1995

1997

Relocate again to a new base in Pok Fu Lam. Full time programme begins with work placements at St James Settlement. Vocational Education program begins. First art exhibition with Lorette Roberts at the Hong Kong Art Centre.

Growing Together was formed to link 4 related NGOs together: HKVC, CDC, Watchdog and Springboard.

2000

First respite programme at YWCA in TST. We become a member of HKCSS - Hong Kong Council for Social Services.

2001

SWD allocate a new facility in Sai Ying Pun. Carrie Lam, Head of SWD attended the opening. **HK\$1.2M** received from OSC (Operation Santa Claus) to provide a residential community home. 5 learners join a 4 day cruise to Hoi An and the Hainan Island perform at the Fringe Club. David and Wendy Nesbitt receive the **American Chamber of Commerce Ira Dan Kay Community Award.**

2003

First residential facilities opens in Discovery Bay.

2005

Residential facility closes in DB due to rent rises. **Preparation For Life Programme** is developed.

2006

Not all is lost! **SWD allocate new premises** for a permanent residential facility in Chai Wan. **Hong Kong Jockey Club** donate a Centre Bus. **Hong Kong Vocational Centre (HKVC)** changes its name to **The Nesbitt Centre Limited.**

2008

Talks begin with St John's Cathedral regarding a coffee shop within their grounds to provide employment for people with disability.

2010

OSC donate HK\$0.8M for The Nest at St John's Cathedral. **Art Project** at St John's Cathedral. Our **Sai Ying Pun Art Exhibition**, funded by ADC and led by Lizzie Bee and Lorette Roberts.

2012

We are the first recognised **Award for Young People User Unit** for SEN learners. Building begins at The Nest. Learners join a trip to China with Habitat for Humanity.

2013

The Nest and Café 8 (funded by SWD's 3EEs project) open. Learners participate in an **Educational Excursion to Chiang Rai**. TNC learners and staff participate in the **Green Power Hike.**



2014

The Nest passes HK\$1M in its first year. 2014 & 2015 we join the **iRun**.

2015

We received an **Outstanding Social Caring Organisation award** at Café 8.
Beneficiary of the GFI HK10s. Student's Art exhibition Glimpse of Hope opens at HKU. Learners participate in an **AnAn event** for autistic musicians and a learner plays piano at the **HIV Charity Concert at St John's Cathedral**.

2016

Two learners **join** our staff team.

The Nest at St Andrew's Church becomes a reality.

2020 Participation of **iRun** event. **The Nest Bakery** baked cakes to boost morale of HK's frontline hospital staff during the pandemic - "Cakes for Heroes, Baked by Heroes".

Café 8 won the Foodie Editor's Choice Award for Best Cafe. Implementation of **E-learning / Blended learning programme** due to the pre-cautionary measure of Covid-19. TNC developed our own e-learning programme.

ABOUT THE NESBITT CENTRE LIMITED

The Nesbitt Centre (TNC) is a leading charitable social services organisation in Hong Kong that provides Life Development needs of English speaking young adults with learning disabilities through educational, training, and vocational programmes. It was founded in 1993 and is headquartered in Sai Ying Pun. The Nesbitt Centre operates two learning facilities in Sai Ying Pun and Chai Wan. There are four social enterprises in the F&B sector. Our primary mission is to be an excellent provider of services for people with disabilities through 3 pillars - engage, enrich and empower people with learning difficulties and assist them to lead more meaningful lives in the broader community.

In 2013 with the opening of two social enterprises, The Nest and Café 8 (now known as Museum Café 8). The Nesbitt Centre started to provide meaningful vocational training and employment opportunities for our learners and those from our partner charities. The Nest at St Andrew's Church, Tsim Sha Tsui opened in November 2018 and our 4th social enterprise, a bakery in Sai Ying Pun, opened in March 2020.

In 2020 due to Covid-19 pandemic, E-learning / Blended Learning Program was developed and implemented to enable learners to continue their learning.

In March 2021 Craftable (@craftable.hk) was setup. This initiative is to nurture the learners' talents and creativity through crafts to enable another alternative work experience and opportunity.

We continue to look for new opportunities for the empowerment of our learners within the community and will update you with these happenings in future annual reports.

