# We work towards the day when every child in every village gets to go to school and every one of them gets to hear a clear presentation of the Gospel.

### **Expanding our network of schools**

As of 2022, we have 63 schools in 4 countries and 15 more are under construction.

### Increasing enrollment with at least 50% girls

Currently, 52% of our 15,660 students are girls. 1,465 are orphans.

### High academic performance

As of 2021, 99% of students passed and 73% did well enough to go on to college!

### Visible community service

Our largest project is our HIV/AIDS clinic that serves 1,296 people every month.

### **Continuing involvement**

41 of our 706 staff are our graduates and 8 serve on our International Teams.

### Sustainable financing

Last year parents paid \$1,086,000, fully covering our teacher and staff salaries.

# Key Assumptions



# **Schools Built and Opened**






We are partnering with 291 villages to run the 63 schools we have built together since 2005.

# **Students Enrolled Annually**






# **Cumulative Number of Graduates**






226 missionaries have come mostly from churches in the United States and Canada to live in these communities and teach our students.


9,690 students have already graduated from our schools. Most have gone on to universities and colleges. 41 have returned to serve with Village Schools.
