As I reflect on 2025, I am filled with gratitude – for our dedicated staff, Board of Directors, generous donors, corporate sponsors, family foundations, community partners, and the thousands of individuals and families who place their trust in CommUnify every day.

2025 was a year that tested us. Federal funding volatility underscored how vital community action programs are to the families we serve. At the same time, Santa Barbara County's rising cost of living continued to outpace wages for early childhood educators, making it increasingly difficult to recruit and retain qualified Head Start teachers. Despite the extraordinary dedication of our staff, job vacancies led to classroom closures, limiting our ability to serve our most vulnerable children during the years that matter most.

Yet even amid these challenges, I found countless reasons for hope. You gave us hope.

One of the 2025 accomplishments I am most proud of is how we leveraged technology to implement a true "no wrong door" approach, ensuring that every individual and family is screened for their full range of needs from their very first contact with us. Whether someone reaches out for child care, early education, utility bill payment assistance, behavioral health services, or home repairs for a beloved elder, we can now connect them more quickly to the comprehensive services available across our organization. **Our whole person approach helps clients achieve lasting stability and well-being, and feel seen.**

What inspires me most, however, is our people. Every day, I witness the compassion, resilience, and unwavering commitment of our employees who go above and beyond to make a difference in the lives of our county's residents.

As we move through 2026, I am optimistic. We will continue strengthening partnerships, embracing innovation, advocating for our community, and ensuring that every person who comes through our doors is met with dignity, compassion, and hope.

Thank you for believing in CommUnify and for being part of this journey. Together, we are building a stronger, healthier, and more connected community where everyone can thrive.

New Head Start Center coming to Santa Maria in 2028!

Exciting news! We're opening a new Head Start/Early Head Start center in Santa Maria that will serve up to 70 children ages 0-5!

CommUnify has purchased property at 420 East Fesler Street in Santa Maria to establish a new Head Start/Early Head Start campus. This location will provide much needed free child care and early childhood education for 70 low-income children from families in northeast City of Santa Maria and nearby unincorporated areas. Through the gold-standard Head Start/Early Head Start program, CommUnify will prepare these children for future academic success by ensuring they are kindergarten-ready.

The new Fesler Street Head Start center will:

- Offer four renovated classrooms: two for 3- and 4-year-olds and two for infants and toddlers.
- Provide the children with nutritious meals and snacks, regular medical, vision, dental, and cognitive development screenings.
- Offer wraparound services for the children's families, including behavioral health through CommUnify's Family Wellness Program.
- Provide full year/full day services to accommodate working parents.
- Employ 22 staff members, creating new job opportunities in the community!

Delivers free or low-cost energy-saving upgrades and safety improvements to homes and apartments.