VISION: A society where people with disabilities have the same opportunities to develop and use their talents and skills as all other people

MISSION: To be an excellent provider of services for people with disabilities

To drive its long-term goal as an excellent provider of services for people with disabilities, The Nesbitt Centre Limited has set its focus on pursuing these four strategic directions to:

MESSAGE FROM CHAIRMAN

Firstly, thank you to all the staff of The Nesbitt Centre Limited, in our social enterprises and the Learning Centre, for their tireless hard work and endeavour in creating a more inclusive HK community for people with diverse needs. It was often challenging but there were some notable highlights and milestones in 2023-24.

David and Wendy Nesbitt founded our organisation in 1993 and so we marked our 30th Anniversary milestone in 2023 with a series of events including a Celebration Buffet Dinner at Museum Café 8. We were honoured to welcome Miss LEE Pui Sze, Charmaine, Director of Social and Welfare Department (SWD) as guest of honour. The SWD have been our long-term steadfast partners throughout the last 30 years.

In recent years our Learning Centre, located at Sai Ying Pun, has been in need of renovation and so we were delighted, and grateful, when The Jockey Club awarded us with a grant of over HK\$7M to revitalise the Centre so we can provide an enhanced level of service. Currently the Centre is undergoing construction work and due to reopen in autumn 2024. This project has been led by Christopher Liu, Board member, and I pay tribute to his vision, expertise, and energy in making this happen.

It is also good to report that interest in the Preparation for Life programme, having declined in the last 4 years, seems to be picking up again in 2024.

2023 also marked two more anniversaries, being 10 years since we started up our very first social enterprise in the grounds of St John's Cathedral, and 10 years also since Café 8 opened at the Maritime Museum.

Despite these milestones, operating food & beverage outlets in Hong Kong in 2023-24 remained a challenging environment. Providing employment opportunities for people of diverse abilities is at the heart of what we do and in 2024 our 4 social enterprises employed 50 people including 40 neurodiverse individuals.

Finally, I want to thank Anna Sampson, who served on The Nesbitt Centre Board of Directors for 4 years prior to resigning in early 2024, for her service and contribution to the success of the organisation.

