

The stories we've read — How the Kangaroos Got Their Tails, When the Snake Bites the Sun, and The Porpoise and the Kangaroo — have sparked rich conversations and even richer writing. We've been working hard on expanding our sentences using conjunctions like because and but.

With Fathers' Day on Sunday 7 September, we wish our fathers and grandfathers all the very best. If you remember from the previous article, the CWA Conference was recently held at Shepparton. All resolutions were passed. The State President, Jennifer Nola has joined the State Drought Taskforce and has already presented the concerns of many communities who had been in contact with her. This year the CWA has already issued seven educational grants to the value of over \$50,000 to worthy tertiary students. Some were in the fields of nursing, agriculture, veterinary medicine, occupational therapy, rural health medicine, psychology, fine arts and eco-management.

This cold weather is the perfect opportunity to warm yourself and the family up with a dish of 'Pol Sambola' (Coconut Sambola), a Sri Lankan side dish. This recipe would be ideal to have with meat, chicken, fish or just by itself.

Ingredients:

- 1 cup of desiccated coconut
- 1 teaspoon of salt
- 1 teaspoon of chilli powder (or to taste)
- 2 teaspoons of paprika
- 2 teaspoons of fish sauce
- 2 tablespoons of lemon juice
- 1 medium onion, finely chopped
- 2 or 3 tablespoons of hot milk

Method:Combine coconut, salt, chilli powder, paprika and fish sauce in a bowl with lemon juice, onion and milk. Mix well with hands, rubbing ingredients together so that the coconut is evenly moistened. Pile into small bowl.


The Australian Marmalade Awards are back!

We are very happy to be able to contribute to the four organisations mentioned below.

- The Mechanics' Institute Hall \$500

- The Wildlings Woodend Wildlife Shelter \$500 The proceeds from the Exhibition were \$2344.06 and the donation will total \$2250 which means we will have donated all but \$94 to the community.

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DIRTY DOCKER CYCLING AND RUNNING FESTIVAL RETURNS

CHALLENGING FUN FOR ALL LEVELS

The highly anticipated Dirty Docker cycling and running festival will return to Lancefield this October, offering a unique fusion of competitive off-road challenges and vibrant festival culture. Founded by former WorldTour cyclist and Life in the Peloton podcast host Mitch Docker, the Dirty Docker is a two-day celebration of off-road endurance, community engagement and country fun. The event features three races:

- The Cobawsome Gravel Ride over four distances in the Cobaw Ridge Forest (Sunday 12 October)
- The Cross Vegas Cyclocross Race Lancefield Park a free-spirited cyclocross event where riders are free to get creative on a fun and unpredictable course. (Saturday 11 October)
- The Lanny Cross Country Run Lancefield Park throwback to classic cross-country running, a grassrootsstyle event featuring natural terrain, varied surfaces, and a challenging, no-frills course that captures the spirit of old-school racing. (Saturday 11 October)

"Athletes of all levels are welcome," Mitch said. "Whether you're in it for the fun, the challenge, or somewhere in between. You can sign up for any individual event or go

all-in with the Dirty Hat-Trick: three events, one incredible weekend. Run, ride, and revel your way through it all!



At the heart of the weekend is the Festival Village, featuring local food vendors and trucks, fire pits and relaxed seating, live music performances and regional craft beer and wine.

Last year's event attracted almost 600 participants, and this year promises to be even better, with the Dirty Docker team building on that momentum by expanding local engagement, increasing female athlete participation, and enhancing the event experience for both competitors and spectators.

Dirty Docker is proudly based at the Recreation Reserve in Lancefield and places a strong focus on sustainability, community involvement, and showcasing local producers.

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PLANNED UPGRADES TO LANCEFIELD'S WATER SYSTEM

We're upgrading Lancefield's water system to continue delivering safe and reliable services to the community. Greater Western Water will be duplicating a section of pipe that carries water from Bore 3 in Lancefield to the Lancefield Water Filtration Plant. We'll be working along a 1.6-kilometre section of Maloneys Road, between Parks Road and the water filtration plant. Construction is expected to start in mid-September and will take approximately 3 months.

