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Introduction to AMCAS

The American Medical College Application Service (AMCAS) is administered by the AAMC and allows applicants to submit one primary application to most MD medical schools in the United States.

Through AMCAS, you will provide:

- Personal information
- Academic history
- Coursework
- Activities and experiences
- Personal statement
- Letters of recommendation
- MCAT scores
- School selections

Because admissions are often rolling, submitting a complete and accurate application early can provide a significant advantage.



Application Timeline

Jan – Mar

Finalize school list, draft personal statement, request letters

Apr – May

Open AMCAS account, gather transcripts, finalize activities

Late May

AMCAS opens — submit as early as possible

Jun – Aug

Verification period + secondary applications

Aug – Mar

Interviews

Oct – Apr

Admission decisions



Applicants who submit early generally receive secondary applications and interview invitations sooner.

Before You Begin

Before opening AMCAS, gather the following:

Academic Documents

- Official transcripts from every college attended

Activity Records

- Dates and hours
- Supervisor information
- Descriptions

Testing Information

- MCAT dates and scores

Letters & Personal Statement

- Identify letter writers early
- Have a polished draft ready



Preparation can save dozens of hours during the application process.

Selecting Medical Schools

One of the most important decisions is determining where to apply. A balanced school list is essential for maximizing success.

Academic Competitiveness

GPA and MCAT scores relative to school medians

State Residency

Public schools often favor in-state applicants

Mission Fit

Research, primary care, rural medicine, underserved communities

Geographic Preferences

Consider where you are willing to live for four years

Financial Considerations

Application fees can accumulate quickly



Work and Activities Section

One of the most important components of your application. You may enter up to 15 experiences.

- Clinical Experience
- Research
- Community Service
- Leadership
- Employment
- Teaching
- Shadowing
- Extracurricular Activities
- Military Service
- Honors and Awards

Writing Effective Descriptions

- Impact — What did you accomplish?
- Responsibility — What was your role?
- Growth — What did you learn?
- Reflection — Why was it meaningful?

Focus on quality, not simply listing duties. Admissions committees spend significant time reviewing this section.



Most Meaningful Experiences

You may designate 3 Most Meaningful Experiences that receive additional space for reflection.

Choose experiences that:

- Shaped your decision to pursue medicine
- Demonstrated significant personal growth
- Highlight your strongest qualities

Avoid selecting activities solely because they accumulated the most hours. Focus on impact rather than prestige.

Strong Categories

- Clinical experiences
- Community service
- Leadership roles
- Research experiences



The Personal Statement

Your opportunity to answer one question:

Why Medicine?

Strong Personal Statements Include:

- Reflection — Not simply storytelling
- Growth — How experiences shaped your perspective
- Authenticity — Your genuine motivations
- Cohesion — A clear narrative connecting experiences

Common Mistakes:

- Listing accomplishments
- Repeating your resume
- Overusing medical terminology
- Writing what you think admissions committees want to hear

The strongest essays are personal, reflective, and memorable.



Letters of Evaluation & MCAT Scores

Required Letters:

- 2 Science Faculty Letters
- 1 Non-Science Faculty Letter
- Additional: research mentors, physicians, supervisors

Choose writers who:

- Know you well
- Can discuss your strengths in detail
- Have observed your work closely

A strong letter from someone who knows you well is more valuable than a famous professor who barely remembers you.



MCAT Scores

- Scores automatically sent via your AAMC account
- All attempts are visible to participating schools
- Committees review overall score, section scores, and trends

Common AMCAS Mistakes

Submitting Late

One of the most damaging errors in a rolling admissions process

2

Poor Activity Descriptions

Use reflection, not duty lists

3

Weak School List

Apply strategically with a balanced list

4

Underestimating Secondaries

These significantly impact admissions decisions

5

Failing to Proofread

Small errors can leave negative impressions

6

Choosing Weak Letter Writers

Strong recommendations meaningfully strengthen applications
