Character Corner

One goal all Voyager classrooms have set

out to accomplish within the first couple of months of the school year is to establish

the idea of a growth mindset in our students. A growth mindset builds the sense that all students can learn a desired concept. The idea of a closed mindset works in the opposite way. A closed mindset sends out the message that we can't do something, or there is no more left to gain. Changing the words we use on a daily basis can help to begin to change our mindset within a certain area. If we change our thoughts from "this is too hard" to "this may take some time," we begin to change our mindset. One area in particular where we are working to establish a growth mindset with our students is the area of Science and Reading. Changing some of the words we use to describe our experience in Science and Reading can help to shape a growth mindset for our students and lead them to meet their established goals throughout the school year. We want students to begin to say, "I can do this," or, "I may have to ask for help." At home, you can help establish a growth mindset as well. Be thoughtful with your language when it comes to any subject your student may find challenging. Be positive and encourage your child that they can do it. Try to avoid the old saying, "I was never good at that!" Together we can help make all subject areas more fun and enjoyable for Tucuzi students this year!

At CSA, we value and uphold Internal Motivation Psychology as a core philosophy which guides our relationships, practices, and teaching. We acknowledge that all humans are born with specific needs that we are genetically inclined to satisfy. All human behaviors, positive and negative, represent a desire to satisfy a basic need. In addition to our physical need for survival, we also recognize four other basic needs that must be satisfied: belonging and connecting, power or competence, freedom or choice, and fun Therein rests the power of relationships, for knowing where each child is in these need-satisfying processes requires us to prioritize connection. In doing so, we strive to earn trust and respect, build confidence through authentic feedback, and lead with empathy. Building and maintaining a
