## LETTER FROM THE CEO

# Dear Mercy community,

*"We should be shining lamps, giving light to all around us."* Catherine McAuley's words have lost none of their power. A lamp does more than glow—it steadies footsteps, widens horizons and makes space for others to find their way. This year's Shining Lamp recipients have done exactly that.

Across our schools, the light of Mercy has been practical, courageous and deeply human. We've seen young leaders shape prayer and community life; teams elevating sustainability from intention to habit; students who bring people together across cultures and faiths; and outreach that restores dignity for neighbours doing it tough. Each story in this publication shows Mercy values lived—not as words on a page, but as choices made in classrooms, on ovals, backstage, out in the community and at the edges where hospitality matters most.

The work is beautifully diverse because the Mercy charism is inclusive by design.



In Bendigo, sustainability leadership has nudged the whole community toward better daily practices. In Geelong, reconciliation efforts—guided by FIRE Carrier leadership—have invited respectful dialogue and action. In Shepparton, an interfaith celebration at the close of Ramadan gathered people who don't often share the same room and made them feel they belong. In Lesmurdie, soup patrols and the Mercy Sleep Out have turned compassion into warm hands and full cups. And from Fitzroy to North Melbourne and beyond, students have quietly mentored younger peers, welcomed newcomers, and shown that being "known" is the first step to being loved.

What makes these lamps shine is not scale but spirit. Mercy leadership is collaborative rather than performative; it listens, creates room for other voices, and keeps going when the work gets complex. It is courageous enough to challenge what's not yet just, respectful enough to bring others along, and hospitable enough to ensure no one is left standing at the door. This publication honours that spirit—rooted in Compassion, Justice, Respect, Hospitality, Service and Courage—and celebrates the students, staff, families and community partners who kindle it every day.

To our 2025 Shining Lamp Award recipients: thank you for the way you lead—by noticing, by showing up, by inviting, by persisting. You remind us that Mercy is a verb. To everyone reading: may these pages be both recognition and invitation. Let's continue to light paths in our schools and neighbourhoods—one decision, one conversation, one act of service at a time

Congratulations to each of you. May the light you carry continue to travel—steadily, widely, bravely.
