Manna Outreach (Food Security)

In 2025, Manna Outreach continued its mission of providing dedicated, reliable food assistance to individuals and families facing food insecurity across Memphis, honoring the legacy of compassionate service and excellence of the late Ellen Nickleberry and family.

Through the dedication of our staff, volunteers, and generous donations of our congregation, we served a growing number of households, rising from 800 in January to nearly 1,500 by year's end.

In addition, we initiated an emergency food drive in November, where our congregation's overwhelming generosity helped to meet the steady increase of emergency food assistance impacted by the delayed SNAP benefits and the government shutdown.

Manna Outreach also continued to expand its extraordinary team of volunteers who play the essential role of serving with reliability and commitment through senior food box deliveries, distribution, and client hospitality.

Because of the faithfulness of our church family, we are able to carry forward a high standard of service and remain a consistent source of hope for our community.

This year, approximately 1,500 children and their parents received supplies and services to help them have a great start to the school year.

Stop the Clot


We formed a meaningful partnership with the National Stop the Clot Alliance, which allowed us to raise awareness about the impact of blood clots. The Alliance's four-city bus tour was a significant event, with Memphis serving as the final stop. The tour culminated in a health fair at the Blvd Midtown on March 29, 2025, a moment that we were proud to be a part of. In preparation for the Stop the Clot Bus Tour, one Blvd Member, Joyce Clark, prepared a video, which was shared during service, detailing her lived experience with blood clots.

Memphis Zoo

Advocated on behalf of Memphians with the Zoo's CEO and Board regarding
policies that do not represent the best interest of the community, including
concerns about unnecessary budget allocations, board membership that does
not reflect the diversity of the community, and the continuation of a policy that
the Zoo Board did not implement in a manner that respects individual dignity,
known as Black Tuesday. Shared concerns via letter with Councilpersons Warren
and Cooper-Sutton. We also met virtually with Councilperson Cooper-Sutton.

Faith In Action

 Building a Better Community through Civic Engagement Collaborated with seven organizations to inform and educate people on social, political, economic, and environmental issues and encourage participation in civic life. Once people are aware and informed about critical issues and feel connected with their community, they will become more civically engaged. They will share their stories, analyze problems, develop actions, receive training, and connect with resources that help them. Community members become the civic leaders of our state.

Shelby County Jail

We met with Josh Spickler, Executive Director of Just City, an organization that relentlessly advocates for criminal justice reform and works to make our communities safer. After the presentation, we communicated with the Shelby County Sheriff, Mayor, County Commission, and the Memphis City Council and Mayor about the need to use their authority to make the necessary changes to ensure that being arrested and booked into 201 Poplar is not a death sentence. We also discussed influencing others to do the same, to conduct business in a decent manner and in order, and to involve the community in all decision-making.

Museum of Science and History (MOSH) - Hateful Things

Negotiated a 50 percent discount for Blvd members who attended Hateful Things on October 16, 2025.

Hateful Things is an exhibition that shares the history of the Jim Crow system and era. We supported the exhibition because it pushes back on the current trend to whitewash history. Our children are now in a generation where they are losing our history, and we don't want our history to be lost to the ether. This exhibit helps everyone understand the legacy of Jim Crow.

BLVD Engagement Builders

Annually, the Blvd holds a "Serve Tour," when members visit sites in the community where they might choose to volunteer. The Social Justice Ministry is developing a civic engagement tour where Blvd members and others tour and learn about service opportunities that involve advocacy. The goal is to facilitate civic engagement, regular meeting attendance, and reporting on meetings after the tour.

A Movement of Disciple-Makers Is Growing at The BLVD

Real transformation doesn't happen overnight, but it is happening here.

This past year has been a beautiful reminder that God works slowly, steadily, and surely. Something sacred is stirring at The BLVD. Our members aren't just showing up anymore; they're stepping up. They're embracing their calling as disciple-makers, living out their faith in ways that are real, relational, and multiplying.

We're becoming a church filled not just with learners, but with leaders. Not just participants, but people who walk alongside others as they follow Jesus.

43 People Said "Yes" to Something Deeper

In June, 43 members of our church family made a choice, they said "yes" to our two-day DiscipleShift training. This wasn't another class to check off a list. It was an invitation to realignment, a chance to rediscover how Jesus made disciples and how we can do the same.

Over those two days, something shifted. Leaders became honest, equipped, and re-inspired. They discovered that discipleship isn't about passing on information, it's about transformation through relationship. They practiced real tools to help others grow spiritually, no matter where someone is in their walk with Christ.

Most importantly, they left ready to lead Life Groups with fresh intentionality and deeper care.

We're grateful for every person who took that bold step. Because of their "yes," others are now growing and multiplying too.

521 People Choosing to Grow Together

The impact goes far beyond those 43 leaders. This year, 521 people participated in Life Groups, 521 individuals demonstrating their commitment to becoming disciples who make disciples. That's over 500 people choosing community over isolation, growth over stagnation, and intentional discipleship over casual faith.

Five new Life Groups launched this year, creating even more spaces where people are truly known, lovingly challenged, and authentically cared for. More places where spiritual growth happens in living rooms, over coffee, and through everyday conversations.

These groups were birthed by leaders who caught the vision during DiscipleShift and are now living it out. Each group is evidence that God is building something strong and lasting here at The BLVD. And honestly? We're just getting started.

The Second Time Around Hit Different

Several Life Groups revisited the Real-Life Discipleship study this year, and the second time through was a game-changer. The first time was eye-opening. The second time became deeply personal.

