

FOREWORD

Back in September 2021 I was invited by Helen Shearn Arts & Fylde Council to lead a wellbeing programme linking art, nature and movement to the heritage of Kirkham, a former mill town in Lancashire; a place quietly tucked away between its larger neighbours of Preston and Blackpool. As I wandered around the town, seeking out remnants of its history and visiting churches, I wondered how I could make such a programme have real meaning and value to the community that it was due to serve.

Four years on from Phoenix Rising Wellbeing, my colleagues and I feel privileged beyond words to have worked in Kirkham and Wesham and to have met so many kind and caring folk.

As artists, dancers and nature lovers worked to explore the town's heritage, people came out from the dark times of the Covid pandemic and started to rebuild their wellbeing through social connections, creativity and community.



Over weeks, months and years we worked with local members of the community to help others learn about their heritage, enjoy healthy cooking, sew and stitch together, create a garden, make art, groove, walk and learn yoga.


In the process of this learning and sharing we witnessed people coming together to genuinely enhance the social fabric of the town, and so Kirkham Thrives was born: a programme designed to continue offering creative support, to enhance the experiences of group leaders, volunteers and participants and to showcase the wonderful range of community wellbeing activities available in the area.

CREATIVE HERITAGE EXPLORERS

This friendly and welcoming group explores the history of Kirkham and the surrounding area, and brings it to life through creative projects. Heritage Explorer Weeks include trips, tours, speakers, research sessions and learning creative techniques, whilst during Project Weeks the group translates their research into creative activities. This has included sewing a series of rag dolls which depict changes in clothing style and fashion throughout the ages; a wooden model of Kirkham's Market Square and creating a timeline comparing Kirkham's history with events happening in the rest of the world.

The following few pages showcase some of the artist-led workshops the Creative Heritage Explorers have been involved in, learning new skills in photography, poetry and drawing.






SMARTPHONE PHOTOGRAPHY WORKSHOPS

Photographer Ginny Koppenhol worked with the Creative Heritage Explorers across two workshops on smartphone photography showing participants how they could improve their mobile phone photography skills.

The sessions offered a hands-on and engaging introduction to mobile photography, and participants explored how to capture the essence of Kirkham and its rich history through photos. They learnt new photography skills including how you identify a subject, can use lighting to enhance an image and techniques to edit pictures. The group also started a fun 'photo-a-day' challenge to keep the creativity flowing.

POETRY WORKSHOP

Ending loneliness and unhappy thought.



SKETCHING IN THE STYLE OF LOWRY WORKSHOPS

Sue Flowers led two workshops with the Creative Heritage Explorers, inspired by the 1925 sketch 'A Lancashire Town' by LS Lowry, currently held in Bedford Museum. Lowry's drawing was made in pencil during a day trip to Kirkham and depicts a view of St Michael's Church looking down Church Street from the Market Square: subsequently he altered the composition and used this as inspiration for his painting 'A Lancashire Village'.

Participants studied the work of Lowry and his approach to working creatively, capturing the essence of places in sketches and recreating new landscapes in his paintings as a cumulation of what he'd seen. Participants' creative skills have since gone from strength to strength.

GROW KIRKHAM & WESHAM



WILD AT ART WORKSHOPS

'Wild at Art' was a series of seven creative health and wellbeing workshops delivered by Kirkham Thrives in collaboration with Grow Kirkham. Workshops took place weekly on a Saturday morning at the William Segar Hodgson Pavilion in Kirkham exploring the powerful connection between creativity, wellbeing and nature. Some of the sessions were led by the Grow Kirkham & Wesham group, others were delivered by invited artists on botanical drawing, land art, natural dyes and the spoken word.





BOTANICAL DRAWING

Sue Flowers led a drawing workshop exploring our connection to the natural world, helping people understand the joy of focusing on the lines, shapes and textures of plants, flowers and leaves. The workshop helped people to connect with the visual world and understand that through the experience of drawing you can not only relax but also clear your mind of worries and begin to understand your place in the wider universe.

