26to make her holy and clean, washed by the cleansing of God's word. 27 He did this to present her to himself as a glorious church without a spot or wrinkle or any other blemish. Instead, she will be holy and without fault. 28In the same way, husbands ought to love their wives as they love their own bodies. For a man who loves his wife actually shows love for himself. 29 No one hates his own body but feeds and cares for it, just as Christ cares for the church. 30And we are members of his body.

31As the Scriptures say, "A man leaves his father and mother and is joined to his wife, and the two are united into one." 32This is a great mystery, but it is an illustration of the way Christ and the church are one.

"This is an invitation to read Genesis 2 Christologically— looking for Christ"

Note: this practice is often labeled the Theological Interpretation of Scripture

Genesis 2:21-24

21 So the Lord God caused the man to fall into a deep sleep. While the man slept, the Lord God took out one of the man's ribs and closed up the opening. 22Then the Lord God made a woman from the rib, and he brought her to the man.

23 "At last!" the man exclaimed.

"This one is bone from my bone, and flesh from my flesh! She will be called 'woman,' because she was taken from 'man.'"

24 This explains why a man leaves his father and mother and is joined to his wife, and the two are united into one.

Historical scholars are confused why Genesis 2:24 says this, because there was never an ancient culture where the male leaves his family to join the woman. But, by the Holy Spirit... this is exactly what Paul says it is: a mystery left in the Scripture that points to Christ!

A Christological Reading of Genesis 2:21–24 yields some beautiful substance: Christ is the Man who would leave His Father's home to find a Bride. Christ is the Man who would be put to sleep, wounded by God, and yet Healed. Christ is the Man who would see His Bride and say, "at last!" Christ is the Man who has given us a name, a new identity as His. Christ is the Man who longs to be united with us, who calls us bone of his bones and flesh of his flesh.

One more:

In Genesis 2:22, most English translations say:

"Then the Lord God **made** a woman from the rib he had taken out of the man..." But the Hebrew doesn't use the common verb for "made" (asah or bara). It uses a much more architectural, deliberate term: wayyiben, from the root banah. Literally: "God built the woman." Banah is used elsewhere for building temples, cities, altars, and houses. It implies intentional design, structure, and purposeful assembly. Eve isn't hastily formed. She's carefully constructed—almost like a sacred dwelling. This fits beautifully with the later biblical idea of the Church as the Temple—a Bride being built together into a holy dwelling for God (Eph 2:20–22, 1 Pet 2:5).

Is it any surprise that in the New Testament the top-3 images of the Church are His Bride, His Body, and His Temple??

In summary, the Church is the Bride bought by Christ.

the Body united to Christ. the Temple built by Christ.

- Sunday mornings called "the Lord's Day"
- **Private homes** ~10–30 people per house church.

The Nicene Creed (381 AD)

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father (and the Son) who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

I believe in one, holy, universal* and apostolic Church. I confess one baptism for the forgiveness of sins, and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

One common and helpful—but imperfect—way of categorizing modern churches is:

Sacramental

the largest grouping, with well over 1 and a half billion people Churches like the Anglican, Lutheran, Eastern Orthodox

Distinct Emphasis: Communion and Tradition.

Influential voices: C.S. Lewis, Mother Teresa, Brother Lawrence

Charismatic/Pentecostal

largest non-Catholic grouping, and fastest growing

Churches like the Assemblies of God, Vineyard, non-denominational

Distinct Emphasis: The Lord (His Leading / Presence / Activity)

Influential voices: John & Lisa Bevere, Jack Hayford, Heidi Baker, Reinhardt Bonke

Evangelical

Churches like Baptists, community churches, reformed churches.

Distinct Emphasis: the Sermon (for churches focused on members) or the Gospel

presentation (for churches focused on the lost)

Influential voices: Billy Graham, Tim Keller, Jackie Hill Perry, Rick Warren

Mainline/Broad

smallest and shrinking fast

Churches like United Methodist, Presbyterian, Church of Christ, Episcopal

Distinct Emphasis: community outreach, charity

Influential voices: Eugene Peterson, Martin Luther King Jr.

Note that many denominations have recently split, resulting in theologically *liberal* and *conservative* branches. (Many of these splits have been centered on social issues.) For example, the Anglican Communion in the United States split into the liberal Episcopal Church and the conservative Anglican Church in North America (ACNA), and the Methodist Church has split into the liberal United Methodist Church (UMC) and the conservative Global Methodist Church (GMC).

>Love the Church

The Church is called to walk in **Unity in Diversity**

The Church displays God's multi-faceted wisdom (Ephesians 3:10)

It's interesting to note that in Acts 2, which describes the birth of the Church, cross-cultural understanding is given (through the interpretation of tongues), but unique languages are not dissolved. Thus, we see the Church can have unity of heart and understanding, even with diversity of cultures and ways of speaking.

The simplest unity we can have is to pray for the Church

John 17:20-21 "I am praying not only for these disciples but also for all who will ever believe in me through their message. I pray that they will all be one, just as you and I are one—as you are in me, Father, and I am in you. And may they be in us so that the world will believe you sent me."

DPC is unequivocally part of the Global and Historic Church of the Lord Jesus.

But what is God's distinct work here?

Pastor Randy's message:
