

## Chicago Style Annotated Bibliography Examples

1. **Skloot, Rebecca.** *The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks*. New York: Crown Publishing, 2010.

Skloot examines the scientific, ethical, and personal consequences surrounding the use of Henrietta Lacks's cells in medical research. The book combines historical research with interviews and archival material to document how scientific progress intersected with issues of consent and family rights. Skloot's investigative approach provides detailed context without losing narrative clarity. This source supports research on medical ethics by offering documented evidence and personal accounts that illustrate broader ethical concerns within biomedical research.

2. **Ginzburg, Carlo.** *The Cheese and the Worms: The Cosmos of a Sixteenth-Century Miller*. Baltimore: Johns Hopkins University Press, 1980.

Ginzburg analyzes the worldview of a sixteenth-century miller through inquisitorial records and trial transcripts. The book explores how popular belief systems interacted with formal religious authority during the early modern period. Ginzburg's microhistorical method allows close examination of individual thought within a wider cultural framework.
