We're back! Last year, the Dirty Docker was just an idea, a vision from Lancefield local and former professional cyclist Mitch Docker. To see it come to life with over 600 participants and more than 1,000 people rolling through the event village was beyond anything he could have imagined.

Mitch's dream was simple: combine the thrill of cycling and running with the atmosphere of a country festival. After 13 years racing on the roads of Europe, he wanted to bring something new to his hometown, a weekend of off-road adventure and community spirit. The Dirty Docker is about more than sport; it's about connection, fun, and showing off the very best of Lancefield.

"Last year showed me just how special this town is," Mitch said. "I wanted to create something that mixes the buzz of racing and physical exercise with the relaxed vibe of a festival. Where people can ride, run, camp, and then just sit around a fire together. That's what the Dirty Docker is all about."

Saturday kicks off with a cross-country run and a cheeky cyclo-cross course (both weaving through the bar!), before rolling straight into a festival evening of live music including local bands, and food trucks. Pitch a tent, roll up in the camper, or even glamp in style — the Dirty Docker is as much about fire pits, good company and raising a beer as it is about muddy legs.

On Sunday, it's time to see the Cobaw Forest and Tooborac region by bike. From family-friendly 15km rides to the big 135km challenge, the routes wind across private farmland, forest tracks, and gravel backroads. With pop-up food, DJs, and surprises out there along the way, it's less




about racing and more about riding with mates.



## SPRING -TIME TO GET GOING!

Spring is usually a busy time for Deep Creek Landcare, but this year is particularly busy. A dry start to the year meant that we postponed some plantings until spring, in the hope of some good winter rain. However, we did conduct two plantings on Mount William as part of the Mount William Biolink project. Ammie Jackson is playing a key role in the project. Ammie is the Landcare Facilitator for the Upper Deep Creek Landcare Network, of which we are a member. The current project is supported by Melbourne Water and involves nine properties.

Fortunately, winter did bring much needed rain; 277 mm at our place just out of Lancefield. Rain and cold wind at the end of August forced us to postpone plantings at Lancefield Park with our local primary schools and the Girl Guides. Our Junior Landcare Facilitator, Emma Stevens, liaises with us to plan the events. To participate our members are required to hold a current Working with Children Card.

This year we received a Biolink Boost Grant from the Macedon Ranges Shire Council and the Community Bank to conduct plantings and giveaways of indigenous plants with the aim of raising our profile in Romsey. At the two autumn giveaways in Romsey we gave away a total of 823 trees, shrubs and grasses.

As part of the grant, at our working bee in early August, we planted a 50-metre section of Five Mile Creek in Romsey. Twelve of our members were joined by East Ward Councilor, Andrew Scanlon, at the site. We put down three rolls of jute matting to suppress weeds and then planted and fitted guards for the 33 indigenous trees and shrubs and a further 236 small shrubs and grasses. We will add some wildflowers in October to add a splash of colour from spring to autumn! The task was completed by 10:15 followed by morning tea and a giveaway of 54 plants to participants. We liaised with our council and Melbourne Water to design the planting which will add to the amenity and biodiversity of the important wildlife corridor.

The next and final stage of the project is to carry out a planting on the northern side on Deep Creek at Doggetts Bridge. We will plant some trees, but mainly grasses and shrubs as the primary aim is to increase the understorey at the site to further enhance the original planting done by Deep Creek Landcare back in 1995. We have worked with Parks Victoria, and will conduct the working bee on Sunday, September 28.

In September we will also be working with Emma and the local Girl Guides to add to the plantings on the eastern

boundary of Lancefield Park. Further work will be carried at the site with Lancefield PS and St Mary's PS in late October. During October we will also participate in a planting at Bolinda PS.

In mid-September we will conduct a Saturday morning planting at a private property in Dowie Court. The landholders have worked with Melbourne Water to access grants to remove willows on Five Mile Creek and replace them with indigenous trees, shrubs and grasses. It is a large backyard and the project has been staged over the last three years. We have been more than happy to assist the project and at the same time gain valuable income.