Investing in the Future: Learning Centre Refurbishment

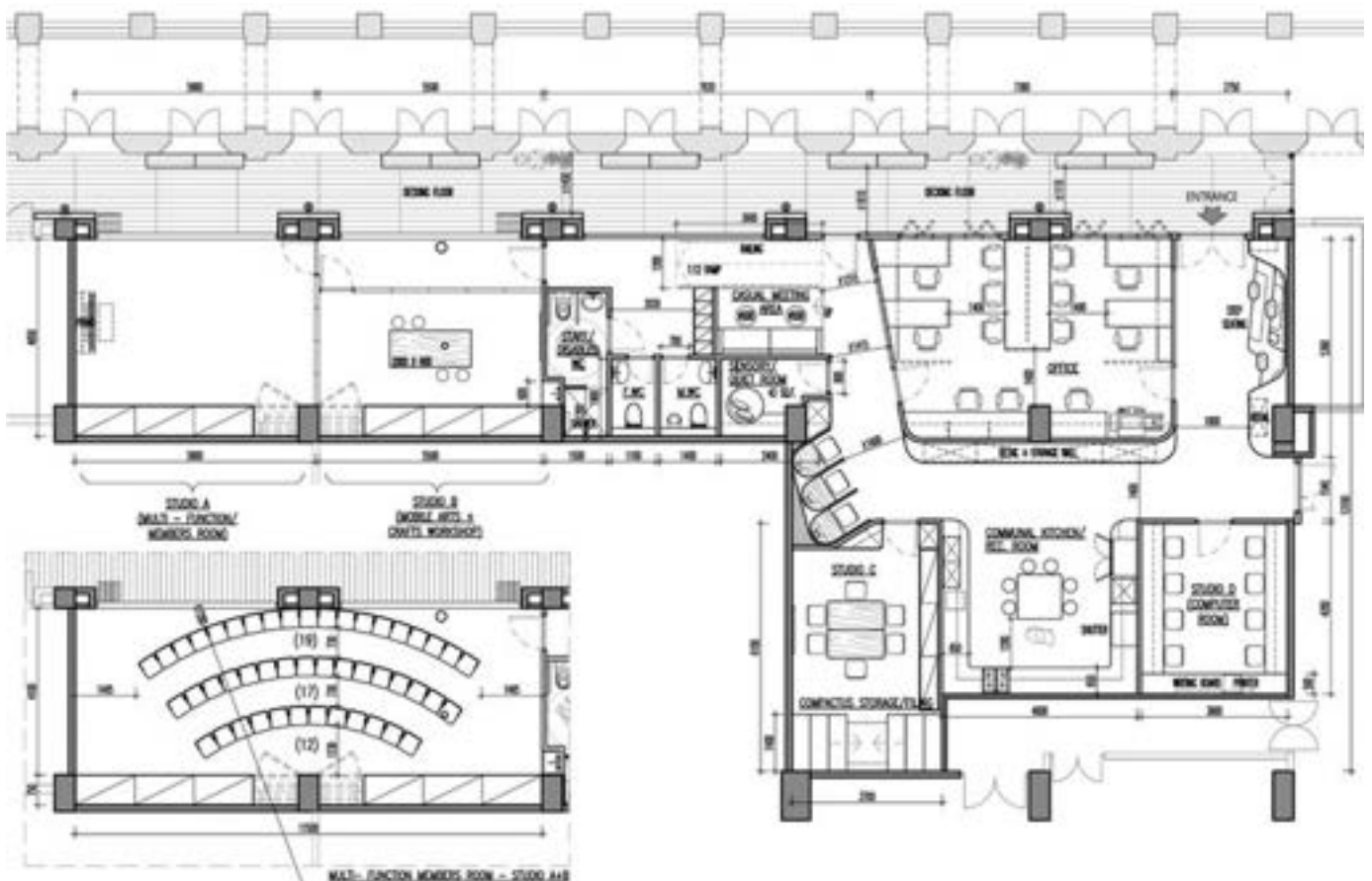

The evening culminated in a significant announcement by Francis Ng, Managing Director of Pacific Aegis Capital Management, pledging a HK\$1 million donation over five years to further the Centre's mission.

Employment of People with Disabilities (PwD) and Neurodiversities



The Nesbitt Centre Limited is committed to providing employment opportunities for individuals with disabilities and neurodivergence. Through our social enterprises, Museum Café 8 and The Nest Bakery, we have successfully employed a total of 8 individuals under the Work Orientation and Placement Scheme in the 2023/2024 fiscal year, and 9 in the previous year.

Our dedication to inclusive employment has been recognised by the Labour Department of Hong Kong, which awarded The Nesbitt Centre Limited a Certificate of Appreciation in January 2024 for our contributions to the Work Orientation and Placement Scheme.

By providing on-the-job training and support, we empower individuals with disabilities to develop essential skills, boost their confidence, and become active members of the community. Our goal is to foster a workplace where everyone has the opportunity to thrive.



ABOUT The Learning Centre

The Nesbitt Centre (TNC) provides a "Preparation for Life Programme" that helps adults with disabilities achieve independence and develop their own potential.

The Centre's hours are:

Monday – Thursday: 9:00am – 5:00pm

Friday: 9:00am – 4:00pm

The Learning Centre is located in Sai Ying Pun.

Pamela Youde (PY) Centre, Chai Wan – used as a Residential Training Centre.

The centre offers a variety of programmes and services, including:

Preparation for Life Programme: This programme helps learners develop the skills and confidence they need to live independently. Learners participate in activities such as cooking, cleaning, budgeting, and job searching.

Vocational Training Programme: This programme provides learners with the opportunity to gain work experience in a variety of settings. Learners work alongside staff with learning disabilities, and they receive support and training as needed.

Social and Recreational Activities: The centre offers a variety of social and recreational activities for learners, such as sports, arts and crafts, and music. These activities help learners to develop their social skills and to have fun.

The Learning Centre engages, enriches, and empowers people with learning disabilities in Hong Kong in a number of ways. The centre provides learners with the opportunity to:

Develop their skills and confidence: The centre's programmes and services help learners to develop the skills and confidence they need to live independently and to be successful in the workplace.

Become part of a community: The centre creates a sense of community for learners, where they can feel welcome and accepted. Learners can socialise with other people with learning disabilities, and they can learn from and support each other.

Make a difference in the community: Our social enterprises provide employment opportunities for learners, and they also raise awareness of learning disabilities in the community. This helps to break down stereotypes and discrimination, and it creates a more inclusive society for everyone.

