



NCTS PROGRAMMING





A YEAR IN REVIEW

THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

2025 has been a challenging year. With our theatre closed since April of 2024, we have been in survival mode, and the next year is going to be equally challenging. But there is light at the end of this dark tunnel and there is much to be thankful for.

Since we formed our society in 2012, we have worked towards the goal of renovating our historic theatre. And after many starts and stops that were beyond our control, we are, at last, about to begin reconstruction.

If all goes according to schedule, at this time next year, we should be back showing movies in at least two of the 3 projected theatres. They may be works in progress because we still have a considerable way to go in raising funds to complete all three but they will be operational. And our patrons will enter a brand new lobby that pays homage to the art deco original. Needless to say, this is cause for excitement.

Our members tell us often how important The Civic Theatre is to our community. It's heartwarming to hear and means so much to those of us working to bring this project to fruition because we need the support of our community to get there. Our capital campaign, "A Home for our Imaginations" will run all year. This campaign is built on the conviction that imagination is not a luxury; it is nourishment. There is a myriad of ways that the community can help, and we are hopeful that we will see an upsurge in support, much as we did in 2012 when we worked to reopen the theatre.

I want to take this opportunity to thank the City of Nelson for its support. Both staff and Council are solidly behind this project and want to see us succeed, which is so appreciated.

Many thanks also to our Board of Directors for their commitment to NCTS.

And, most importantly, I give heartfelt thanks to our staff. There have been long, stressful hours, days, weeks this year. And throughout it all, they have risen to the challenges we face with enthusiasm and optimism.

A YEAR IN THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

his has been a year of preparation in motion, focused on getting ready for construction even as timelines evolved. Dates have shifted, but our commitment has stayed constant, and each step has brought us closer to reopening.

Throughout 2024–25, we concentrated on advancing the capital project and preparing our "A Home for Our Imaginations" campaign, which now has a clear goal to raise \$3 Million in 2026 to complete the renewed Civic Theatre.

We screened films year-round at The Shoebox and during Summer 2024 at the Civic Railtown Drive-In, both hosting the second STOODIS Indigenous Film Festival in September 2024. The Shoebox also welcomed families, birthday parties, community groups, and local filmmakers through rentals. At Reo's Video, we kept films accessible. Our Sketch Camp youth program returned for another creative summer.





Even without our main theatre, we delivered signature events, including the Zombie Walk, Home for the Holidays, and the Oscar Red Carpet Livestream & Karaoke Party, and continued regional initiatives like the Kootenay Screen-Based Industry Workers Program and the Kootenay Regional Film Commission (with Kootenay Rockies Tourism).

It has been a challenging year without The Civic open, but our members, audiences, donors, sponsors, and especially the City of Nelson have kept us moving. Your belief in The Civic, and in the future we are building, has sustained us.

This was a year of the hard, often invisible work that allows visible progress to happen. I am grateful to all of you, and to our dedicated staff and board, for your continued belief and commitment. Thank you for standing with us. The best part is still ahead.

DECEMBER PICK THE MUPPET CHRISTMAS CAROL

To get me in the mood for the holidays, my go to December movie is The Muppet Christmas Carol. It is, in my opinion, the most heartwarming chaotic masterpiece ever created. Where else can you find Dickensian ghosts, emotional redemption arcs, and a singing vegetable chorus all in one place? It is charming, it is musical, it is just the right amount of ridiculous, and honestly, watching Gonzo narrate classic literature is the festive energy I aspire to bring into the season. This film never fails to remind me that joy, community, and a little theatrical whimsy are what the holidays are all about.



JANUARY PICK THE SECRET LIFE OF WALTER MITTY

To get me through the humdrum, snowed in days of January, I turn to The Secret Life of Walter Mitty. There is something magical about watching someone break out of their routine and step, sometimes quite literally, into adventure. When the world outside feels frozen in place, this movie reminds me that creativity, imagination, and bold choices can spark warmth even in the coldest months. It is visually stunning, quietly inspiring, and the perfect nudge toward dreaming big while still wrapped in a blanket with a hot drink in hand.



FEBRUARY PICK THE PRINCESS BRIDE

To get me in the mood for everyone's second favourite Hallmark season, Valentine's Day, my February pick simply has to be The Princess Bride. It is the ultimate romantic adventure: equal parts true love, sword fighting, hilarious one liners, and dramatic cape swishing. This movie delivers all the heart without ever taking itself too seriously, which is exactly what February needs. It is sweet, clever, endlessly quotable, and it reminds me that even in the dead of winter, a little bit of whimsy and a well timed "As you wish" can go a very long way.



DESIGNING THE NEW CIVIC HAS BEEN ANYTHING BUT SIMPLE.

Our one-room theatre sits inside a poured-in-place concrete building from 1935, full of sloping floors, original materials, and structural quirks that make quick changes nearly impossible. Every improvement requires careful planning, creativity, and patience. And still, we remain undeterred because the vision is worth it.

Working closely with Nelson-based Cover Architectural Collaborative, we're creating a space that honours The Civic's Art Deco roots while thoughtfully reshaping it for the future. The design is practical, welcoming, and built to support a wider range of screenings, events, and community gatherings.

We are also working toward **Rick Hansen Foundation Accessibility Certification** (**RHFAC**), a national standard that measures meaningful, real-world accessibility. This will place The Civic among a small number of arts facilities in BC designed to meet or exceed universal design principles.

The comprehensive rebuild will modernize the main auditorium, create a warm, new lobby, and introduce two additional theatres. Transforming our historic one-room movie house into a fully realized, three-screen home for film, connection, and community.

1935 - A Bold Beginning

Construction begins on the Civic Centre, hailed as "BC's major building project of 1935."



1936 - Grand Opening

The 954-seat auditorium opens with cutting-edge theatrical and film technology.