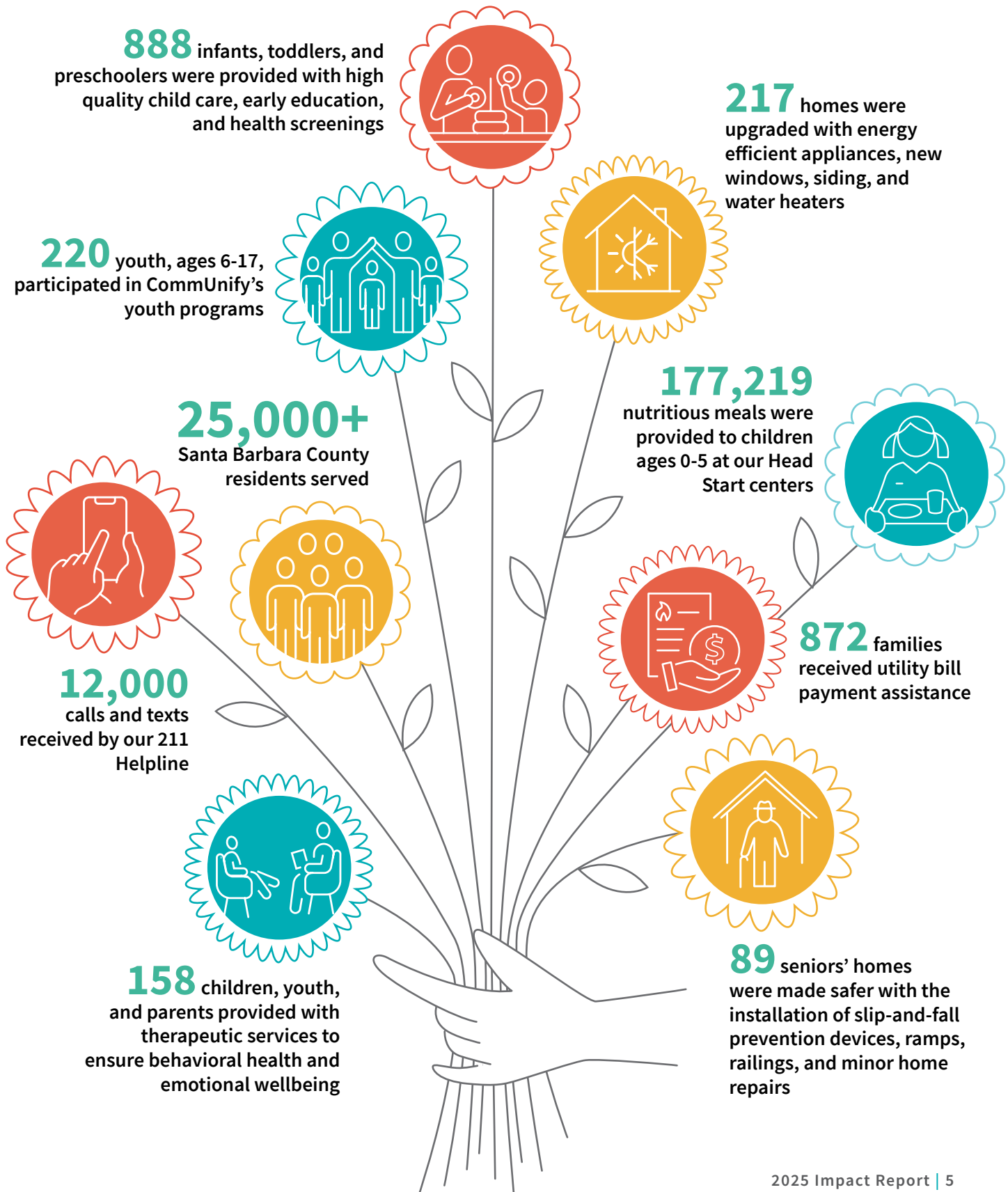

Since 2014, **CommUnify** has proudly operated the **211 Santa Barbara County Health & Human Services Helpline**. Available 24/7 and in more than 150 languages, **211 is a trusted connector to free, confidential information and referrals for essential resources**, such as housing, food, healthcare, mental health services, transportation, and financial assistance.

211 also plays a critical role in emergency preparedness, response, and recovery.

In partnership with the Santa Barbara County Office of Emergency Management (OEM), CommUnify provides verified disaster information and resource referrals before, during, and after emergencies. Whether responding to wildfires, storms, Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS), or pandemics, 211 helps keep residents informed while connecting them to shelters, recovery services, and other essential needs.

And **our newly launched Santa Barbara County 211 Youth Resource App**, designed in collaboration with youth for teens and young adults ages 12–24, is available for free on your preferred app store.

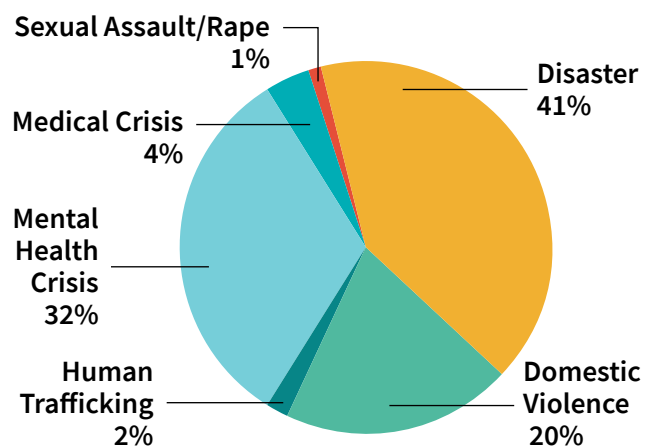

CommUnify is excited to announce our new Enhanced Care Management (ECM) offering in partnership with CenCal Health. ECM is a comprehensive suite of supportive services designed to help Medi-Cal eligible individuals and families achieve greater stability, health, and well-being.

