

What is farm to early care and education?

Farm to early care and education (farm to ECE) enhances ECE settings by incorporating local food sourcing, school gardens, and food and agriculture education. This approach enriches the educational experience across various ECE environments, including preschools, child care centers, and Head Start programs. Farm to ECE supports experiential learning, community engagement, and promotes life-long health and wellness for children, families, and caregivers.



A Vision for Farm to Early Care and Education

As a leader and national convener in the farm to early care and education (farm to ECE) movement, NFSN aims to support the development of vibrant and equitable, community-based food systems and enhance the health and well-being of young children and their families through comprehensive farm to ECE initiatives. NFSN works to achieve this aim by (1) broadly sharing information and resources, (2) promoting state, regional, and national networking, and (3) supporting advocacy efforts. To meet these objectives, National Farm to School Network convenes the Farm to Early Care and Education Working Group, a cohort of experienced leaders and stakeholders in the field that work collaboratively in identifying and addressing barriers and strategic opportunities to further the national farm to early care and education movement.
