

## Article Review Outline

### 1. Title and Citation

- Give your review a title that hints at the article's topic or take.
- Add the full citation in the style your instructor wants: APA, MLA, or Chicago.
- Include a DOI or URL if you have one.

### 2. Introduction

- Start with the article's title, the author's name, and where it was published.
- Briefly explain what the article is about.
- Tell the reader what your review will focus on: analysis, critique, or both.
- Add a line of background so they know why this article is worth reviewing.

### 3. Summary

- Share the main point or argument in your own words.
- Pull out the key evidence or examples the author uses.
- Mention the method or approach if it's a research-based piece.
- Keep this part factual and save your opinions for later.

### 4. Critique / Analysis

- Say whether the argument holds together.
- Talk about how strong the evidence is and if it's relevant.
- Note if the writing is clear and well-organized.
- Point out both strengths and weak spots.
- Compare it to other ideas or research you know.
- Mention any bias, missing pieces, or unanswered questions.

### 5. Conclusion

- Wrap up your overall opinion of the article.
- Remind the reader of its best points and biggest flaws.
- Say why it matters and who should read it.

### 6. References

- List the article you reviewed plus any other sources you mentioned.
- Match the citation style you used in the rest of your review.
