## Operation Christmas Child: Sharing Hope Through Giving

Elementary students packed boxes in their classrooms and prayed over each one, asking God to use these gifts to share His love. Our sixth graders became **Servant Workers**, traveling to **Triumph Church** to assist in packing and loading shoeboxes for shipment to **Chicago and beyond**. This hands-on experience was a highlight for **Kynlee Simmons** and **Eva Wagner**, who loved serving in such a meaningful way.

## Filling the Dome, Feeding Families

**Fill the Dome** is a community-wide food drive led by MASA (Metro Area Student Association), a coalition of student councils from across the region. Park Christian's representatives, **Mollie Rogness** and **Kate Nelson**, helped lead the charge this year. After five days of spirited competition, Park Christian students collected **over 10,000 food items** to support families in need. High school classes competed for the ultimate prize—a day off school—by bringing in donations and then transporting them to the Fargodome to create themed displays.

The **senior class** took the top spot, contributing more than **4,000 items** and designing a creative display inspired by the **Batman bat signal**, perfectly matching this year's "**Soup-er Hero**" theme.

Once the displays were complete, Park Christian's student council returned to the Dome to **pack boxes filled with a balanced mix of food items**—enough to feed a family. These boxes were distributed directly from the Dome parking lot on Tuesday, a new system that ensured families received thoughtfully packed meals. It was rewarding to know that each box was prepared by one of our students.

## Hands-On Explorations

Our 8th graders enjoyed an exciting day at the **Citywide Career Expo**, exploring healthcare, technology, and skilled trades. **Mrs. Titus** and **Mrs. Steffen** guided students as they engaged with professionals, tested simulators, and asked thoughtful questions.

"I wished I had more time," said **Gavin Selzer** as he tried out several simulators. "The variety of careers was amazing!" Nearby, **Hannah Nielsen** shared her enthusiasm: "I'd like to pursue a medical career. The robotic surgery simulator was my favorite!"

## Life Skills in Family Living

Students are gaining valuable, real-life skills in **Mrs. Steffen's** Family Living class. This hands-on course teaches simple stitching and ironing techniques as students work toward making their own pillows. Some plan to keep their pillows, others are excited to give them as gifts, and a few even hope to donate theirs to those in need.

**Ruby Nelson** shared her excitement about the project: she loved making her pillow and seeing it daily on her bed. When asked about the class, many students said they enjoy learning a new skill and creating something with their own hands. This project not only builds confidence but also **encourages creativity, generosity, and practical life skills** students can use for years to come.



## Building Knowledge and Confidence

**Mrs. Howe's** Geography classes brought history to life through their Castle Project, where students built detailed replicas of famous castles and presented them to their classmates. As they shared fun facts, students learned why castles were originally built for **protection and leadership**, and how many are used today as museums, landmarks, and places of gathering. 

# A Deep Hope Rooted in Christ



## Meeting Jesus Right Where We Are

Miss Hoiberg's Deep Hope for her students is that they would truly know Jesus—not just know about Him, but experience Him as both Father and Friend. She prays that their relationship with Christ would shape who they are and lead them to become more like Him, spurring them on to love those around them well.

Each week, students spend intentional time in **Worship in the Word** using RightNow Media. During this time, Miss Hoiberg emphasizes an important truth: Jesus knows each student right where they are. He meets them in their questions, their struggles, and their joys, inviting them into a personal relationship that is real and meaningful.

During one of these moments, Miss Hoiberg asked her students what it means to have a personal relationship with Christ. One student responded, "It's to know Him personally and to understand what that really means. It needs to be your own." That response has stayed with her over the years and became a foundation for her deep hope for every student.

Miss Hoiberg believes **true life transformation happens through the work of the Holy Spirit** when students come to know Jesus personally. This belief is lived out through Teaching for Transformation (TfT), which gives students opportunities to **practice being the hands and feet of Jesus** in authentic and intentional ways.

Guided by **Matthew 4:19**, "Come, follow me," Miss Hoiberg's Storyline reminds students that Jesus walks the path with us—knowing us fully and never leaving our side, even when the journey is difficult or bumpy along the way. Miss Hoiberg teaches students that **Jesus fills us up so that we can fill others up**. Loving God and loving others begins with following Jesus, who is always walking the path with us.
