## “DAY OF IMPACT” ON CAPITOL HILL, WASHINGTON, D.C.

Two hundred members of Hadassah, the Woman’s Zionist Organization of America, met in front of the Capitol in Washington, D.C., on March 10, as they took part in the organization’s annual lobbying day, “Day of Impact”. Prior to visiting legislators, Hadassah adopted two new policy statements at the March 2026 National Assembly Meeting, calling for the full disarmament of Hamas and for increased research on women’s health issues and greater protection for personal health data. “Hadassah’s advocacy is grounded in our work to empower women and strengthen the Jewish future in the U.S., Israel and around the world,” said Hadassah National President Carol Ann Schwartz. “Our new policy statements outline our positions on two critical and timely issues. The first new policy statement, Disarming Hamas as a Crucial Step to Lasting Peace, deals with the safety of the State of Israel. Israel will never be secure until Hamas has completely disarmed.”

The second new policy statement, Supporting Women’s Health Research and Data Privacy, reaffirms Hadassah’s commitment to advancing women’s health priorities through expanded research, inclusive clinical trials and stronger protection for personal health data. Despite comprising more than half of the US population, women remain underrepresented in clinical research, and medical conditions that disproportionately affect women remain underfunded. At the same time, the risks to data privacy created by the rapid growth of digital tools demand comprehensive digital privacy protection for personal health information, including data on reproductive and sexual health.

Paula Zucker, Hadassah Southeastern Region President, explains, “Hadassah has never sat on the sidelines, and we are not going to do so at this point in time. We brought the combined strength of nearly 300,000 members, donors and supporters directly to Congress to stand firm against antisemitism, to up the strategic U.S.-Israel alliance, and to safeguard the health and well-being of women everywhere”.

Hadassah members asked our elected officials to tackle the disparities affecting all aspects of women’s health. As the convener of the Coalition for Women’s Health Equity with a mission to create a united force, Hadassah serves as a critical leader, championing better women’s health outcomes through public education, legislative [advocacy](#), and stakeholder collaboration.

## Take Action to Combat Hate Crimes

Vulnerable communities across the country face growing threats of hate and violence. The bipartisan Improving Reporting to Prevent Hate Act would improve hate-crime data reporting efforts to respond to these threats and keep communities safe. [Urge Congress to pass this critical legislation.](#)

## IMPROVING REPORTING TO PREVENT HATE ACT

The FBI recorded over 11,600 hate crime incidents in 2024, including the 1,938 anti-Jewish incidents that make up almost 68% of religiously motivated hate crimes, despite Jews representing less than 2% of the population. The antisemitic attacks in Boulder, Colorado, and a Mississippi synagogue are just two examples of violent attacks against the Jewish community. The bipartisan, bicameral Improving Reporting to Prevent Hate Act (S. 3724 | H.R. 2588) will require the Department of Justice to develop a system to monitor, enforce and improve credible hate crime data reporting to respond to these threats. Urge Congress to help protect vulnerable communities!

### **C: SUPPORT ISRAEL**

The United Nations has become a global stage for actions that seek to isolate and delegitimize Israel, the only Jewish state. Recent threats to expel Israel from the international forum set a dangerous precedent and reward terrorists. Congress is considering the bipartisan, bicameral Stand with Israel Act (H.R. 7018 | S. 1521) that would send a strong signal of support for our ally, Israel. This bill would bar the United States from funding any UN agency if Israel is illegally expelled from the UN. Urge lawmakers to stand with our ally Israel and support this bill today! **GO TO:**

Defense Minister Israel Katz said Saturday, March 14th, that the war with Iran is entering what he described as its “decisive phase,” suggesting that conditions may be ripening for a final stage of the campaign. Speaking after a security assessment with senior IDF officers, the intelligence community and other defense officials, Katz said the conflict had reached the “stretch of decision,” which would continue as long as necessary.