Once again, we will be at the Lancefield Show on Sunday, October 19. You can find us on the left as you walk in. We will have some indigenous tube stock to give away, booklets and nesting boxes for sale and we will be on hand to give advice or just have a chat.

Our 2025 AGM will take place in the annex of the Lancefield Mechanics Hall before our members meeting on Monday, October 13. The AGM will start at 7:30 pm. We are looking for some new faces to join our committee.

Our Landcare Facilitator and I have recently worked on a new website which is now up and running. Take a look! The site will enable members of the public to see what we have done, what we are working on, and upcoming events.

Deep Creek Landcare has nesting boxes for bats, birds, possums and phascogales for sale from \$25. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Annual Landcare membership is

# PLACES - PHYSICAL AND CULTURAL LANDSCAPES

Newham & District Landcare Group invites you to, On Country Interculturally: Thinking about places as cultural as well as physical landscapes, with guest speaker, Dr Angela Foley, from the Merri Creek Management Committee.

This discussion aims to strengthen ethical understandings for conservationists and land managers, touch on aspects of Wurundjeri Cultural revival; being a non-Indigenous ally and engaging with Traditional Owners in a meaningful way.

We will explore what happens when landscapes are continuously altered over time (pre- and post-contact): and how we all continue to connect to place.

Dr Angela Foley's main interest is enjoying and acknowledging Country as a non-Indigenous ally. Angela's career in education and advocacy has been mainly in the tertiary sector (UNSW, WSU, RMIT, Monash and Melbourne Universities) and in the not-for profit sector (for community and schools). On the Merri Creek Management Committee for over 20 years, she now leads Biodiversity & Waterway Education (Caring for Country) by developing and delivering innovative programs to several thousand people every year. Angela has an honours degree in Geography from University of New South Wales and completed her PhD thesis The art of place-making in Wurundjeri Country today (2020)



# DONALD PATERSON, OAM

With a family history in the Nulla Vale area dating back to the 1860s, Don Paterson and his family have lived through drought, Depressions, World Wars and rabbit infestations, as they have continued to farm their 1,600 ha property.

Don's great-grandfather, John Paterson, first came to Victoria in 1865 before settling in Lancefield. Like thousands of others, he first tried his hand at gold mining at Beechworth. He then decided to try his luck with a horse and dray, and began carting supplies from Melbourne to the goldfields — a much more reliable way to earn a living than panning for gold. John then selected 320 acres, 'down the road a bit' from Bendigo, in Nulla Vale where he turned his hand to dairying on his selection. The resulting cheese was then carted to Melbourne or Bendigo for sale. He had seven children from two marriages; three boys stayed on the farm, only John's son Keith Paterson married and had children. Keith married Mavis Kilroy in 1936 and bought her home to the farm.

Keith and Mavis's son Donald George Paterson was born in 1948 and educated at Scotch College.

After decades of community service, Don was awarded the Order of Australia Medal (OAM) 'For service to the community of the Mitchell Shire' at the King's Birthday Honours in June 2025.

Like his father before him, Don participated from an early age as a member of many local community organisations. In the CFA, he was a member of the Nulla Vale Brigade (1963-2025), a Group Officer, Division 12 (1989-95) and was made a Life Member in 2016.

His commitment to his local community extended to his membership of the Shire of Pyalong where he was a Councillor from 1980-97 and Shire President 1981-82 and 1990-91. He then became a member of the Mitchell Shire in 1997 and was Mayor in 2000-01. He was Founding Member in 1996 of the Nulla Vale Pyalong West Landcare Group. He has held the position of President (1996-2001) and Treasurer (2017-19). In 2002 he was made an Honorary Life Member.

The range of local offices he has held is extensive. Yet it is the words used to describe Don's contribution to the community that perhaps best sum up the man: 'Donald comes from both an age and a lineage where it is simply accepted that you volunteer your services to the betterment of the local community.'