ECM provides personalized, long-term support through a dedicated care coordinator, community connections, and ongoing follow-up. Rather than addressing only immediate needs as in traditional healthcare models, the ECM approach focuses on developing a personalized care plan to help clients overcome barriers and create lasting well-being. An assigned Lead Care Manager coordinates the necessary services and resources to ensure the client's physical, emotional, and everyday needs are met.

CommUnify's ECM services are available to eligible Medi-Cal (CenCal Health) members who meet at least one of these qualifying criteria:

- ✓ Experiencing homelessness and/or at risk of losing housing
- ✓ Living with serious mental health and/or substance abuse challenges
- ✓ Justice-involved youth
- ✓ Children and youth with complex medical issues, and/or who are in the foster care or welfare system
- ✓ Pregnant and post-partum individuals at elevated risk for adverse outcomes
- ✓ Have multiple chronic health conditions and/or frequent hospitalizations
- ✓ Reside in a long-term care or skilled nursing facility or are transitioning back into the community



CommUnify's ECM offering is another step in our “no wrong door” and whole person approach to ensure Santa Barbara County residents can thrive.

FAMILY WELLNESS

CommUnify's Behavioral Health Services Department provides compassionate and culturally responsive mental health and therapeutic care for children enrolled in Head Start. We understand the unique challenges that come with parenthood and child development. This is why our team of highly qualified, licensed, bilingual and bi-cultural therapists and mental health caseworkers work closely with families to provide trauma-informed care, early intervention, and comprehensive case management services. Our goal is to create a safe and supportive space, where children and adults can thrive emotionally, socially, and developmentally.

EARLY HEAD START | HEAD START

Through Head Start and Early Head Start, CommUnify's Children's Services Division provides high-quality early education and child care for eligible low-income children ages 0-5 and supportive services for their families, including pregnant women, all at no cost. Our programs include developmentally appropriate learning, nutritious meals, and support for children with special needs. We also offer health, dental, and vision screenings, as well as family services to promote long-term success.

“ Since 1987, I've had the privilege of working in Guadalupe, the town I grew up in. The Head Start community isn't just my job, but my second family. Head Start opened the door for me to grow from an Assistant Teacher to a Site Supervisor. Head Start is not just a program; it's a movement of people who refuse to let zip codes determine destinies, and who know that children thrive when their whole family thrives. And when our local families thrive, our local economy thrives. **Head Start provides a path to upward mobility.**

Since 1967, CommUnify's Head Start program has helped more than 55,000 children (ages 0 to 5 years old) become kindergarten-ready, and has helped their parents attain their own education and career goals. Head Start provides high-quality early child care for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers, health and wellness checks, nutrition, and wrap-around services to Santa Barbara County's most vulnerable children and their parents, free of charge.

Adopt-A-Campus

We invite you to be a part of the joy and positive impact that Head Start creates by joining our new Adopt-A-Campus program. With 18 campuses spread across the county currently serving 600+ children, it's easy to volunteer at or donate to a Head Start center near you.

Philanthropic opportunities range from \$500 - \$100,000. A few such examples are:

- **\$500 - \$1,500** = Be a **Back-to-School Supply Hero** or sponsor a **Teacher Appreciation Day**.
- **\$2,500 - \$5,000** = Be an **Art & Music Hero** by helping us provide stipends for music and art teachers to come into our classrooms to work with the children, or be a **Safety First Hero** and sponsor loaner car seats for our families in case of emergencies.
- **\$5,000 - \$10,000** = Be a **Farm-to-Table Hero** and help us encourage healthy eating habits, or be an **Experience the World Hero** and underwrite trips for our children and families to the zoo, museums, and other experiential learning sites.
- **\$25,000** = **Fund-a-Child Hero**. Underwrite the cost for one child to attend Head Start for a full year. (Can be paid in monthly installments.)

We also welcome in-kind donations of new toys and new books, and clean clothing in good condition.

Volunteer opportunities include reading to the children, doing activities such as art, crafts, music, gardening, helping with site clean-up days, prep for “back to school” month, and more. Volunteers should be 16 or older. These are great activities for corporate teams!

We offer a vital safety net—helping individuals and families keep their homes—through utility bill payment and rental payment assistance, provide weatherization services and minor home repairs and energy efficient appliances free of charge, install slip-and-fall prevention devices to keep our seniors safe, and teach financial literacy. Beyond immediate support, we provide education, mentoring, and resources to build long-term stability and empower our community toward economic self-sufficiency.