“We are entering the stretch of decision, which will continue as long as required,” Katz said. “Only the Iranian people can put an end to it through determined struggle until the fall of the terror regime and the saving of Iran.” The call itself suggests that, at least in Israel, there is an assessment that conditions may be ripe and that the regime in Tehran has been weakened enough to enable effective pressure for change. Katz’s remarks effectively indicate that if the Iranian public does not take to the streets, the United States and Israel could continue the fighting until the regime capitulates.

Both U.S. President Donald Trump and Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said in recent weeks that when the time comes they would call on the Iranian public to take its fate into its own hands. At the same time, they stressed that moment had not yet arrived.

Katz’s statement appears to mark an initial call of that kind, suggesting that the Iranian public could help determine whether the war shortens or drags on. According to Katz, if the public in Iran — not only the opposition — applies effective pressure, there is a chance the regime could accept the surrender terms set by Trump. The fact that a lower-ranking political figure was authorized by Netanyahu — and possibly also by Trump — to issue such a message indicates it may be an initial move or trial balloon designed to test how the call resonates and what impact it might have on the ground. The two senior leaders, particularly the U.S. president, may not be certain what the outcome of such a call would be and therefore may prefer not to commit themselves publicly to actions that could depend on how civilians in Iran respond.

Still, an official statement by a senior government figure following a security assessment and decision-making meeting among Israel’s defense leadership sharpens the sense that the campaign against Iran may be approaching its final stage.

Katz stressed that the campaign would continue as long as necessary until a decisive outcome is achieved. That suggests that if the public in Iran does not act in the way Washington and Jerusalem hope — after the IDF and the U.S. military weakened the regime — the war could continue for several more weeks.

## PASSOVER FACTS

It involves the retelling of the Exodus story, consumption of symbolic foods, and the recitation of prayers and blessings. 4. The Haggadah, a text that sets forth the order of the Passover Seder, contains the narrative of the Exodus and provides a guide for the rituals and traditions observed during the meal. It is a cherished and essential component of the Seder, guiding participants through the evening's proceedings.
5. During Passover, the consumption of chametz (leavened food items) is prohibited. Instead, matzah, an unleavened bread, is eaten to symbolize the haste with which the Israelites fled Egypt. This dietary restriction is a fundamental part of the holiday observance.
6. The festival serves as a reminder of the Israelites' deliverance from bondage and their journey to freedom. It symbolizes the renewal of faith, the triumph of the human spirit, and the enduring hope for a brighter future.
7. Passover commences with the Seder, which takes place on the first two evenings of the festival. Families and communities come together to partake in the Seder rituals, fostering a sense of unity and shared heritage.
8. During Passover, individuals reflect on the blessings of freedom and express gratitude for the liberties they enjoy. It is a period for introspection, appreciation, and acknowledging the value of liberation.
9. Passover is characterized by a myriad of customs, including the removal of chametz from the home, the lighting of holiday candles, and the recitation of special blessings. These traditions contribute to the festive atmosphere and hold deep cultural and religious significance.
10. As part of the Seder ritual, the narrative of the ten plagues that befell Egypt is recounted. This serves as a poignant reminder of the hardships endured by the Israelites and the divine intervention that ultimately led to their freedom.
11. Families and communities come together to celebrate for shared meals, storytelling, and the strengthening of familial and communal bonds.
12. The timing of Passover aligns with the arrival of spring, symbolizing a season of renewal and new beginnings. This connection to nature adds a layer of symbolism to the holiday, signifying the themes of rejuvenation and hope.
13. The holiday encourages acts of compassion and generosity towards those in need. It serves as a reminder to extend a helping hand to others and to uphold the values of empathy and benevolence.
14. While Passover commemorates an ancient event, its themes of liberation, resilience, and faith remain pertinent in the modern context. The festival bridges the past and present, offering timeless lessons and inspiration.
15. Beyond its religious and cultural importance to the Jewish community, Passover conveys universal themes of freedom, justice, and the enduring human spirit. It serves as a source of inspiration and reflection for people of diverse backgrounds.

Passover is a cherished and profound observance that encapsulates the enduring legacy of the Israelites' journey to freedom and the timeless values it represents. This festival, with its rich traditions and symbolic rituals, continues to resonate with individuals and communities, fostering a spirit of unity, gratitude, and hope.
