

Empowering cancer care teams through education


Cancer care is always evolving, and ongoing education guarantees that patients receive the most advanced, compassionate care possible. Thanks to donations totaling more than \$20,000, health care providers at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre have new opportunities to enhance their skills.

One of the beneficiaries, psychologist Dr. Karen Zhang, attended the Canadian Association of Psychosocial Oncology Conference with Foundation funding. There, she gained advanced knowledge in holistic, patient-centred cancer care. Her patients now benefit from the conference's insights every day.

Advanced care for critically ill heart patients

Hamilton General Hospital has the largest integrated stroke program in Ontario, treating some of the sickest patients from across the province. Thanks to a donation from the Doug Lamon Foundation, the hospital's Cardiac Unit now has a new continuous renal replacement therapy (CRRT) machine, a cutting-edge tool that provides continuous kidney support for critically ill patients.

When time is critical, this technology ensures patients receive the best possible treatment fast.

Advancing research to improve seniors' lives

As a national leader in aging research, St. Peter's Hospital's GERAS Centre is transforming how we care for older adults with complex medical needs. Thanks to donor support in 2024, this critical work is moving forward.

This investment supports researchers at GERAS as they develop innovative strategies to improve mobility, cognition and overall quality of life for aging patients. Their work is helping create better models of care that enable seniors to stay healthier, stronger, and more independent for longer.

Helping kids with cancer get care faster

A cancer diagnosis changes everything for a family. But thanks to a generous \$150,000 gift from the Steven Young Trust Fund, young patients at McMaster Children's Hospital's Pediatric Oncology Clinic will receive chemotherapy treatments with shorter wait times.

This funding helps support the creation of a new Pediatric Oncology-Pharmacy Satellite Chemotherapy Suite, streamlining the preparation of life-saving treatments.

For parents facing the unimaginable, knowing that treatment is ready when their child needs it - and that support is available - means everything.

Your support at work

Critical care expansion

Nearly \$1 million in donor support provided essential equipment to upgrade the B3 Ward at Juravinski Hospital into a Level 2 Critical Care Unit, providing care for critically ill patients while alleviating strain on the hospital's Intensive Care Unit.

Robotic revolution

A generous gift in 2023 from Hamilton and District Senior Citizens' Home RAMBYNAS Inc. brought state-of-the-art rehabilitation tools to Hamilton General Hospital's Regional Rehabilitation Centre in 2024, including a cutting-edge robotic exoskeleton. This technology helps patients who have experienced health care crises like stroke, brain and spine injuries, and amputations regain mobility faster, improving circulation, reducing pain, and enhancing joint health. The Regional Rehabilitation Centre is now one of the first in Canada to offer this groundbreaking resource.

A bold leap for autism research

In its inaugural year, the National Centre for Autism Collaboration hosted the 10th Canadian Autism Leadership Summit. The event mobilized 290 advocates – including self-advocates, service providers, and policymakers - to craft evidencebacked policy notes for Canada's forthcoming National Autism Strategy, putting lived experience at the heart of national change.





A warm welcome

A new pilot program created in partnership between the Foundation and local organizations is providing a safe, staffed overnight space for individuals discharged from the hospital with nowhere to go. The Hub on Vine Street is reducing emergency room strain and improving patient outcomes. So far, it's connected over 40 individuals with resources beyond hospital walls.

Backstage pass to medical innovation

This year, the Foundation hosted dynamic Speaker Series events, offering exclusive insights from leading physicians and researchers. Donors and community members got behind-the-scenes looks at how their support drives medical breakthroughs and clinical care at Hamilton Health Sciences. Look forward to more engaging opportunities in the year ahead.

Safer care for older adults

A generous estate gift from E.D. Connor provided 30 new ProCuity beds for patients at St. Peter's Hospital, enhancing safety and comfort for older adults. The gift is also supporting ongoing upgrades to a palliative care room, helping ensure patients receive end-of-life care in a more peaceful, dignified environment.



Community champions at Juravinski Hospital and **Cancer Centre**

Imagine facing a life-threatening illness, knowing your treatment depends on complex, highly specialized equipment. At Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre, replacing aging apheresis machines is a carefully planned effort designed to ensure the latest technology is in place while also expanding capacity for a growing number of patients requiring this essential care. Rather than waiting for machines to fail, the hospital is proactively replacing two machines per year over three years to ensure seamless care.

