## Lange's "Migrant Mother"

Dorothea Lange's photograph *Migrant Mother*, taken in 1936 during the Great Depression, is more than a portrait of hardship. It's a carefully constructed image that speaks volumes without using a single word. Through its composition, lighting, and expression, the photo persuades viewers to feel something deeper about the American experience.