The Learning Centre is a valuable asset to Hong Kong. The centre provides education, training, and employment opportunities for adults with learning disabilities, and it helps to make Hong Kong a more inclusive society for everyone.

The Learning Centre Sparks Discovery with *Hong Kong Dog Rescue (HKDR)*



Our learners were provided with exciting opportunities to learn about how to make friends with dogs at the Hong Kong Dog Rescue (HKDR) founded in 2003. The organisation aims to rescue, rehabilitate and re-home as many of the thousands of abandoned and unwanted dogs and puppies as possible, and to improve dog-human understanding by offering public education events. Our learners had so much fun learning to pet, brush, and walk the dogs.



Exploring New Avenues of Learning

Our learners participated in an Art Jamming activity with volunteers from Zurich Watch at Museum Café 8. Everyone had fun painting a beautiful scenery of a night sky with acrylic paints. Our learners also had the opportunity to express their style of painting on canvas while socialising with the volunteers.



During the Easter celebration, our learners had a great time being creative making their own rabbit ears with their unique designs. They also had an exciting egg hunting game looking for hidden Easter eggs candies and chocolates. The day ended with baking a delicious Easter bunny cake and decorated it with colourful frosting.

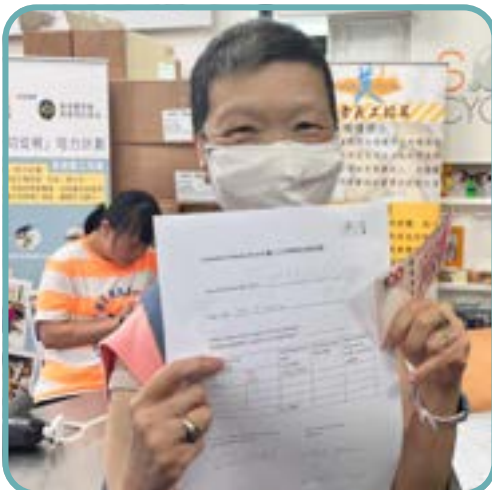
The Learning Centre beyond the walls

At The Soap Cycling Factory

The learners participated in the soap recycling process by helping to collect and prepare discarded hotel toiletries. They learned essential skills like using tools, selecting cleaning equipment, and transferring products into reusable bottles. The recycled shower gel and shampoo will be distributed to those in need within the community.



The Soap Cycling Workshop facilitated an intergenerational exchange between learners and the elderly. The elderly shared their soap-making expertise, while the learners reciprocated by teaching alcohol ink vase making, allowing both groups to learn and express their creativity.



The learners practiced good teamwork and positive work attitude as they learned from Vocational Education. At the end of the work placement, the learners signed their own work log sheet and received remuneration for their hard work.

The Learning Centre through Community Engagement

In July, a collaborative project with Grace Nursery School empowered participants to plan and execute a healthy eating game booth. With support from a HKU intern, participants learned game design, crafting, and public speaking. The successful event demonstrated their ability to educate and engage young children on healthy eating habits, demonstrating the programme's effectiveness in fostering practical skills and community impact.



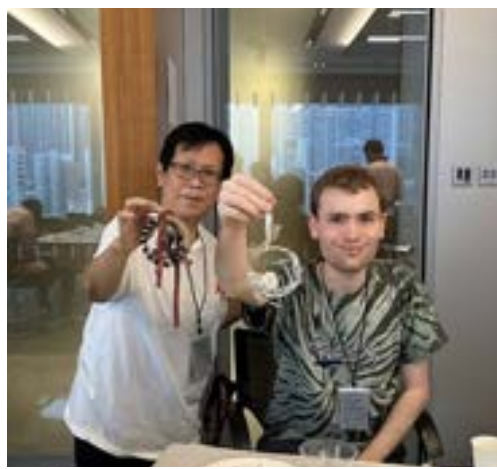
Learning Opportunity *At Citibank*

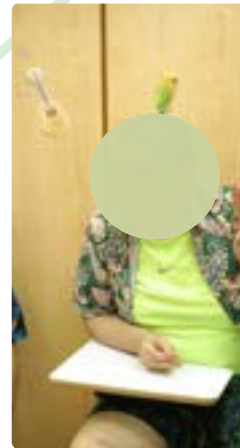

The Nesbitt Centre Limited runs four social enterprises that engage, enrich, and empower people with learning difficulties. These enterprises provide opportunities for people with learning difficulties to work in a community setting, learn new skills, and develop their confidence. They also engage the local community in the social enterprise model, creating a sense of inclusivity and integration.

