## October Learning Highlights:

#### Science and Social Studies

- •Our focus this month will be on rhythm and traditions as we launch our unit on nursery rhymes in preparation for the Mother Goose Olympics
- We are learning the history of Mother Goose and will recite, recall and listen for the rhythm found in many of her rhymes
- We will continue asking/answering our essential question of "How do scientists learn about the natural world?" as we explore spiders (The Itsy Bitsy Spider), conduct some egg-citing experiments (Humpty Dumpty) and focus on using our five senses as we partake in fall nature walks, pumpkin investigations, and autumn leaf exploration
- A visit from local firefighters will lead our discussion about fire safety and best practices in the event of an emergency

#### Math

- Working on identifying, counting and forming numerals 1-10 from top to bottom with both accuracy and efficiency
- Reviewing and naming basic 2D shapes
- Continue practicing counting to 100 by 1's and the development of counting to any given number by 10's
- Evaluating AB and ABC patterns that can be seen, heard, and felt
- •Introduction of new individual Montessori math works

#### Reading Comprehension and Phonemic Awareness

- •Learning the habits of readers: pointing to the words and sharing ones we know with one another, acting out characters in popular stories, using our schema and pictures to talk about informational (non-fiction) texts, practicing retelling and stating facts from in class read alouds
- Discovering the roles of author and illustrator in a story, identifying the text, title, front and back of a book and left-to right progression when reading
- Listening for rhyme, beginning sounds, syllables and the manipulation of sounds during listening games
- •Repeated practice of MGR sounds and letter identification

## What are CSRs?



## <u>Character Corner</u>

This month we will discuss the 5 basic needs and the habits that can hurt or help relationships. We will make a Quality World picture that is filled with what has meaning to us and allows us to meet our 5 basic needs of survival, power, freedom, fun, and love & belonging. While the Basic Human Needs describe the general motivation for all behavior, the Quality World pictures will be specific and unique to each child. To gain a clearer understanding of our personal Quality Worlds we will discuss some of the following topics:

- · Who are the most important people in your life?
- What are your most deeply held values?
- · What is an accomplishment you are really proud of?
- · What does it mean to be a friend?

For the rest of your child's journey at CSA, a large focus will be on using the seven caring (connecting) habits and avoiding the seven hurtful (controlling) habits in all relationships. We'll be working towards making these caring habits part of our daily lives in and outside of the classroom so that everyone (including ourselves) can meet their five basic needs.