Leaders realized discipleship isn't just about content, it's about walking with people through real change. Groups leaned into the heart work, not just head knowledge. Conversations became more honest, more raw, and more rooted in actually following Jesus, not just studying Him.

Community That Refuels the Leaders

We also launched quarterly gatherings for our leaders, but these are more than just meetings. They're moments of life together where we laugh, learn, pray,

One of the most powerful signs of this growing culture? Our Life Groups aren't just looking inward, they're reaching out.

During Love Fest this year, groups served our community with genuine compassion and joy. Whether providing food, offering prayer, or simply sharing smiles, our members embodied Christ's love in practical, tangible ways.

We're seeing it more and more: discipleship isn't just what we learn in a room, it's how we live in the world.

The Joseph Community is comprised of congregants that live within the 38125, 38141, and 38115 zip codes. The Spiritual Officers include eleven deacons and two elders. The Spiritual Officers meet on the third Wednesday of each month as needed, with agenda items including Congregation Care updates, review of monthly reports, planning for future events, and sharing praise and prayer reports. Our monthly reports reflect when officers send cards in times of bereavement, illness, and to celebrate birthdays. The major themes for the Joseph Community are connecting and caring. The officers connect with congregants through visitations and communicate via phone calls, text messages, and emails.

Our community selected Dorothy's Place as our service project, a day center for Alzheimer's and dementia patients in Hickory Hill, which is in the 38115 zip code. Spiritual Officers are assigned monthly duties to take paper products and cleaning supplies. In addition, we assist with their annual Thanksgiving Celebration by serving meals.

Within our community, the Rachel Circle Disciples Women's Ministry, which connects with women monthly to engage in Bible study utilizing Bible-based books and research studies on the inclusiveness of multiple generations. The meetings are held in the homes of the sisters on the third Sunday. The sisters participate in the Disciples Women's Ministry service project, Room in the Inn. The sisters are exploring additional service projects that include foster care and homeless children and mothers.

The Joseph Community's Men of Jacob gather at various times of the year and assist with the annual Scholarship Luncheon. In an effort to connect and fellowship with members, an annual picnic is hosted. Members gather at Shelby Farms for delicious food that is prepared by our own master grillers, enjoy music, exciting games, and activities. The congregants are encouraged to become familiar with our community members.

Congregational Care Communities (C3)



The Team of Spiritual Leaders (Ministers, Elders, Deacons) in the Judah Community works cohesively to advance the goals of the Congregational Care Community (C3). To accomplish those goals this year, Spiritual Leaders visited MBCC members who were residents of nursing homes, as well as those who were hospitalized or in rehabilitation facilities at various points during the year. To support our bereaved families, Spiritual Leaders provided a connected presence at "Celebration of Life" services throughout the year. Additionally, efforts were made to communicate with MBCC members via phone calls, text messaging, emails, and greeting cards. Every month, the Judah Community schedules Prayer and Conversation sessions, connecting virtually with members to address their prayer concerns and to discuss current issues affecting our local and national community. This year, the Judah Community joined the Levi Community to create additional fellowship opportunities, which included a fun afternoon at the Memphis Zoo and a picnic at Shelby Farms Park. The Judah Spiritual Leaders continued the tradition of bonding with members at an annual Jazz Concert, enjoying light refreshments and great conversation.

Congregational Care Communities (C3)



The Levi community is a community of 543 members in parts of Memphis, Cordova, and all of Mississippi. These members are led by a community of 11 Elders and Diaconate. This year, two of our church Diaconate in training and one of our Ministers walked with us in supporting this body of members.

We had a very good year in 2025. During the year, we focused on staying connected with our members via text, email, phone calls, and sending Birthday and Bereavement cards during their times of loss.

We also held two community fellowships: the first being a Zoo Day to encourage members to experience the Memphis Zoo, one of the best in the country. We followed that by joining our Judah community for a community picnic in Shelby Farms, which enhanced our fellowship and relationships across the communities. The fellowship, food, and games were enjoyed by all.

This year, the Levi team will connect with members 8,572 times and support members in Funerals and Wakes, serve with Baptism and Communion, and other activities 1,087 times. The team is very busy supporting the congregation and the Church in caring for and supporting membership needs.

Though not a perfect process, the C3 effort in the Levi Community continues to press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus. Connection is critical to maintaining our relationships with our members, especially since COVID, when many of our members have not returned to regular attendance at Sunday Worship. It is exciting to see the value of Community connection with our members, knowing that sometimes it does not feel like this work is important, but when projected over the year, it is very significant.

The Naphtali Community's goal is to advance the mission of CCM at the Blvd. To achieve this goal, our Spiritual Officers strive to reach all our congregants on a monthly basis by phone calls, texts, emails, birthday, get well, and sympathy cards. More importantly we try to connect and support our congregants when they are experiencing bereavement, homebound, confined to nursing homes, and those who are homebound.

The Napthali Spiritual Officers consist of 4 ministers, 1 Elder, 7 Deacons. Deacon Isadore Peasant is Naphtali's Organizer. Deacon Mary Moore is Naphtali's Communications Officer.

The Naphtali Community participated in the CIII Day at the BLVD this past summer. We met with our congregants in the Fellowship Hall after worship service. We met with the families and took pictures. The Spiritual Officers handed out community t-shirts, contact and spiritual greeting cards. We also gave our congregants books, book markers, office supplies, and small souvenirs.
