HELLO GOLD MOUNTAIN CLASSROOM GUIDE



The Bellingham Symphony Orchestra will be featuring excerpts from the work Hello Gold Mountain with the composer and soloist Wu Fei joining us on stage. We are excited you will be joining us!

The Bellingham Symphony Orchestra will be featuring music that transcends oppression while introducing students to the orchestra. This concert is geared for middle to high school-aged students, but all ages are welcome to attend. *Hello Gold Mountain* by composer and soloist Wu Fei tells the story of people in the Jewish community of Shanghai, exploring what was and could have been. The modern day requiem or piece in remembrance is an intriguing look at history through music. Students will learn directly from the composer as part of the concert experience. Come join us for this engaging way to introduce students to composition and let them see firsthand how the orchestra helps to create a meaningful story in an immersive and exciting experience.

PRE CONCERT MEET THE ORCHESTRA



The Orchestra has four families:

- Strings
- Woodwinds
- □ Brass
- Percussion

The concert will feature instruments from each orchestral family. Each family of instruments produces sound in a different way, helping to define each group and bring beautiful and distinct sounds to the orchestra. PRE OR POST CONCERT GUZHENG & OUD



The solo instrument featured in this concert is not traditionally in the orchestra. Wu Fei plays a traditional Chinese zither called a guzheng. In *Hello Gold Mountain* this instrument represents the people of Shanghai. In the full piece, an oud, a guitar-like instrument, represents the Jewish people.

PRE CONCERT HELLO GOLD MOUNTAIN



Hello Gold Mountain is a piece in remembrance of the Jewish refugees who fled Europe to Shanghai, China during WWII. The work explores the ideas of migration and lost possibilities. From composer Wu Fei, "Imagine if the Jewish composers of wartime Shanghai had stayed there, collaborated with local musicians, and learned local folk music? Imagine if these composers became a natural part of the landscape for Chinese musicians? Imagine if this collaboration lasted for generations and not just a number of years. That did not happen. Hello Gold Mountain is my attempt to write music that I think could have come out of the fascinating cultural possibilities of the Jewish presence in Shanghai."



PRE OR POST CONCERT REQUIEMS IN CLASSICAL MUSIC



A requiem is a piece that is in remembrance. Originally part of a mass, these works typically include voice. In *Hello Gold Mountain* Wu Fei and others sing, replacing the traditional vocal soloists and choir.

Many composers over the centuries have composed requiems including Mozart and Brahms. Want to hear more? The Bellingham Symphony Orchestra will be pairing *Hello Gold Mountain* with Mozart's *Requiem* as part of their concert *Harmony from Discord Meets Mozart's Requiem* on Sunday, March 26, 2023 at 3pm at Mount Baker Theatre. PRE OR POST CONCERT IMPROVISATION & COMPOSING ACTIVITIES



Improvisation and composing are both creative ways for kids to get involved in music. You can have students compose their own music at <u>Classics for Kids</u> or with <u>Song Maker!</u> In *Hello Gold Mountain* the composer Wu Fei incorporates improvisation in her work.

The book Max Found Two Sticks by Brian Pickney tells the story of Max listening to the world around him and creating music based on the sounds he hears around him.

Have your students listen to their surroundings at school or at home. Next students can pick an instrument and create a short melody or rhythm based on what they heard. Have students play their sounds for each other. Feeling adventuresome? Students can listen to a classmates composition and improvise their own take on it OR have students create a picture of what they heard to accompany their short composition.
