

# NOVEMBER Frazer newsletter

#### **INSTRUCTIONAL FOCUS/LEARNING TARGETS:**

- Math: The instructional learning targets of the CSA middle school math curriculum focus on developing students'
  proficiency in key mathematical areas such as ratios, geometry, algebraic expressions, and statistics, while fostering critical
  thinking, problem-solving, and real-world application skills. The curriculum is designed to prepare students for high school
  math and beyond by encouraging a deep understanding of mathematical concepts. This month, students will be exploring
  concepts of expressions (Applied Math), angles and triangles (Intro to Integrated), linear functions (Integrated II).
- Science: Throughout November, our POD A students will run tests with multiple trials and develop and compare models like real scientists. This will help them write a scientific argument with evidence to support a teen patient's diagnosis. They will continue to learn how the body systems work together to deliver important molecules like glucose, amino acids and oxygen to cells. They will investigate how cells use those molecules through cellular respiration to release energy that supports movement, growth, and repair.
- Literature: Our Term 1 novel study takes us on a journey through The Fourteenth Goldfish by Jennifer L Holm. Students will learn that change can be uncomfortable, but it's also how we grow and discover who we are. Please ensure your student has selected their biography of an important historical figure who represents the character traits that CSAMS upholds: Respect, Responsibility, Work Ethic, Kindness, Getting Along, and Optimism. Students are expected to have the biographies read by December 5th.
- Social Studies: This month in social studies, we built on our understanding of geography and completed our study of the United States and Canada before journeying south into Latin America. Students explored the diverse landscapes that make up Central and South America and learned about the ancient civilizations of the Aztec, Inca, and Maya. We then examined the reasons people migrate and began studying the economic and political landscapes of modern South America. Next week, students will write an essay reflecting on everything they've learned, and then we'll begin our exploration of Europe which will take us up to Thanksgiving!
- Advisory: In Term 1, students will focus on building self-awareness, responsibility, and empathy. They will reflect on their personal strengths, emotions, and mindsets—recognizing where they show growth and where they may feel stuck. Lessons will emphasize how a growth mindset connects to self-respect, how better choices lead to better lives, and how responsibility and respect work together. Students will also learn strategies for managing emotions like anxiety, practice optimism, and explore how kindness, inclusion, and empathy strengthen friendships and school community. Through discussions, examples, and real-life scenarios, students will develop the skills to make respectful choices, handle conflicts constructively, and positively impact both their own lives and the lives of others.





This term in Literature, students will begin an exciting biography project where they'll select one influential person to study – such as a scientist, athlete, philosopher, or other revolutionary thinker from the past or present. Students will read a biography, explore articles or periodicals, and complete a series of creative projects to demonstrate what they've learned.

#### Project Overview:

- Topic Selection: Students will choose a person of interest (teacher approval required).
- Research: Students will read one biography and at least two articles about their chosen individual.
- Projects & Presentation: Students will complete three projects and give a short (5-minute) presentation during our Gallery Walk on December 12.

#### Timeline:

- Sept. 22 Dec. 5: Independent reading and research (biography + articles).
- Dec. 8 11: Complete final projects in class.
- Dec. 11: Final projects due.
- Dec. 12: Gallery Walk presentations.

We encourage families to help students choose someone they'll enjoy learning about and to support them in finding reading materials at the CSAMS library, local library, or online.


