Character Corner:

One goal all Voyager classrooms have set out to accomplish within the first couple of months of the school year is to establish the idea of a **growth mindset** in our students. A growth mindset builds the sense that all students can learn a desired concept. A closed mindset sends out the message that we can't do something, or there is no more left to gain. Changing the words we use on a daily basis can help to begin to change our mindset within a certain area. One area in particular where we are working to establish a growth mindset with our students is the area of Reading. We want students to begin to say, "I can do this," or, "I may have to ask for help." At home, you can help establish a growth mindset as well. Be thoughtful with your language when it comes to any subject your student may find challenging. Be positive and encourage your child that they can do it. Try to avoid the old saying, "I was never good at that!" Together we can help make all subject areas more fun and enjoyable for Boto students this year!