1938 - Famous Players Era

Famous Players leases The Civic, hosting films, touring acts, and live performances for decades.



2010 - Curtains Close

A private renovation stalls, leaving the theatre dark and unfinished.



2012 - The Rally

Community members, led by Cindy Sherry, mobilize to save The Civic.



2012-2013 - NCTS is Born

Over 4,000 signatures, 1,000 members, and unanimous City support secure the theatre's future.



2013-2019 - Upgrades

The theatre goes digital, rebuilds the concession, installs air-conditioning, purchases a retractable screen and myriad lighting and sound upgrades. Programs and services grow substantially.



2020-present - Major Project

\$3.3 million secured in 2020. Pandemic, roof failure, snow-load warnings, and rising costs follow. Design for the 3-screen project is underway; major fundraising begins in 2026.

WHAT ARE WE WORKING TOWARD?

AN ACCESSIBLE & WELCOMING SPACE FOR ALL.

Built for Everyone

Accessibility has guided every design decision. The new Civic will include:

- A LU/LA (Limited Use/Limited Accessibility) lift connecting the lobby and new theatres.
- Accessible and inclusive washrooms.
- Flexible seating that allows wheelchairs and mobility aids to integrate naturally, with enough space for companions and family members too.
- Assistive listening systems.
- Audio description capability for guests who are blind or have low vision, providing real-time narration of on-screen action.
- Tactile signage and visual contrast to improve wayfinding for everyone.

THE FUTURE OF THE CIVIC

1

What is happening at The Civic Theatre?

We're transforming Nelson's historic single-screen Civic Theatre into a fully accessible, modern, three-screen community media arts centre.

2

Why three theatres?

Three screens mean more flexibility—different shows for different audiences, longer runs, private rentals, and better programming options year-round. Our projections also consistently point to a future with three screens that is financially stable.

3

Didn't this project start ages ago? What's the hold up?

Yes, and we totally understand the confusion. The building's closure began in April 2024 due to the City's necessary roof and infrastructure upgrades.

CUSTOMER APPRECIATION DAY LAST WEDNESDAY OF EVERY MONTH

The nature of the City's work meant that it needed to be completed before our interior renovations could begin. We have worked diligently throughout this time to develop our design plans.

Tendering for our project is taking place this winter, and we expect to be able to break ground early in 2026.

Will ticket prices go up?

The very most important thing to us is that you can see a movie at The Civic Theatre. We're designing pricing to stay accessible through:

- Regular affordable tickets
- Discounted & barrier-free options
- Free and all-ages events
- Membership benefits & points

How much will the whole project cost?

It is expected that it will cost approximately \$6.5 Million. We've already raised more than \$3.6 Million, so in 2026 our goal is to raise the balance. If we can't meet this target, the project may need to be phased, which will cost more and take longer, so we are really focused on reaching this goal on time.

Where has the \$3.625 Million gone?

It's been committed to the actual capital costs: design, permits, construction, accessibility, equipment, and more. All of our grants for this project are tied to specific uses and timelines (with some extensions in our case, given the situation).


WHY IT MATTERS

LET THE CREDITS ROLL

When I saw my first movie in the Nelson Civic Theatre, E.T. wanted to phone home. That was 1982, and phones were clunky rotary dial affairs attached to a wall. The Civic was independently run, the floor was perpetually sticky, and teenagers necked in the back row.

From that first film I was struck by what I saw as a curiously Nelson habit: everyone stays to watch the credits roll. I'd never seen such a thing! Did people just want to sit in the dark, the better to grasp at the last wisps of cinematic magic? Did they have a burning desire to find out the name of the Best Boy, Key Grip, or Gaffer? Were they otherwise occupied in the back row?

My next first movie was in 2013 in the newlyopened, pre-digital Civic Theatre. Skyfall was our grand re-opening; many came dressed as spies and femme fatales, and all came to enjoy the newest episode in Nelson's history of screening films, which began in the 1920s. We followed Daniel Craig as James Bond through two hours and 23 minutes of twists and turns—and yes, we stayed to watch the credits.

It was a both thrill and a balm to be back. I was president of the new Nelson Civic Theatre Society, and by then we had been hard at work for some time at everything from feasibility studies to seat installation, fundraising for a digital projector, and building a vision together. What the community assumed would be the return of our beloved movie theatre has since become much more thanks to a combination of hive mind and chutzpah.

There have been some unforeseen hiccups (a pandemic, imminent roof collapse, ballooning costs), and yet the flowering of the Civic Theatre has been astonishing. It is all due to a credit-roll of creative and persistent people who rolled up their sleeves and got at it. The people behind the Nelson Civic Theatre—your friends and neighbours—have shared the responsibilities of Director and Producer; Gaffer, Key Grip, and Best Boy; Composer, Consultant, Casting Director, and Caterer.

The result is an epic tale of innovation and inclusion, from the Stoodis Indigenous Film Festival to zombie walks, and a whole lot in between. A movie Theatre? Sure. Creativity incubation centre? Yes, indeed. Community-builder? Always, and forever.

I have come to believe that Nelson's creditwatching tendencies are born of a reluctance to leave that happy collective experience as we emerge, blinking, to smile at our neighbours seated around us. Reading between those rolling credit lines is an unspoken recognition that we, collectively, wrote the screenplay that is the Nelson Civic Theatre, with all its twists and turns.


As much as things change, they stay the same: my phone is now smart, and we are again waiting for the Civic Theatre to reopen. The next act, of course, is the long-planned renovation to three screens, essential to securing The Civic's future so that the next generation can stay and watch the credits roll—unless they are otherwise occupied in the back row.

As for my next first movie in the reopened and renovated Nelson Civic Theatre—I can hardly wait.
