

Ms. Kowalczyk's Advisory Newsletter February 2026

Happy February!

We are now halfway through term two, and half way through the school year! The school year has gone by fast! Our advisory has a lot of fun activities to look forward to this month, including a field trip, some spirit days, Activity Night, a four day weekend, and continuing to prepare for our Battle of the Books trivia competition!

Classroom Updates

Literature: In February, first year writers will embark on an independent research project, exploring choice topics such as unsung heroes in history, environmental conservation and endangered species, innovations that changed the world, or cultural traditions around the world. Students will learn foundational skills for collecting, analyzing, organizing, and using evidence to support their thesis statement, as well as use an academic vocabulary to present their findings and viewpoints. At the end of the month, we will begin our second read-aloud unit: Out of My Mind by Sharon Draper: a heartwarming story about a gifted girl named Melody Brooks, a brilliant 11-year-old with cerebral palsy, who has a photographic memory but can't speak, walk, or write, leading others to underestimate her until she gets a device to communicate, revealing her genius and facing challenges of inclusion and acceptance.

Math: The instructional learning targets of the CSA middle school math curriculum focus on developing students' proficiency in key mathematical areas such as ratios, geometry, algebraic expressions, and statistics, while fostering critical thinking, problem-solving, and real-world application skills. The curriculum is designed to prepare students for high school math and beyond by encouraging a deep understanding of mathematical concepts. This month, students will be exploring concepts of algebraic equations (Foundations Math), ratios and rates (Applied Math), and systems of linear equations (Intro to Integrated Math).

Social Studies: In February, students will be building a deeper understanding of citizenship and decision-making in our government. We'll explore the rights and responsibilities of citizens and how individuals and groups influence decisions at local, state, and national levels. Students will also study voting and elections, learning how leaders are chosen and why participation is essential to a healthy democracy. To wrap up the month, we'll examine foreign affairs and treaties, helping students understand how the United States works with other countries and makes decisions on the global stage.

Science: This month in science, students will begin a new unit on Traits and Reproduction. Students will take on the role of genetic researchers investigating why closely related spiders can have different traits, focusing on the flexibility of spider silk used for medical purposes. Students will explore how genes provide instructions for making proteins and how differences in protein structure lead to differences in observable traits. Through hands-on models, readings, and an interactive digital simulation, students will analyze how different gene combinations affect the proteins made inside cells and, in turn, an organism's traits. Throughout the month, students will connect their learning about spider genetics to real-world human examples, building a clear understanding of how genes, proteins, and traits work together to create variation in living organisms.

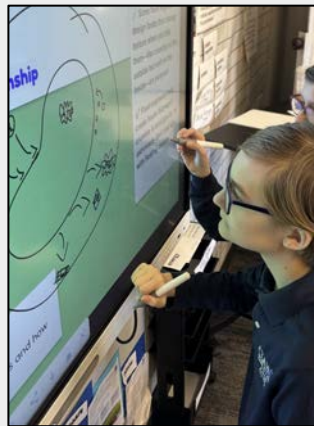
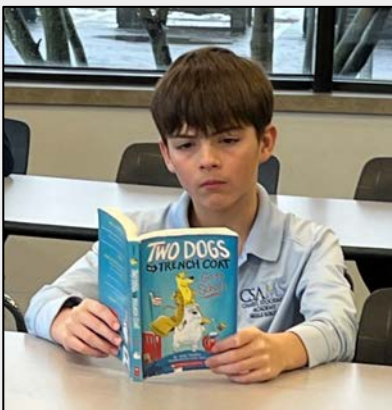

A Peek Into Our Advisory Life

We're Better Together

In January, we started an advisory activity that will ultimately take several weeks to complete that is focused on building community and connection. To start it off, we did some team building and community activities. One of the activities we did that seemed to be quite popular was the cup stacking challenge. Students worked in groups and using only string tied to a rubber band, they had to make a mini pyramid with six cups. For the first attempt, students were not allowed to talk to each other and had to figure out how to accomplish the task without words. Each group timed themselves to see how long it took to make the pyramid, and then they attempted the task again but were able to talk to each other. Afterwards we discussed strategies that worked well and what groups noticed as the biggest difference between not talking and talking, and how communication impacted their experience.



Notable Quotables

We spent some time in advisory going through a selection of quotes from Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Students read through the list and shared out what quote was their favorite and why, and then students worked in small groups to explain what their assigned quote meant in their own words and how it connected to all of us at CSAMS.



Getting Along With Others

In Term 2, we transition our focus to the Community, centered on the themes of Optimism and Getting Along with Others. Students will move from managing their own feelings to understanding the feelings of those around them. Specifically, we will target the skills necessary to use positive communication to interact effectively with peers. A major focus will be placed on the "work" of friendship: how to develop and maintain positive relationships through active listening and empathy. Finally, students will be equipped with support for conflict resolution, learning how to navigate disagreements with a helpful, optimistic mindset that prioritizes solution-seeking over blame.

For our Student Celebration for February, we recognize and celebrate the members of Kowalczyk Advisory who have been a part of our middle school band and choir! These individuals have dedicated their time and shared their talents through participating in our music program.

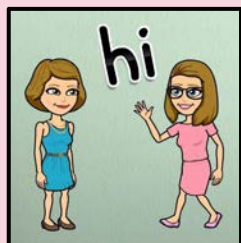
Beluga Ball Basket

Parent Support

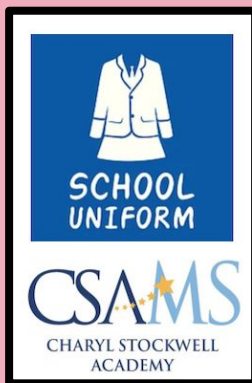
