




Little Tree by Loren Long (2015) Ages: 3-6 years





The Little Yellow Leaf by Carin Berger (2008) Ages: 3-6 years


If You Find a Leaf by Aimée Sicuro (2022) Ages: 3-7 years

Every year, gusts of wind blow colorful autumn leaves to the ground. Some leaves make a crunch under foot, and others are so beautiful they deserve to be saved. In this story a young artist draws inspiration from the leaves she collects and every leaf sparks a new idea. She imagines turning a Japanese Zelkova leaf into a boat to sail far away, a Honey Locust leaf into a swing to sway in the gentle breeze, and an American Basswood leaf into a hot air balloon to float high above the trees.

Something Wild by Molly Ruttan (2023) Ages: 3-9 years

Hannah loves to play her violin—as long as no one is watching. On the day of the recital, she's wishing something wild would happen so she won't have to go. Perhaps a dolphin will jump out of the fountain and carry her away, or a giant rabbit will abscond with her violin. 





Walter the Baker by Eric Carle (1972) Ages: 5-7 years

Walter the Baker is famous for his breads, rolls, cookies, tarts, and pies. The Duke and Duchess especially love his warm sweet rolls, delivered fresh to their castle every morning. But one day the cat spills the milk, and Walter is forced to serve the Duke and Duchess rolls made with water. After one bite the Duke throws down his roll in disgust and summons Walter to the castle. He threatens to banish the baker unless he can take the same dough and make a good-tasting roll that the rising sun can shine through three times. Will Walter succeed in his task, or will he have to leave his town forever?

Chester Van Chime Who Forgot How to Rhyme by Avery Monsen (2021) Ages: 4-6 years There once was a youngster named Chester van Chime. Who woke up one day and forgot how to rhyme. The Happy Lion by Louise Fatio (1954) Ages: 3-7 years

Naturally, when the lion finds his door open, he decides it would only be proper to visit all his friendly neighbors in return. But, wait—sacré bleu! Why is everyone fleeing in terror?

Tofu Takes Time by Helen H. Wu (2022) Ages: 4-7 years

CLICK CLACK WHIRRRR . . . Lin and her grandma, NaiNai, are making tofu from scratch! When NaiNai goes through each step, from blending soybeans with water to molding curd into shape, Lin gradually becomes impatient. But she soon discovers that making tofu not only takes time, but also takes the whole universe! It takes the seed from soil and sunshine, the cloth from thread and fiber, weight and space, books of words and pictures. And most of all, it takes spending lovely time with her beloved grandmother.






The Crayon Man by Natascha Biebow (2019) Ages: 6-9 years

Finding Grateful by Dianne White (2019) Ages: 5-8 years

What does grateful look like? How does it feel? How do you find it?