Importantly, Donald is known to be an upstanding member of the local community and an outstanding role model. As the Order of Australia nomination pointed



out: 'Donald is frequently called upon for assistance from neighbours, in a wide range of areas, including general farming advice, specialist information, local suppliers, vehicle recoveries, animal husbandry and so on. Donald is known throughout the district as a trustworthy source of reliable and helpful information and is known for always being available to help another person in need.' These character traits, and the community's overwhelming faith in his integrity, are what prompted his nomination for this award.

We congratulate you, and salute you Don, for your continuing work for our community.

#### MORE ABOUT OUR 'COUNTRY OF STUDY', SRI LANKA

The CWA Community and International Chairman visited Sri Lanka with her husband. Her highlight was seeing the elephants; the Sri Lankan subspecies is the largest and darkest of the Asian elephants. She thought that they were a pretty elephant with their pink ears, face trunk and tummy. As 10% of the land area of Sri Lanka is designated as National Parks, elephants often emerged from the jungle and walked alongside the road.

She thought that the baby calves were fluffy and adorable. Our Sri Lankan dish for this month is Rotis. It is similar to the Indian flat breads, but this Sri Lankan version contains fresh grated coconut or, in its absence, desiccated coconut. Serve with curries and sambols.

The mixing can be done by little helpers (if available). Serves. 6-8

#### **Ingredients:**

2 cups roti flour, self-raising or rice flour ½ cup desiccated coconut

1 teaspoon salt


Scant 1 cup of water

Ghee or oil for cooking

**Method:** Mix flour, coconut and salt in a mixing bowl. Add just enough water to form a soft dough. Knead dough until it forms a ball and does not stick to the sides of the bowl. Rest dough for approximately 30 minutes. Shape dough into balls, approximately the size of a golf ball. Pat each one out to the size of a saucer. Cook on a hot griddle or in a heavy frying pan very lightly greased with ghee or oil. Serve hot.



On Thursday 18 September, the Macedon Ranges Shire Community Grants Event saw the celebration of the recipients of the latest round of community grants. Allocations were issued through the Community Funding Scheme, Events and Festivals Grants Program, Environment Group Support Grants and the Climate Action Grants.

The CEO, Bernie Sullivan, and Mayor of the Shire, Dom Cr Bonanno, both welcomed the audience to the event which was held at the Lancefield Mechanics' Institute Hall

On this occasion, the proceedings began with a panel discussion featuring Jenny Stillman (Eastern Macedon Ranges Business & Tourism Association), John Sevenson (President, Lancefield Mechanics' Institute) and Ammie Jackson (Deep Creek Landcare/Mt William Biolink Project).

Jenny Stillman discussed the Christmas in Romsey event which began ten years ago. Funding for this event promoted collaboration with the MRSC. Community engagement and the social impact of the event were just two of the benefits from the project. With the MRSC as an important stakeholder in the event, Jenny emphasised that collaboration was key. In terms of measuring the success of the event, the obvious result was the annual increase in the number of attendees. Community involvement in the working bees needed to prepare for the event has also saw an increase in numbers of resident involvement in the event, another great measure of success for EMRBATA.

As President of the LMI, John Sevenson has been an active instigator of change and renewal for the Hall. While

it was clear the Supper Room needed refurbishment, as well as better heating, rather than doing something 'sexy' such as a wood fire, they chose to install an electric fire that is a great imitation of the real thing. Hard work from the committee as well as community involvement have enabled the LMI to enjoy great achievements. Their success is measured by the increased number of bookings per year that it now receives – a statistic of 18,000 feet through the doors was rather staggering to hear, but it makes sense when considering the number of events that now take place. John believes that working with the MRSC benefits this organisation and the Hall itself – there is little support from the State.