Over the last 18-24 months the region has experienced ongoing dry conditions, and we've seen an increase in water usage across the north-west of our service region. We're completing these works to strengthen the reliability of Lancefield's water supply by enabling water to flow to the treatment plant from both Bore 3 and Kerrie Reservoir at the same time, ensuring we can meet peak demand on hot summer days.

Works may cause dust or noise in the area, but we'll do our best to keep this to a minimum. There will be some temporary changes to traffic, such as reduced speeds. A traffic management crew will be onsite to help direct traffic and keep everyone safe. Your water and sewerage services will not be disrupted. EVERY BACKYARD COUNTS

Sunday 7 September is National Threatened Species Day. It is a reminder that even the smallest actions can make a big difference for our native plants and animals - and it all starts in your own backyard.

As more of our natural habitat is lost or fragmented, our backyards and balconies are becoming important refuges for wildlife. Whether it's insects buzzing in the garden, lizards warming themselves on a rock, or birds stopping in for a drink - your garden can provide much-needed food, water and shelter.

Insects might not get much attention, but they're vital to our ecosystems. They pollinate flowers, break down organic matter and support frogs, lizards and birds further up the food chain.

So how can you help? Try planting a few locally native species, leave some leaf litter for skinks, or put out a shallow dish of water for thirsty birds and bees. Even a single pot of flowers on a balcony can help attract pollinators.

Not sure where to start? Head to mrsc.vic.gov.au/backyard-biodiversity for easy-to-follow fact sheets and ideas on what native species you could attract and what to plant.

You really can make a difference - one garden, one plant, one action at a time.

Let's give our threatened species a helping hand, starting in our own backyards.

I am glad to say I was completely wrong; what a lovely morning with these fine young people. They all seemed to be having a great time and thoroughly enjoyed the experience. All the blokes were very grateful to our bloke who spends hours crafting all the component parts so the kids can put their nest box and pencil case together. We had about eight of our guys working with the kids, to ensure the items were being done safely and properly. They seemed to be thrilled with the result.

It's important to point out that each shed member who was there to help has a Working with Children Card. I am told that the Lancefield Men's shed is the only shed around this area that has a program that works with young Primary

School children. It's a very satisfying activity for both us and the kids.

A bloke at the recent monthly market came up to our stand and started looking through our "Brag Book" which shows many of the items that we make, repair and refurbish. He didn't realize the range of things that we do, and said he would immediately investigate joining his local shed. That's a win for us, as the more blokes we can encourage to join their local shed the better as far as we are concerned. Best thing I ever did!

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
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

Traditional owners have used and cared for wetlands for tens of thousands of years, but since colonisation wetlands have been undervalued in Australia. We have lost much of our wetlands to development and agriculture and many of the benefits that they offer. Victoria's remaining wetlands support 24% of our threatened species (water.vic.gov.au).

Wetlands are a critical part of our natural environment. They protect our shores from wave action, reduce the impact of floods, enable groundwater recharge and stream flow maintenance, act as a carbon sink, absorb pollutants and improve water quality. Wetlands provide a habitat for many plants and species of aquatic microfauna, fish, frogs, reptiles, birds and mammals that are uniquely adapted to aquatic environments. They are an important nursery for many varieties of fish and crustaceans.

Internationally important wetlands are listed under the Ramsar Convention. With 12 Ramsar-listed wetlands, Victoria possesses some of the most important wetlands in the world! For example, the Kerang wetlands regularly support 20,000 waterbirds and the nationally vulnerable Growling grass frog. The Eastern curlew is Australia's largest shorebird. It breeds in Russia and China before spending the non-breeding season along our coastline in wetlands such as Corner Inlet. Australia's wetlands provide habitat for 75% of the world's Eastern curlews.

