What's a Sharp?

Any device or object that is used to puncture or lacerate the skin. Some examples you may use as a diabetic include needles, syringes, lancets and auto injectors.

Why is Sharp Disposal So Important?

According to the FDA, up to 850,000 people are injured every year by sharps due to improper disposal at home. Disposing of sharps safely protects you, your loved ones, and even people outside your home (such as the garbageman) from accidental sticks that can cause serious infections.

Tips

Don't Overfill

Overfilling your sharps disposal container increases the risk of accident sticks. It's time to get a new one when your container is ¾ of the way full.

• Travel Smart

Be prepared when leaving home. Always carry a small, travel-size sharps disposal container in case other options are not available.

In a Pinch

Strong plastic containers with lids like laundry detergent bottles can be used to temporarily store sharps until you can get your hands on a new sharps disposal container.

Make Disposal Easy

There are several sharp disposal organizations that offer convenient mail-in or pick-up programs. Do a quick online google search to find one that's right for you.