Ammie Jackson is part of the Deep Creek Landcare Group and her involvement focuses on the Biolink project. This re-vegetation project on Mt William which has involved landholders in the area. She sees many community benefits – such as the planting events – that are held regularly by Landcare. These events certainly enhance social cohesion in the area. One of the learnings she takes from the process is 'not to waste funding' and to work with the landholders.

Following the panel session, the recipients of the three levels of grants were photographed before the audience enjoyed convivial conversation and refreshments in the Supper Room.

charged to those who can afford it, helping cover fuel and maintenance costs.



# PREPARING YOUR PROPERTY FOR THE FIRE SEASON

#### **Roadside Slashing**

Each year, Council carries out roadside slashing to help reduce the risk of fires caused by hot vehicle exhausts, mechanical failures, or collisions. About 1,000 kilometres of roadside are slashed annually, with a focus on main roads, bus routes, and critical evacuation routes.

#### **Property Inspections & Fire Prevention Notices**

In the coming weeks, Council's Fire Management Officers will begin inspecting properties across the municipality for fire hazards and may issue you with a fire prevention notice, outlining the works that are required.

If you receive a notice, don't ignore it as heavy penalties can apply to owners who fail to comply. Properties are expected to be maintained to the required standard throughout the Fire Danger Period.

If you are planning to bale and require more time, please complete the extension application found on the back of the notice. For properties where stock grazing is being used for fuel reduction, you must be able to demonstrate that stocking levels are sufficient to effectively reduce vegetation. If not, further fuel reduction measures may be required.


#### **HAVING FUN**

## **CONSULTATION UPDATES**

Thank you to everyone who took the time to provide feedback during Council's consultations for the draft Domestic Animal Management Plan (DAMP) and dog offleash and prohibited areas review. The next steps for each project are outlined below.

DRAFT DOMESTIC ANIMAL MANAGEMENT PLAN (DAMP) 2026–2029

Feedback received will assist Council to further refine the draft DAMP 2026 – 2029.

The final draft DAMP 2026 – 2029, along with the consultation findings, is expected to be presented to Council to consider for adoption at its November 2025 Council Meeting.

The new plan is then scheduled to be submitted to the

Victorian Government in December 2025.

Proposed changes to dog off-leash and prohibited areas (for both dogs and cats)

Feedback received regarding Council's proposed changes to dog off-leash and prohibited areas — otherwise known as Schedule 1 (dog off leash areas) and Schedule 2 (prohibited areas for dogs and cats) of Council's Dog and Cat Order 2019, will be considered during early-mid 2026, as a first-year action of Council's Domestic Animal Management Plan 2026 — 2029.

Final amendments to Council's dog off-leash and prohibited areas (Schedules 1 and 2 of Council's Dog and Cat Order 2019) are anticipated to be presented to Council in mid-2026.

#### **REMEMBER:**


- Keep your yard tidy, clear away clutter like timber piles and rocks.
- Supervise pets, keep dogs on a lead and watch pets closely in high-risk areas. If you suspect a bite, seek immediate veterinary care.
- Dress for the occasion, when out walking, wear long pants and proper shoes.
- Don't try to catch or harm a snake. Call a licensed snake catcher instead.
- In the case of a bite, call ooo immediately.

Snakes are protected under the Wildlife Act 1975, and capturing, harming, or killing them is illegal. You can report wildlife crime to Crime Stoppers Victoria on 1800 333 000.

And then we made it to the finish line, collected our glass and tokens for a drink and a sausage and off we went to




check the QR code for our time! As we stood in line for either a drink or a sausage, we all congratulated each other!

# FRIENDS OF REFUGES TURNING COMPASSION INTO ACTION

Kyneton is once again showing the power of community, as we prepare to welcome a refugee family from overseas.

Friends of Refugees Kyneton (FORK) is a dedicated volunteer group partnering with Community Refugee Sponsorship Australia (CRSA) to support this family as they begin a new chapter — one of safety, dignity, and hope — right here in Australia.

These families have already been processed by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) and the Australian Government. They will arrive with permanent residency visas, ready to contribute and rebuild their lives.