The Nest at St John's Cathedral, Museum Café 8, The Nest at St Andrew's and The Nest Bakery, are all examples of how these social enterprises work. They employ people with learning difficulties and provide them with the opportunity to learn new skills and develop their confidence. The cafes also sell their products to the local community, providing fresh and delicious food and drinks while also generating income for the social enterprises.

In addition to providing employment opportunities, these social enterprises also enrich the lives of people with learning difficulties in a number of ways. They provide training and skills development, which can lead to better job prospects. They also offer opportunities to interact with the community, which can help people with learning difficulties feel more included and valued. Finally, they provide a sense of purpose and self-worth, which can boost confidence and motivation.

The social enterprises set up by Nesbitt Centre Limited are a valuable asset to the community. Museum Café 8, a rooftop cafe located at the Hong Kong Maritime Museum, is a social enterprise dedicated to empowering individuals with diverse abilities. The cafe provides valuable training and employment opportunities, fostering social inclusion and skill development for its staff.

Through community events and customer support, Museum Café 8 ensures its long-term sustainability.



A learner at the Learning Centre secured a valuable work placement at Museum Café 8 in November. This opportunity provided him with the chance to gain hands-on experience in the customer service industry, including learning essential skills like order taking and maintaining a clean and inviting environment.

On their first day, the learner demonstrated initiative and independence by successfully navigating the onboarding process, which included receiving their uniform and learning to use the clock-in system.

This achievement marks a significant milestone for this learner, and our centre remains committed to providing ongoing support as they continue to develop new skills and gain valuable experience through this opportunity.

