

2025 NSWJRU Presidents Report

Andrew Hutton President 25 November 2025

2025 has been another strong year of growth for junior rugby across all formats of the game. In addition to a strong on-field commitment, we also commenced an affiliate restructure process that will set us up for future growth and sustainability, while streamlining operational efficiency.

Unlike recent seasons, weather disruptions were minimal, allowing us to complete a full season of rugby across the state. Participation continues to be a key focus, with growth again seen in the older age groups—especially Under 16s and above—across all regions.

Our Vice President, **Ben Gregory**, transitioned from his GM role at SJRU into a newly created position as **General Manager**, **NSW Juniors**. This move forms part of the broader strategy to consolidate the administration of the junior game across New South Wales. The existing federated model, which has long defined the rugby landscape, continues to impede much-needed reform due to outdated silos and excessive administrative duplication. If Juniors can demonstrate the benefits of a more unified and streamlined model, we can help showcase the game's true potential across the state.

Ben's change in title had little operational impact—he has continued to drive the expansion of competitions and the development of the game across all formats. Rugby in New South Wales has now firmly established itself as a year-round sport.

The **Junior 7s State Championships** came fully under NSWJRU governance in 2025, continuing the impressive growth initiated by Michael Doyle. It now stands as the largest junior 7s tournament in the southern hemisphere, with remarkable year-on-year expansion.

Across the state, our affiliates—**SJRU**, **NSW Country Juniors**, and the **NSW Schools Associations**—continued to deliver strong, well-supported competitions for both boys and girls. Country Juniors successfully adapted to regional changes in clubs and schools, while the Schools Associations managed minor schedule adjustments with great cooperation. In partnership with NSW Schools, and with **Andrew Hill** assisting as he transitioned his role as school liaison, we oversaw continued growth of the **Waratah Shield** and renewed engagement from schools in multiple rugby formats.

The representative season built further momentum from the record-breaking 2024 season, with increased participation across all age groups. As outlined in the VP Representative Report, the **Peugeot NSW Junior State Championships** again proved a highlight—demonstrating growth in both team and player numbers, as well as a renewed enthusiasm for the tournament. Learnings from 2024 informed a smoother competition structure, and despite some weather and venue challenges, the event was an outstanding success.

Thanks to the ongoing commitment of our clubs, districts, zones, and schools, the State Championships have become an iconic fixture of the June long weekend. This reputation has made the tournament a sought-after event for host clubs, and local councils are increasingly recognising its economic benefits. I would like to particularly thank **Dubbo Regional Council**, **Orange City Council**, **Mid-Western Regional Council** and **MidCoast Council** for their continued support with venues, logistics, and accommodation.

NSWJRU continues to strengthen **representative pathways** for both boys and girls, ensuring increased opportunities for participation and a high standard of play. The success of these programs was evident again at national competitions, with exceptional performances from the **Waratah Academy** programs. I would especially like to acknowledge the work of **Andrew Cleverly** and **Matt Evrard** from the **NSW Waratahs** team for their leadership and ongoing support of our pathways.

Our success is built on collaboration, and I wish to thank **Mark Green** and **Peter Murphy** for their continued support of all junior programs.

A special mention must go to **Ben Gregory** (NSWJRU Life Member) for his tireless dedication in his dual roles as GM NSW Juniors and NSWJRU VP Representatives. Ben's enthusiasm, commitment, and vision continue to drive participation and opportunity across the state. Much of the resurgence in the older age groups can be directly attributed to his efforts, with significant growth again in the U18/Open State Championships for both boys and girls. A testament to this depth of talent, our **NSW Junior XV** alongside both the **NSW Schools** teams that reached the U18s Championship Final at the ASRU Tournament. Whilst our **U18 NSWJRU Barbarians** team won the Rugby AU Div 2 National Championships.

These achievements would not be possible without the extraordinary contribution of our **volunteers**. Many also serve as representatives on the NSWJRU Board, and I thank them sincerely: **George Roper** and **Michael Clark** (Sydney Juniors), **Renee Park** and **Racheal Marsh** (NSW Country), and **Craig Howe** and **Mark Bos** (NSW Schools).