Last year, some of the apheresis machines at the Juravinski Cancer Centre were nearing the end of their lifecycle, making the acquisition of new equipment essential to maintain and improve patient care.

Tammy De Gelder, clinical manager of hematology, expressed heartfelt gratitude for this community support:

"These apheresis machines are true lifelines. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, we are now better equipped to meet the evolving needs of our community, especially as the demand for cellular therapies continues to grow. From the hematology team, we are profoundly grateful."

Apheresis is a medical procedure that involves removing blood from the body and passing it through a centrifuge to separate it into its individual components. This process allows for the collection of specific components, such as stem cells, platelets or plasma, which can be used for transplantation, while the remaining blood is reintroduced back into the bloodstream. Apheresis plays an essential role in the treatment of blood cancers, supporting both stem cell transplants and other advanced therapies.

In response, compassionate donors rallied together to ensure these life-saving devices were replaced. Their swift and generous response facilitated the immediate purchase of two apheresis machines as well as four more over the next three years as they too wear out. Donors were also guick to jump in and purchase two specialized freezers for storing harvested stem cells, increasing the hospital's capacity to treat patients with blood cancers.

Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre is one of Ontario's most comprehensive cancer centres and among the select few in the province providing all forms of stem cell transplants. The replacement of these apheresis machines is pivotal in enhancing the hospital's capacity to serve patients, ensuring that those facing blood cancers receive the best possible care, close to home.

FROM GRATITUDE TO GIVING: How one couple's cancer journey is fueling research at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre

When Carolyn Koppelaar was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma in early 2020 - just as the world was beginning to shut down due to COVID-19 – she found herself facing two life-altering events at once. But from the moment she began treatment at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre, Carolyn felt comforted.

"I was treated with so much compassion and kindness," she says. "I felt like they went above and beyond."

Under the care of Dr. Amaris Balitsky, a hematologist-oncologist, Carolyn underwent a combination of chemotherapy and immunotherapy over 13 weeks. The treatment was an unmitigated success.

Grateful for the care she received, Carolyn and her husband Walter were inspired to give back, donating \$200,000 to support key research positions and resources for a robust study that will benefit patients at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre, and around the world.

Their generous gift is helping fund a promising area of research led by Dr. Balitsky, who is investigating the long-term impacts of an innovative treatment called CAR T-cell therapy.

A centre of excellence in cancer care

Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre was the second hospital in Ontario to offer CAR T-cell therapy. This revolutionary treatment involves extracting a patient's immune cells, modifying them in a lab to better recognize and destroy cancer cells, and infusing them back into the patient's body.


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CAR T-cell is one of the most exciting cancer breakthroughs in decades - offering hope to patients with few options left. Still rare in Canada, it's available at only a few hospitals, including Juravinski Cancer Centre. This personalized therapy reprograms the immune system to target cancer with precision, marking a new era in

> treatment. While CAR T-cell therapy has transformed cancer treatment for many patients, it can also come with serious side-effects. Dr. Balitsky's research is focused on understanding how patients' cognitive function – things like memory and concentration

Partnership highlights: Making a difference together

The generosity of our partners is more than just numbers - it's real impact, real lives changed and real hope for the future.

\$3.5K for long-term patients

At St. Peter's Hospital, compassionate care extends beyond medical treatment. A gift of \$3,500 from the Ontario REALTORS Care Foundation is helping provide comfort and dignity to long-term patients, supporting essential equipment and resources to enhance their daily lives. In a setting where personalized support is foundational, this funding ensures that patients continue to receive the best possible experience throughout their journey.

\$1.75M for burn care research

As one of only two burn centres in Ontario, Hamilton General Hospital is leading the way in specialized burn treatment. Thanks to a generous and anonymous \$1.75 million pledge, researchers are pioneering a five-year study to explore innovative therapies that enhance wound regeneration and healing. Their ultimate goal? The development of artificial skin, a breakthrough that could transform burn care for future patients.