The regular weekly gatherings centre around a chat and a brew and the group undertake a variety of tasks and projects. All are welcome to join, whether regularly or occasionally.





LAND ART WORKSHOP

Winston Plowes visited the Men's Shed one evening in April and shared his love of nature and the environment by leading a walk around the churchyard. He invited participants to reconnect with nature by inspiring the group to make their own collaborative artwork using natural materials. Over a customary cuppa, Winston also shared his love of poetry, examining how creativity can help us all process and express our feelings and emotions.

A safe space, a weekly reminder, That within each other, we find our passion to live.

KIRKHAM POETRY GROUP

The poetry group meets once a month at Kirkham Library and provides opportunities for people to write and read poems based on a theme; sharing a love for poetry whilst also providing feedback to fledging poets. The group also works with local primary schools in Kirkham to encourage and inspire pupils to share and write their own poems.



POETRY WORKSHOPS

As part of their creative journey, the group worked with Nathan Parker to guide and inspire their development. Through this collaborative venture, the workshops were a space for participants to share, reflect and refine their work through a series of different themes. 
TAKE A WALK ON THE WORD SIDE


SPACE FOR NATURE

LAND ART WORKSHOP

Drawing inspiration from Kirkham Library's own herb and vegetable garden, the Space for Nature group foraged with artist Winston Plowes looking for natural materials that could be transformed into a beautiful organic piece of artwork. The session sparked lively conversation and a shared appreciation for the simple beauty of the natural environment around us. Gathered materials included holly berries and leaves, alder cones, red dogwood twigs, dandelion flowers, and fennel stems which were used to produce 'Mandala.'



KIRKHAM THRIVES TRIPS AROUND LANCASHIRE

QUEEN STREET MILL TEXTILE MUSEUM, BURNLEY

In December 2024, on a rather wet and miserable winter's day, members of Kirkham Thrives took a fascinating step back in time with a visit to Queen Street Mill Textile Museum in Burnley – the last surviving 19th century steam-powered weaving mill in the world. Housed in a Grade I listed building, the mill offered an immersive glimpse into Lancashire's rich industrial past, when cotton was king.

The group explored the historic site, learning about traditional textile processes, and visited Peace, the mill's mighty steam engine, which once powered the entire operation. The tour also visited the atmospheric weaving shed, where an impressive 308 Lancashire looms still stand, evoking the rhythm and roar of a bygone era, offering a rare opportunity to connect with our region's industrial heritage and an appreciation of the craftsmanship that shaped generations.

During February 2025 Kirkham Thrives took a trip to Lancashire Archives in Preston.

Senior Archivist Vicci McAnn introduced the important work of the archives as the County Records Office, which safely stores records of births, deaths and marriages in Lancashire as well as numerous other important historic items deposited there.

Participants were able to see what goes on 'behind the scenes' in the Strong Rooms store and enjoyed looking at former maps which help to show the growth and development of the townships known as Kirkham and Wesham over time.

HOMEGROWN / HOMESPUN PROJECT. BLACKBURN

On a beautifully sunny day in May 2025, participants from the Kirkham Thrives programme hopped on to a minibus to visit the Homegrown / Homespun project in Higher Audley, Blackburn. A pioneering, regenerative fashion initiative rooted in the heart of Blackburn, the project is spearheaded by designer Patrick Grant, his social enterprise Community Clothing and the North West England Fibreshed and works to review the cultivation of flax and woad, traditional crops once integral to Britain's textile heritage.

Transforming disused urban spaces along the Leeds Liverpool Canal into vibrant fields of flax and woad, the initiative not only reconnects the community with sustainable clothing production, but also fosters environmental regeneration and local economic growth.

The day was led by Garment Technologist Kirsteen McGregor, an advocate of heritage textile skills and sustainable practice, who also volunteers for The Super Slow Way. The group had a fabulous day experiencing first hand the development of the Higher Audley site, engaging in traditional flax processing techniques of breaking, scutching and hackling flax to fibre as well as spinning and weaving, gaining hands-on insight into the meticulous journey from plant to thread.
