

Great Barrington Farmers Market

<u>The Great Barrington Farmers Market</u> runs every Saturday Mother's Day weekend thru the second week in November. The market is located at 18 Church St - just behind the Lee Bank on Main St.

The market includes vendors from local farms, including Indian Line Farm, Chaseholm Farm, Off the Shelf Farm, and Cricket Creek Farm, along with bakeries including Berkshire Mountain Bakery, Our Daily Bread Bakery, and Pastries by Hanna.

Other vendors include, Justamere Tree Farm, Ayakoito Japanese Kitchen, and After Hours Great Barrington, just to name a few.

Please note - For our customer's safety and convenience, the Town of Great Barrington has asked that we make every effort to ease traffic on Main Street for people who are visiting the market on Saturday morning.

The intersection of Church and Main will be closed. Customers coming from the North on Main Street are asked to turn left on Pleasant Street to River Street to Church Street. Customers coming from the South are asked to turn right on Bridge Street to School Street to Church Street.

There is available parking on Pleasant Street, River Street, Church Street, and School Street, Behind Searle's Middle School, on the Jane Iredale lot adjacent to their warehouse, and in the parking lot on School Street South of the Iredale headquarters building.

W.E.B Du Bois Sculpture Project

Join us on Saturday, July 19th at 2:00 pm for the official unveiling of the W.E.B. Du Bois monument at the Mason Public Library in downtown Great Barrington!

From the W. E. B. Du Bois Sculpture Project - W. E. B. Du Bois (1868-1963),

born and educated in Great Barrington, was the first African American to earn a Ph.D. from Harvard achieving world fame as a sociologist, historian, and founder of the NAACP. A prolific author and advocate for the full integration of Blacks into American society, his collection of essays, The Souls of Black Folk, is a seminal work in African American literature.

Three years ago, an independent group of local citizens began raising funds to celebrate Great Barrington's most famous native son by erecting a monument to him in front of the Mason Public Library.

In partnership with the town, the group has repaired the library's crumbling steps, added a custom-made, curved marble bench for community events, and will now place a life-size statue of W.E.B. Du Bois on that bench, where visitors from all over can pay homage to him.


June's poetry reading features Carol Diehl, Sue Landers, and Zoe Tuck.

Carol Diehl is an exhibiting artist and art critic who has been a blogger and early slam performance poet. A former Contributing Editor to Art in America, she has taught both painting and writing at Bennington College and the Graduate Fine Arts Program of the School of Visual Arts (NY). Carol has been Visiting Artist and lecturer at, among others, Yale University, Stanford University, University of Pennsylvania, Rochester institute of Technology, and the University for the Creative Arts (U.K.). Her book, "Banksy: Completed," was published by The MIT Press in 2021.

<u>Sue Landers</u> is a poet and a pedestrian. Her latest book, *What to Carry Into the Future*, emerged from riding every New York City subway line from end to end. Sue is a former executive director of Lambda Literary. She is also the author of *Franklinstein*, *248 mgs.*, a panic picnic and Covers. Her chapbooks include Sidewalk Naturalist, *15: A Poetic Engagement with the Chicago Manual of Style* and *What I Was Tweeting While You Were On Facebook*.

Zoe Tuck was born in Texas, became a person in California, and now lives in Massachusetts. She is the author of *Bedroom Vowel*, *Terror Matrix* and the chapbooks *Vape Cloud of Unknowing* and *The Book of Bella*. Zoe is the co-editor of Hot Pink Magazine with Emily Bark Brown. She teaches literature and creative writing classes through her school, Threshold Academy.

Opportunities & Resources for Orgs – June 2025

Farmers Market Promotion Program - funds projects that develop, coordinate, and expand direct producer-to-consumer markets to help increase access to and availability of locally and regionally produced agricultural products. Awards range from \$50,000 to \$500,000. Deadline: June 27, 2025.

Levitt Foundation - accepting applications for multi-year, \$120K Levitt Music Series Grants, which are open to U.S.-based nonprofits to activate underused public spaces through free outdoor concerts in towns and cities across America. Deadline: June 30th, 2025.

Destination Development capital grant program - \$6 million available in FY26 for nonprofit and municipal applicants to expand, construct, restore, or renovate Massachusetts tourism destinations and attractions. Projects located within a

designated Cultural District may receive priority consideration.

Deadline: July 9th, 2025.

Artist Opportunities for June and July 2025

Center for Contemporary Printmaking - The Center for Contemporary Printmaking is fortunate to provide a dedicated studio for our Residency Program: the Helen Frankenthaler Printmaking Cottage. Within this space Resident Artists have the opportunity to produce a body of work in a supportive atmosphere for creative growth and development—using traditional as well as innovative printmaking techniques. The intention of the residency is to offer artists uninterrupted time and privacy 24/7 in a well-equipped studio with onsite living accommodations.

deadline: July 1st, 2025.

AXS Film Fund - This program is for creators of color in documentary filmmaking or nonfiction new media who identify as living with a disability. We seek to bring visibility to creators who are oftentimes overlooked. While we prefer that a person of color living with a disability is a key contributor to the project, we welcome diverse teams to apply.

Each year we award up to five creators with grants of up to \$10,000 each to assist them in finishing their projects in any stage of production.

Deadline: July 31st, 2025.




