1. Garcia, L. M., & Chen, R. (2019). Urban heat islands and public health risk in coastal cities.

This article investigates how urban heat island effects increase health risks in densely populated coastal cities. Garcia and Chen analyze temperature data alongside hospitalization records to identify patterns linked to heat-related illness.