I also extend my gratitude to the NSWJRU Executive—**Nicki Willner**, **Ben Gregory**, **Gary Paton** (NSWJRU Life Member), **Ben Kooyman**, and **Kerry Brady** (NSWJRU Life Member)— for their dedication and support. Special thanks to **Ben Kooyman**, who stepped down as Secretary during the season. His attention to detail and governance expertise have been invaluable and will be greatly missed.

My appreciation also goes to the NSW Junior Patron, **Piper Duck**, for her ongoing support of junior rugby throughout 2025.

Over and above volunteer effort, financial support is vital. I thank all our **sponsors** for their generosity, particularly **Peugeot** who have joined us as the major sponsor of our signature State Championships. **Wahu**, and their much-loved Wahu minis packs and giveaways at tournaments. **Estilo Travel** who have been fabulous long-term partners. The **Positive Rugby Foundation** also continues to play a vital role, particularly through its support of our country communities.

A very special thank you, as always, goes to the **Rugby Club Foundation** for their exceptional and ongoing support of junior rugby across New South Wales. Under the leadership of **Angus Bruxner**, **Peter Whittington**, and **Lisa Kane**, the Foundation again generously covered all NSW team entry fees for the State Championships—an incredible gesture of support for grassroots rugby. In addition, the Foundation has provided significant funding for the development of junior coaching and referee courses, strengthening our game at every level.



After four seasons as President, I believe the time is right to step aside and allow new leadership to further drive the consolidation and growth of junior rugby. I remain committed to supporting the

NSW Juniors 2025 Commercial Report

Overview

I present the Finance Report of NSW Rugby Juniors for the year ended 30 September 2025. The organisation had an operating profit of \$184,606 for the 2025 financial year.

Statement of Profit and Loss

The successful result for the last financial year was due mainly to the generous support and sponsorship from The Rugby Club Foundation for both the State Championships XVs, Tri Tag State Championships and 7s State Championships, along with the sale of merchandise at 7s State Championships and associated Gala Days during the year along with significant savings on the cost of Merchandise and Streaming costs. Thank you to The Rugby Club Foundation for their ongoing support, this support continues to aide NSW Juniors in keeping costs for our teams/players low.

The majority of our merchandise sales were conducted online again this year through our merchandise supplier Sinalli which has eliminated the need for the Committee to sell the merchandise at State Championships and resulted in a significant saving in time and effort along with easier account reconciliation. This year Sinalli provided a significant contribution to the cost of merchandise resulting in circa \$30k saving.

NSW Juniors also received support for expenses to run the State Championships from Orange City Council for \$9,000, Mid-West Regional Council (Mudgee) for \$6,000, Maitland Junior Rugby for \$4,000 and Dubbo Junior Rugby Club for \$6,000 – to assist in covering accommodation and travel expenses for Referees.

This year NSW Rugby kindly paid for the majority of the streaming costs with NSW Juniors only needing to contributed \$21,840.91.

This year it was agreed that NSW Juniors would cover the full cost attributed to Referees, meaning SJRU and NSW Country would not need to contribute to this expense. In turn there would be no disbursement of merchandise sales revenue to these affiliates.

Balance Sheet

Trade and Other Receivables of \$3,762, as at 30 September 2025, this is outstanding team levies from South Coast Monaro and Melbourne Harlequins for the State Championships. Trade /Account Payables are \$5,286.60 as at 30 September 2025 – Scarred Lens Photography and Awards @ Ryde these amounts have been subsequently paid as at 25th November 2025 and 18th October 2025 respectively.

Conclusion

NSWJRU has Total Members' Funds in all accounts as of 30th November 2025 are \$416,370.49.

Recommendation: With the introduction of the NSW 7s State Championships to the NSW Juniors event calendar, I recommend moving the Financial Year to better align with when our income and expenditure is incurred for events, this would see the move of our financial year to January to December.