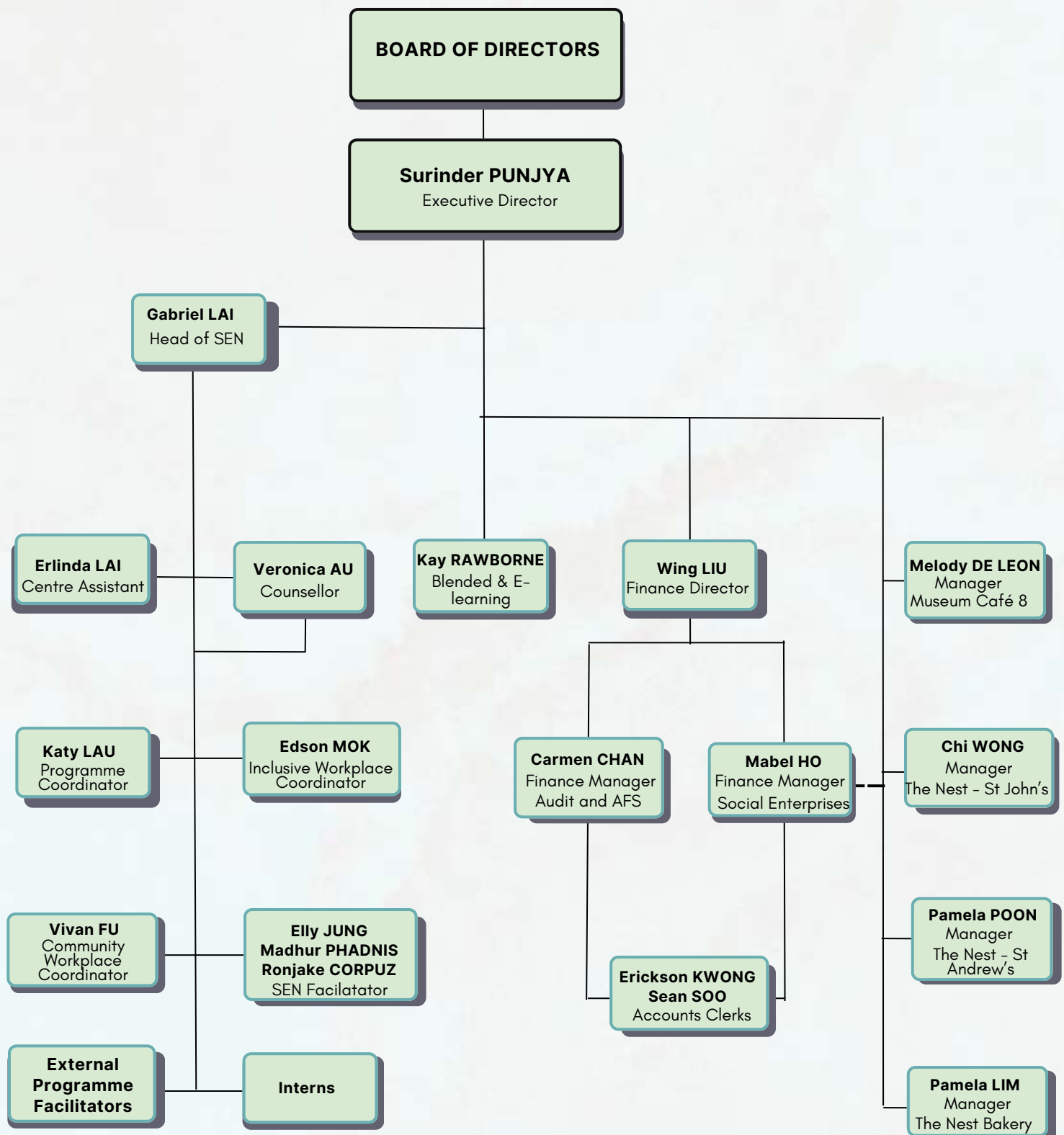

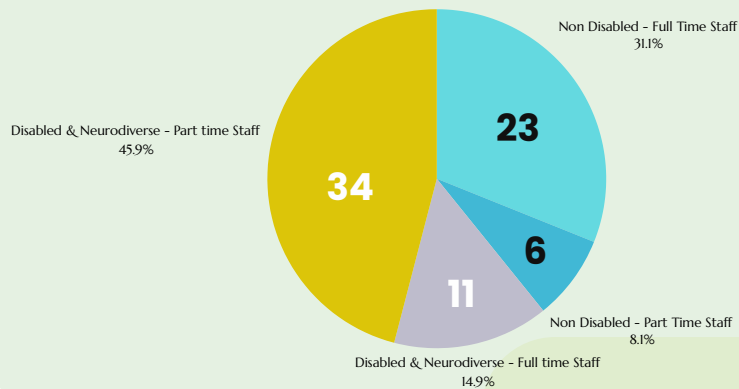

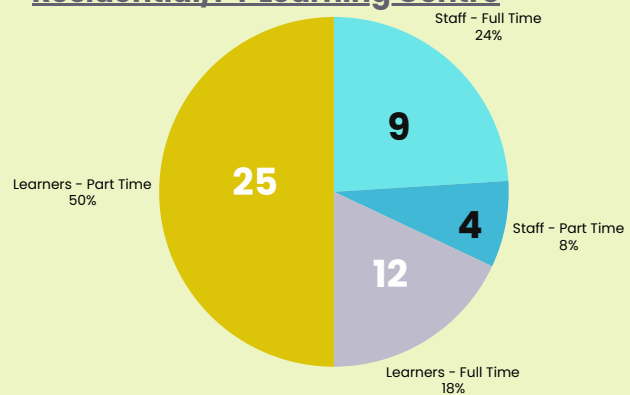

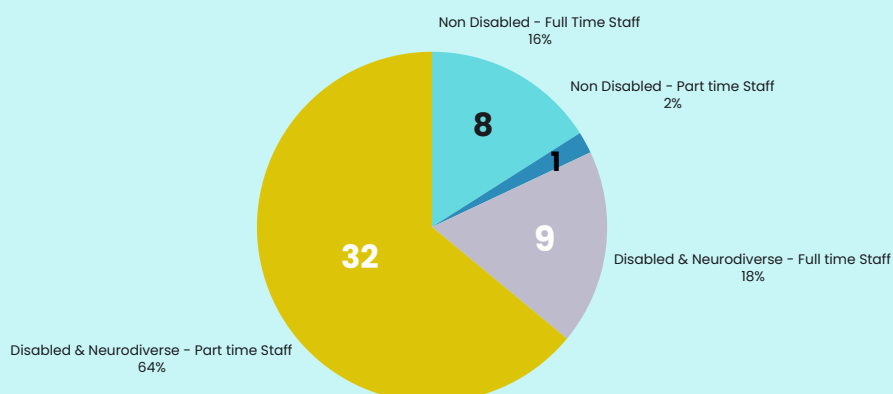
