DEAR PATRIOT COMMUNITY,

The 2025-2026 school year is off to a fantastic start. Classrooms are filled with opportunity and our staff, students, and families have shown incredible dedication to making this year one of growth and achievement.

Plenty of success stories are being written each and every day at all our campuses as we ensure that every student has the opportunity to thrive both academically and personally.

As we settle into the year, I also want to take a moment to thank everyone who was able to attend the Board of Education meeting this October. I understand that many of you were unable to be there in person, so I wanted to follow up and share Dr. RickTimbs' presentation.

Dr. Timbs provided an in-depth look at our current financial situation and projected trends over the next five years. His analysis showed a significant gap between our revenues and expenditures. This challenge stems from several factors: a Foundation Aid formula that bases aid on property value rather than the needs of our students, the expiration of temporary ARP funds that helped us address learning loss, and rising costs tied to inflation and contractual obligations.


The study makes it clear that stabilizing our finances will require a combination of exceeding the tax cap and making careful reductions, as our current reserves and fund balance are not sufficient to offset the shortfall. We have faced challenging times before, and I am confident that by staying united around our students, engaging in thoughtful planning, and strengthening our partnerships with families and the community, we will take the steps needed to ensure long-term financial stability for AVCS.

Thank you for your continued trust, support, and commitment to our students and schools.

COMMUNITY UPDATE: UNDERSTANDING AUSABLE VALLEY'S FINANCIAL SITUATION

As a district, we take great pride in providing our students with outstanding educational experiences, strong academic programs, and safe, supportive learning environments. To continue delivering on that promise, it's important that we are transparent about the financial realities facing our school community and the steps we are taking to address them.

Where We Stand

The Long Range Financial Analysis, presented to the Board of Education in October 2025 by Dr. Rick Timbs, a leading expert in statewide school finance, identified significant fiscal challenges ahead for AuSable Valley Central School District. In short, our expenses are rising much faster than our revenues, and the gap is growing.

Over the last several years, the district benefited from federal COVID relief funding (CRRSA and ARPA), which helped us maintain staffing levels and support for students during an unprecedented time. Those temporary funds ended in September 2024, but many of the positions and programs they supported have continued. As a result, we are now relying more heavily on our fund balance (savings) to balance the annual budget, a practice that cannot continue long-term.

At the same time, state Foundation Aid growth, the main source of public school funding from New York State, has slowed dramatically. AuSable Valley is currently in a "save harmless" status, which means our Foundation Aid is being maintained but not increasing, a situation that occurs when student enrollment declines. In other words, while our costs continue to climb, our state aid does not increase.

Despite strong financial management and responsible budgeting, projections show that if no immediate action is taken, the district could face exhausting our fund balance (savings) by 2028 and could face a budget gap of more than \$6 million by 2030.

How We Got Here

Loss of Federal Funding: COVID-era federal grants have expired, but many funded positions and programs remain.

Rising Costs: Health insurance, transportation, salaries, and pension obligations continue to climb faster than revenue.

Flat State Aid Due to Declining Enrollment: Because of a drop in student enrollment, the district remains in "save harmless" status, receiving the same amount of Foundation Aid even as expenses grow.

Dependence on Fund Balance: The district has relied on savings to balance budgets.

Limited Revenue Growth: Although property values have increased, the state's tax cap limits our ability to raise revenue to match costs.

Planning for the Future

The Board of Education and district leadership are committed to addressing these challenges proactively and responsibly. Moving forward, we will:

- **Conduct** a detailed review of the 2026-27 budget to identify opportunities to reallocate resources and control spending. Short-term tax increases and cost reductions will be needed to stay financially stable.
- **Reevaluate** staffing levels and program costs, using attrition and reorganization where possible to reduce expenses while trying to preserve student opportunities.
- **Establish** and build financial reserves and avoid overreliance on one-time funds.
- **Plan** for future capital and transportation costs, including the upcoming zero-emissions bus mandate.
- **Explore** long-term solutions, such as consolidating facilities or pursuing shared services, to achieve greater efficiency.
- **Advocate** for fair and sustainable state funding for rural districts like AuSable Valley.

Looking Ahead

While the fiscal outlook is challenging, we remain confident in our ability to adapt and make thoughtful, data-driven decisions that protect the integrity of our educational mission. AuSable Valley's strength has always been its people, our students, families, staff, and community members who care deeply about our schools.

We will continue to communicate openly throughout this process and provide updates as new information becomes available. Together, we can ensure that AuSable Valley remains a district we are all proud to call home. Thank you for your continued support, understanding, and partnership.

FIELD OF FLAGS AT AVCS HONORS VETERANS

Seniors in the Participating in Government class at AuSable Valley Central High School created a Field of Flags beside Route 9N as a tribute to local veterans.

The display of 72 flags is timed for Veterans Day and serves as the students'way of saying "thank you" to community members who served. Each flag is dedicated to a veteran, and the project also raises funds for the Disabled American Veterans (DAV).

Social Studies teacher Jennifer Daniels introduced the idea this fall, and the students embraced it immediately. Their fundraising goal was \$500, but they collected \$860, which was enough to sponsor all 72 flags for the Field of Flags. Daniels said every student could name at least one veteran in their life and felt this was a meaningful way to honor them.

Several students have close personal ties to military service. Senior Jarrett Winters said multiple family members served, including a step-grandfather who fought in Vietnam and a Godfather who served in the Navy. He said he hoped the display would surprise them. Senior Tommy Brawn also kept the project secret from his family so they could experience the impact firsthand.

With guidance from AVCS Director of Facilities



Randy Pray, students used measuring tools and a ground hole-punch to place each flag exactly three feet apart. The quiet, steady work created a reflective atmosphere as the hillside filled with red, white, and blue.

The Field of Flags offers a powerful message of gratitude to all who travel between Ausable Forks and Keeseville. Proceeds support DAV Chapter #179, which provides specialized services and transportation for disabled veterans.

LULA PFENDLER BECOMES FIRST AVCS STUDENT BOARD MEMBER

Beginning July 1, 2025, New York State instilled a new law that gives students a voice within their schools. Every school across the state added at

least one student board member, allowing students to participate in public meetings and provide their perspectives within their school community.

AuSable Valley's first student board member is Lula Pfendler, a junior who is an active participant in academics and athletics at AVCS.

As a student board member in accordance with the new law, Lula attends public meetings and contributes to discussions. Student board members, however, do not have voting rights and are excluded from executive sessions and non-public meetings.

The New York State School Boards Association values student representation on the Board of Education. Including students in school governance ensures that their voices and perspectives are considered in decision-making processes. Student members can also help bridge the gap between the school board and the student body, ensuring that student needs and concerns are effectively communicated.

Here's our Q&A with Lula and her early thoughts as a Board member.

What has the beginning of the experience been like as a student board member?

Overall, everyone on the board has been very welcoming, and I am extremely honored to have

been chosen for this position. However, I have found it a little stressful, as I know it is a very important role and I want to make sure everyone's voices are heard.

What interested you in becoming a member?

For many years I feel like I've had ideas and thoughts that I have wanted to express, but I didn't have an outlet to relay my ideas through. The main reason I wanted to become a member of the board was to be able to give me and my peers a voice in our school community with me

being a middle ground between the students and the adults.