Lastly, I would like to thank all the NSWJRU committee members for the work they do behind the scenes in ensuring hosted events run as smoothly as possible and year on year producing a successful State Championships.

It continues to amaze me that every year when I sit down to reflect on the season just passed, that the scale and enormity of the programs that we now offer to our young rugby players continues to get grow every year. Season 2025 is no different and we can proudly say it has been another epic year for NSW Juniors.

There were a few big changes on the cards for season 2025. Obviously one of the biggest changes was my appointment to the role of General Manager, NSW Junior Rugby. The other big change was the State 7s Championships transitioning to NSW Juniors to oversee. And lastly the creation of the Tri Tag State Championships gave NSW Juniors the complete suite of Rep programs across all formats of the game.

The Inaugural **NSW Junior Tri Tag State Championships** kicked off in early March with 35 teams contesting across the various age categories. A huge thanks to Oatley Junior Rugby Club for

hosting what was a fantastic day at Riverwood Park. Special thanks to Mark Gasnier for his support in getting this event up and running. Congratulations to the winning teams. These championships have a special place as they saw sides from both clubs and school rugby participating together in the one carnival. Nominations for the 2026 have opened and we are four months away and already have such numbers nominated that 2026 will be a record.

From this event we were able to select our very first

NSW Juniors Tri Tag Representative sides. Whilst these were mostly merit teams at this point in time, we did have the opportunity for the U12-U14 boys (pictured) to be able to play an exhibition game during the Wallabies vs Argentina test match in August. A fabulous opportunity



for these young Rep players to showcase their skills and Tri Tag in front of a crowd of over 40,000. Our signature event is the **Peugeot NSW Junior State Championships** and again in season 2025 we were wonderfully supported by **The Rugby Club Foundation**. Their extreme generosity meant that every team entered (from NSW and beyond) had their entry fee covered by The Rugby Club Foundation. A fabulous commitment to the junior game and we thank them.

It is again pleasing to be able to report that the 2025 Peugeot NSW Junior State Championships saw a record number of 217 teams participating across all the age groups. We had teams from all of the Zones and Districts as well as visiting teams from ACTJRU, Southern Inland, South Coast Monaro, Melbourne Harlequins and the San Diego Legion.

We were ably supported by some tremendous host venues and despite some weather issues for the Under 12s, all our championships were contested in 2025. We'd like to thank our host clubs and their teams of volunteers without which we couldn't offer up such a fantastic event each year. The host venues and host clubs for 20252 were;

The Estilo Travel U12 Development Gala continues to grow as a vital piece of the pathway and this year we were pleased to be able to field teams from the Lloyd McDermott Foundation which enhanced the event for all participants.

Following on from State Champs was the Regionals tournament which is a basically selection carnival for the Sydney and NSW Country teams. Hosted at Camden Rugby Park by the Camden Rugby club, it was a fantastic two days of rugby which gave selectors the information they needed, and the resultant Sydney and NSW Country teams were selected.

At the end of July, we travelled to Newcastle Sportsground No 2 for the Annual clash of the traditional rivals - the City vs Country Carnival. Hunter juniors were our superb hosts and we saw a large crowd flock to see 7 really high-quality games of rugby. The NSW Country teams certainly came to play, and it was a magnificent day of Junior Rep Rugby. Unfortunately, one of the games ended up a technical forfeit due to a breach of the uncontested scrum rules, but that didn't take

away from the spectacle at all. Gabriel Sanatarossa and Aramia Royal were the winners of the Dave McCormack Shield from the U14 games.

As always, the U16 and U18 boys also have extra pathways in these age groups. The U18 boys started with 'Open' Trials for the Sydney and NSW Country teams at the start of May. These teams then went on to contest games against CHS, GPS, CCC & AICES as part of the NSW U18 selection pathway. The same followed in the U16 age group out at St Gregory's on the Saturday and Sunday following. CAS were the dominant side in both the U18 and U16 age groups, winning all their games.