\$45K for righting a rare cancer

The hard work of participants in the 2024 Multiple Myeloma March is advancing research into multiple myeloma care led by Dr. Hira Mian at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre. Dr. Mian's work with this rare cancer is establishing HHS as a leader in this field of research. For patients battling this highly recurrent cancer, this research is more than scientific progress - it's a lifeline to the future.

\$10M for MacKids

This year, we celebrated a remarkable milestone: a cumulative \$10 million in giving from the LCBO community to support children's health care. Since the '90s, support from LCBO customers and employees has funded life-saving equipment, including ventilators and incubator beds, while also expanding urgent mental health clinic services at McMaster Children's Hospital.

Navigating chronic illness at McMaster Children's Hospital

At just two-and-a-half years old, Morghan (Mori) Freitag's frequent infections signalled a more serious health concern. After extensive testing, she was diagnosed with vesicoureteral reflux, a condition where urine flows backward into the ureters and sometimes the kidneys, leading to recurrent infections. Despite undergoing deflux surgery at age four, Mori continues to face health challenges that require ongoing medical care.

McMaster Children's Hospital has been a central pillar of care and support throughout Mori's journey. She has undergone specialized tests, including voiding cystourethrograms and CT scans, and received care from nephrology and urology specialists. Child life specialists have helped her cope emotionally, and hospital tutors have ensured she stays on top of her schoolwork.

Mori's love for the performing arts became a defining moment in her health care experience. In 2022, while preparing for a local production of Annie, a ureter blockage threatened to keep her from performing. Understanding the importance of her emotional well-being, Mori's care team coordinated her treatment schedule so she could take the stage.

"Her care was number one and her health was number one," says Mori's mother, Meghan. "They also knew that part of her health was her mental health. So, they made sure she was able to do her show."

Exceptional, holistic care like this has been the hallmark of Mori's journey with McMaster Children's Hospital and just one of the many reasons she was a fantastic ambassador for her hospital as MacKids' 2024 Children's Miracle Network (CMN) Champion.

As a Champion, Mori shared her story with CMN partners like The Brick and Walmart to advocate for the hospital that has been such a critical part of her life and inspire generosity to support children like her who rely on its specialized services.

CMN & CCHF: Transforming pediatric care

Children's Miracle Network (CMN) and Canada's Children's Hospital Foundations (CCHF) are national fundraising networks dedicated to supporting children's hospitals across North America.

At McMaster Children's Hospital, their partnerships with corporate donors and caring communities help fund lifesaving treatments, transformative research, and top-priority equipment to guarantee young patients exceptional care.

Championing hope

MacKid Mori embodies the spirit of giving. As MacKids' 2024 CMN Champion, she shared her story to inspire others and has raised over \$13,000 for McMaster Children's Hospital by selling handmade bracelets and partnering with local businesses. From setting up shop at her local farmers market, to collaborating with her local theatre to allocate ticket admissions to our cause, she is one hard working young philanthropist who continues to pursue brighter futures for young patients.

- ergonomic wheelchairs to enhance comfort and mobility during recovery. As part of Ontario's largest integrated stroke program, these additions are helping patients regain their independence and rebuild their strength.

Comfort, care and dignity for long-term patients

Sometimes, the simplest comforts make the biggest difference. When staff at St. Peter's Hospital learned that an estate gift of more than **\$781,000** from June Young would fund – among other essential resources – a new air conditioning system for the Restorative Care Unit's rehabilitation gym, they were overwhelmed with emotion. Some even shed tears. This extraordinary gift is also supporting new beds for the Behavioural Health Unit and public washroom renovations, all contributing to the holistic well-being and dignity of long-term patients.




Grants

Advancing AI for better breast cancer detection

Thanks to support from Johnston Chrysler Dodge Jeep that purchased contrast-enhanced mammography software, researchers at Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre are developing an AI platform trained on local data to improve breast cancer detection in women with dense breast tissue.

Easing the journey through spinal surgery

Last year, the Cameron Family Award empowered Samantha Hill, a child life specialist at McMaster Children's Hospital, to develop a surgery preparation workbook for young patients awaiting spinal fusion. With year-long wait times and intense recovery periods, this resource will help families feel more informed, supported and ready for what's ahead thereby making a stressful journey a little less overwhelming.

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
