### Sun Protection Policy

At West Rise Primary School we are totally committed to ensuring the welfare and safety of every child in our care. Whilst we fully appreciate the benefits and joy the sunshine gives we are also aware of potential challenges to wellbeing and safety.

Skin cancer is one of the most common cancers in the UK. Most skin cancers are caused by the UV radiation from the sun; therefore, if we protect ourselves from the sun we can reduce the risks. Children and young people's skin is more delicate and can easily be damaged.

Sunburn in childhood can double the risk of skin cancer but damage to the skin cannot be seen immediately because skin cancer can take years to develop. Although fair skinned people are more at risk from sun damage, sun protection is relevant to both fair and dark-skinned children.

This policy will be implemented throughout the year, but with particular emphasis in the warmer months.

At West Rise Primary School we acknowledge the importance of sun protections and want our staff and children to enjoy the sun safely. We will work with staff and parents to achieve this by:-

**Education** – learning about sun safety to increase knowledge and influence behaviour – these preventative measures are in place:

- Sun protection is discussed interactively with all children.
- Children engage in activities designed to promote sun safety behaviour.
- Parents and guardians will be sent a letter explaining what we are doing about sun protection and how they can help at the beginning of the summer term and during summer holidays.

**Protection and keeping safe** – providing an environment that enables children and staff to stay in the sun – ongoing:

- When the sun is strong we will encourage children to sit/play in the shade where it is available.
- We will use a pop-up gazebo to provide instant shade outside nursery. School has various shady areas outside in the playground.
- Children to have constant access to drinking water and are encouraged to drink plenty especially in hot weather.
- Fresh fruit can be another source of fluid.

## **Timetabling**

- The EYFS children will spend more time playing outside before 11:00am and after 2.00pm, and less time outside over lunch.
- The KS1/KS2 children will spend more time playing outside during the lunchtime period in addition to their break times.
- Decisions will be made during extremely hot sunny days as whether children should be outside for play.

## **Clothing**

- Nursery children are required to wear hats (Legionnaire style) and cover the ears, face and neck between 11.00am and 2.00pm.
- In school the children are encouraged to wear their hats whenever they go outside during the school day.
- We will provide hats to nursery children who forget their own.
- In nursery the children are encouraged to wear tops that cover their shoulders (vest tops and strappy tops are discouraged).
- In school the children are encouraged to remove their school jumpers or cardigans before going out to play. School summer dresses are encouraged as are school shorts during the summer term.
- Staff to wear hats outside to reinforce role modelling.
- Children are allowed to wear UV protection sunglasses and parents are asked to give written permission for this.

## **Sunscreen**

- Parents are asked to apply sunscreen of a minimum of SPF 50+ and with a UVA rating of 4++++ upwards to give their child maximum protection from the sun's UVA rays. We ask that parents apply sunscreen BEFORE bringing their child to nursery or school.
- There are sunscreens on the market that can be applied just once a day in this case there is no need to bring a named sunscreen into nursery or school for your child.
