ACA_BASELINE. One of the key issues in the shutdown is enhanced Affordable Care Act subsidies. Enhanced ACA subsidies are taxpayer-funded subsidies created as temporary COVID-19 relief in 2021. They currently reduce premiums for about 22 million Americans who don't get coverage through work, Medicare, or Medicaid when purchasing health insurance on the ACA marketplace. The subsidies are set to expire on December 31st.

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The Senate filibuster is a Senate rule that requires 60 votes to end debate on most bills so the Senate can vote on passage. This means a simple majority of 51 votes is not enough to pass most bills unless 60 votes to end debate are reached first.

Some items are exceptions in the Senate and can pass with a simple majority (e.g., budget reconciliation bills; most nominations).

Importantly, the filibuster is not in the U.S. constitution but is a Senate rule that has been in steady use in its current form since 1975.

Currently: Republicans hold 53 Senate seats. Under the filibuster rule, they need at least 7 Democratic votes to end debate and pass most legislation.