CommUnify's Family and Youth Services programs focus on creating stability and brighter futures for families with youth (ages 10 – 21) facing challenges stemming from trauma and lack of resources. Our dedicated staff provide consistent, caring, and culturally responsive support to help young people build resilience and access vital services, through a variety of trauma-informed curricula and the Positive Youth Development framework. Our programs focus on mentoring, career advising, paid work opportunities, teaching skills to parenting youth, and helping our clients move away from potential gang or justice involvement and toward education and self-growth.

“ The Empower U program helped me in a lot of ways. It helped me get a job, learn how to talk to people, and showed me how to connect with the right people to find work. Being able to earn a paycheck meant I could help my family too; I give half of my check to my parents because they've always been there for me. Working with Pablo was amazing. 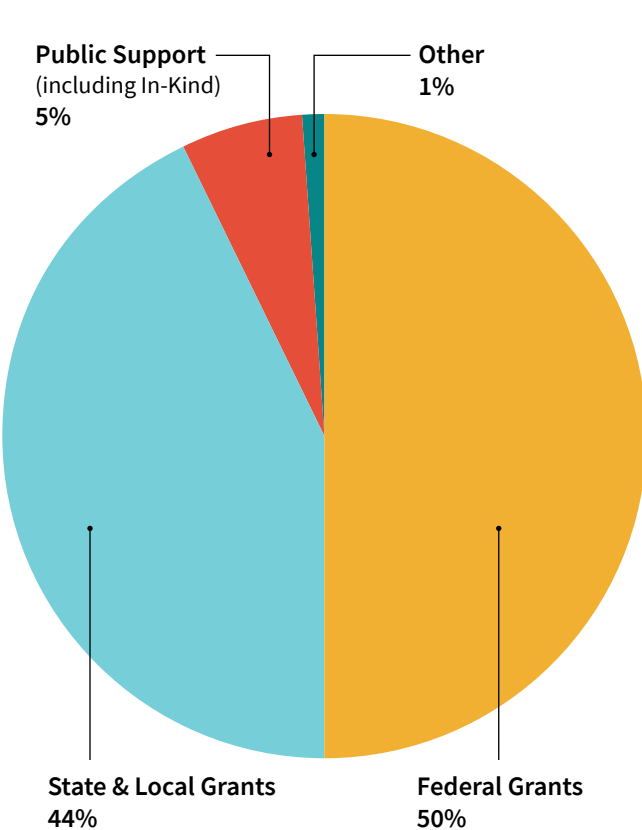

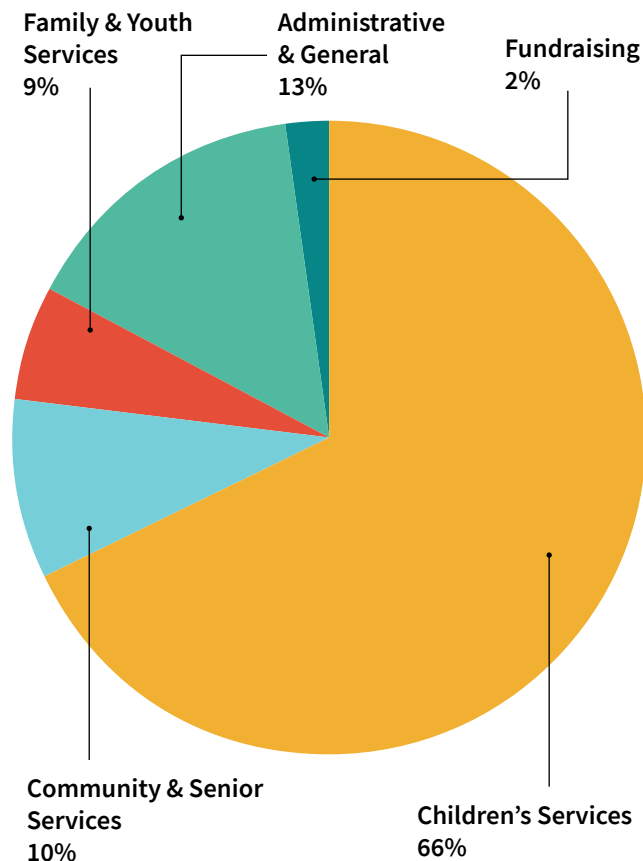
