
What's Happening in Orca

In Reading, Voyager students have begun our studies on non-fiction texts by exploring and utilizing text features. We've also begun a new round of book clubs highlighting various non-fiction texts at students' reading levels!

In writing, we have begun our non-fiction unit wherein we will research, organize, draft, revise, edit, and publish information on the 50 States with each child becoming an expert in one specifically! Look for information to be sent home on this project and our upcoming Culminating Event in the weeks ahead!

Our early mathematicians will wrap up their units on division and elapsed time while our developing mathematicians will complete their units on multi-digit multiplication and time equivalencies. All Voyager mathematicians will participate in intentional review, reteaching, and extension while they prepare for and take their Term 1 Cumulative Assessments.

We will close out our Geography unit in Social Studies as we discuss humans and their environment, including push and pull factors, adaptations and modifications, and positive and negative consequences of human activity on our environment. Students will then shift into a unit on US Economy as they learn characteristics of a Market Economy, describe the roll of money in exchange of goods and services, and identify