From these games we saw the two NSW Schools Sides and the NSW Juniors XV selected to attend the Australian Schools Rugby Championships. We also had a NSW U18 Barbarians team selected from the NSWJRU State Championships, that attended the Rugby AU National Championships. NSW I and the NSWJRU Barbarians each won their respective Finals.

The U16s pathway saw both Sydney and NSW Country play their NSW Schools counterparts for places in the NSW U16 Waratahs side. This Waratahs U16 side then went on to win the U16 Super title undefeated, and thus we saw many of the NSW Schools and Club rugby players then selected into the U16 Australian team.

For the first time the Girls had an extra opportunity in the XVs format at the Rugby AU National Championships where both SJRU & NSW Country had sides entered in both the U16 & U18 age group. SJRU went on to win the final in both age categories. Following the XVs format the girls switched to 7s for the ASRU Champs where NSW lost the final to Queensland.

The girls also had an extra opportunity with NSW Juniors selecting teams in the XVs format across the U15, U16 and U18 age groups that played a Provincial Tri-Series against Rugby Vic and ACT Brumbies in Wagga Wagga. The carnival was a huge success, with NSW dominating, but everyone left wanting more pathways for the girls – 2026 will be a huge year in this space.

A new initiative in 2025 was a Development team selected from the State Champs in the U14 age groups for Boys and Girls which then toured to Adelaide to play against South Australia and Tasmania. This team was selected from those that missed selection into a Regionals team and was designed to give development opportunities for these players as well as giving our southern cousins appropriate competition to grow the game in their states. The feedback was huge from both sides and this is again on the cards for 2026.

The NSW Junior State 7s Championships fell under the control of NSW Juniors for the first time in 2025 and with that we saw a number of changes to the event. With the support of Mid-Western Regional Council and the Mudgee Rugby Club it was moved to Glen Willow Sports Complex, Mudgee. We also tightened the eligibility criteria for players, whilst running an official Player Pool, slightly changing the format to facilitate more games and executed all the administration solely through Rugby Xplorer for the first time. So, there was plenty of movement – but the end result was the best State 7s Championships that we have seen. The positive feedback from all and sundry was outstanding. I think the best way to wrap up the carnival was the fact we had 421 games of 7s played and not a single red-card was issued the entire championships.

juniors and school's network. Final teams are yet to be announced.

NSW Country Junior Report 2025

The 2025 season was a year of positive growth, representative success, and strengthened alignment across junior rugby in NSW Country. Expanding opportunities for girls and boys, enhancing pathways, and deepening engagement across Zones contributed to a highly successful year.

Representative Program

The Representative Program continued to strengthen, delivering some of our most successful outcomes to date.

A major highlight was the Annual NSWCRU Coaches Weekend, which was hugely successful and remains a critical first event each year. It sets the tone for our Representative Program, supports alignment across coaching groups, and ensures that all staff start the season with shared expectations, standards, and learning.

This year also saw strong satisfaction and much enjoyment across players, coaches, physios and managers, reflecting improvements in communication, program structure, and support systems. This is reflected in the exceptionally high numbers of team staff reapplying for roles into 2026.

Representative achievements included:

- First-time inclusion of both U16 and U18 Girls teams in the ASJRU Tournament. This was a successful event that gave our teams the opportunity to showcase the depth of girls' rugby across country NSW.
- The U18 Girls match against QLD Country at the Santos Festival of Rugby, demonstrating the strength of our pathway. Two players required late replacements after earning call-ups to the Waratahs Women's team—a significant milestone for junior development.
- Continued strong performances and record higher-level selections from both boys' and girls in each age group.
- Multiple players selected into Waratah and Waratah Women's squad who have come through the NSWCRU Representative Program.
- Multiple coaches selected into higher-level coaching roles
- More consistency in results with all games across all age groups more consistently competitive

Participation Across Zones and Competitions

NSW Country recorded **11,535 total junior participants**, reflecting **2.9% growth**. Retention remained steady at **59.3%**, with **4,822 new players** joining the game.