Stormwater poses a threat to our waterways, and to people and infrastructure along our waterways. In October

2022, heavy rain flooded into our local creeks and down into the Maribyrnong River, flooding many properties along its lower reaches from Maribyrnong to Footscray and Kensington. We need to better handle stormwater. The establishment of wetlands and mitigating the consequences of building near our watercourses provide part of the solution, with the potential to provide much needed, high-quality water for our creeks and rivers.

The expansion of Sunbury along Lancefield Road provides challenges and opportunities for Emu Creek which flows into Deep Creek. Similarly, the growth of Romsey on its eastern and southern flanks poses challenges and opportunities for Deep Creek. In both cases unimpeded runoff from the new developments will wash litter and pollutants into the waterways. Hard surfaces: roads, footpaths, and roofs dominate our newer suburban developments. In rain events most of the water quickly flushes into our drains and down into our waterways. We need to slow the water down to minimise flooding and erosion and to ensure that it is of acceptable quality before it reaches our waterways.

We can slow the water down in a number of ways. Firstly, by reducing hard surfaces and by designing our urban landscapes so that more of the water has a chance to soak in to the ground.

We need to enable groundwater to recharge and help maintain stream flow in dry periods. You will have noticed the retention basin at the new aged care centre in Romsey










and similar structures built at some of the new estates in our area. Secondly, our new estates can be designed so that urban runoff is captured in engineered wetlands. Deep Creek Landcare's submission to the Romsey Structure Plan last year advocated for an extensive wetland to be established at the eastern end of the Romsey South Drain. Litter traps could be employed to capture litter, the wetlands will slow the stormwater down, improve the water quality and provide habitat for wildlife.

The damage posed by storms can be minimised and the benefits to our impoverished waterways maximised through engineered solutions. In times of high rainfall, excess water can be pumped to storage facilities for later use when our waterways are in need. Also, water can be taken from our wetlands when rain events are forecast to enable our wetlands to function as a withholding basin to minimise the extent of flash flooding.

Deep Creek Landcare has nesting boxes for bats, birds, possums and phascogales for sale from \$30. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. You can follow us on Facebook, go to our new website, contact our President, Phil Severs (0476 324 000) or attend our monthly meetings in the Lancefield Mechanics Hall.

There is also the opportunity to join us at our regular working bees. On Sunday, September 28 from 9:00 to 11:30, we will be planting more than 500 understorey plants at Doggetts Bridge on the Lancefield-Kilmore Road. We would love to have your help and give you some indigenous plants to plant on your property!

Although winter might have gone away, the risk of catching the flu has not. The flu can make even healthy people very sick, and it spreads easily-especially in workplaces, schools, and public places. Each year, thousands of Australians end up in hospital due to flu complications, so it's important to take steps to protect yourself and your loved ones.

The flu vaccine is recommended for everyone aged 6 months and over, and it's free under the National Immunisation Program (NIP) for eligible groups including:

People aged 65 and over

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people Pregnant women

Children aged 6 months to under 5 years People with certain medical conditions

Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) is another common virus that spreads in winter. It often causes cold-like symptoms but can lead to serious illness. Council is also offering RSV vaccination for eligible adults and infants.

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


NEW APPOINTMENT

VACANCY ON MACEDON RANGES SHIRE COUNCIL

A countback to fill an extraordinary vacancy on Macedon Ranges Shire Council for South Ward will be held online at 10 am on Monday 1 September 2025. The vacancy is due to the death of Councillor Christine Walker.

The Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) will hold a countback of all formal votes from the 2024 Macedon Ranges Shire Council, South Ward election to fill the vacancy. Votes will be redistributed to candidates who were unsuccessful in 2024 but are still eligible to be elected.

The countback is based on the proportional representation method of counting, which means candidates must achieve a proportion of votes known as a quota.

'The candidate who gets the quota will be elected. If no candidate reaches the quota, the candidate with the highest number of countback votes will be elected,' Election Manager Sally Leung said.