Zone Highlights (Short Summary)

- **Hunter JRU:** 2,573 participants; **5% growth**.
- **Central West:** Strongest performance -14% growth and highest retention (65.5%).
- **Central North:** Stable participation (+1.8%).
- **Illawarra: 11.2% growth**, driven by new minis players.
- **Far North Coast:** –7.4% decline but good retention (58.8%).
- **Mid North Coast:** Stable numbers (+0.2% growth; 64.8% retention).

- **Central Coast:** -1.3% decrease; strong retention (62.5%).
- **New England:** +1.3% growth with consistent returning players.
- Western Plains: continued growth in participation

Overall, participation trends show improving recruitment, consistent retention, and strong expansion in girls' competitions and opportunities.

Administrative Support & Compliance

Governance & Compliance review was a key focus this year.

Michael Flude surveyed and met with every Zone, ensuring all had an opportunity to contribute feedback. Many clubs and Zones also received individualised review summaries, supporting local planning and helping identify areas for improvement.

Additional governance improvements included:

- Clearer communication pathways with Zones and committees
- Strengthened compliance processes
- Updated representative program guidelines
- Improved administrative support
- Improved alignment direction between NSWCRU & NSWRU & NSWRU Development Staff
- Consultation process with each Zone in preparation for development & implementation of NSWCRU Strategic Plan.

These initiatives contribute to a more consistent, aligned, and sustainable structure for rugby throughout Country NSW.

Focus Areas Identified for 2026

- Continued expansion of girls' pathways and local competitions
- Increased coaching and referee development opportunities to address referee shortages and coach shortages (particularly coaches for Girls and Women's teams)
- Enhanced support for each Zone Competition
- Stronger school-club collaboration
- Integrity Support Resource
- Junior to Senior transition
- Volunteer Burnout and Volunteer Appreciation
- Improved and enhanced communication processes

SJRU Report 2025

In 2025, the SJRU continued its core XVs competitions, with Friday night fixtures for U10 to U12 and Sunday matches spanning U10 through to Opens. We also launched a successful Girls 15-a-side tournament, complementing our growing calendar of 7s competitions throughout the year.

As in previous seasons, the Sunday XVs competition commenced with two gala grading rounds on 6 and 13 April, followed by the first round of the main competition in early May. The season culminated in grand finals held on Friday 29 August and Sunday 31 August.

Aligned with our five-year strategic plan, the Board's top priority remained increasing junior rugby participation across Sydney. Over the past two years, we've concentrated on reversing the decline in Minis numbers. In 2025, we achieved our strategic goal of stabilising and growing Minis participation, thanks to key changes that gave clubs greater flexibility to schedule games across Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays and the expansion of interdistrict Minis fixtures which has significantly enhanced the experience for a number of our districts.

We are proud to report a 12.4% increase in Minis participation this year and I'd like to express our sincere thanks to the Rugby Club Foundation, whose generous funding support, helped drive these Minis initiatives.

The third edition of the Pasifika Cup, held in late 2024, saw strong growth and is now a permanent fixture on the junior rugby calendar. We look forward to an even larger fourth edition scheduled for the final weekend of November 2025.

Congratulations to all players selected to represent Sydney at the annual City vs. Country Carnival in Newcastle this July. Sydney teams delivered an outstanding performance, securing five wins and one draw from seven matches against NSW Country Juniors.

In a landmark achievement, our Under 16 and Under 18 Girls teams competed in the inaugural Rugby Australia Junior Championships on the Sunshine Coast, where both teams claimed the national title in their respective age groups.

In 2025, SJRU undertook a brand refresh and significantly enhanced its social media presence. These efforts led to a dramatic increase in follower engagement and visibility across platforms.

We also strengthened our governance framework by implementing a comprehensive risk management system, including a Risk Appetite Statement, Risk Matrix, and Risk Management Policy, ensuring robust oversight and accountability across all operations.

My sincere thanks to our Competition Management team of Shane Williams, John Glen, and Alexis Bonita, for their tireless work, and to Mark Green, General Manager of NSW Community Rugby, for his unwavering support.
