

**Summer Theatre:** Roberta Jones Jr. Theatre presents two exciting productions this summer and tickets are on sale now!



# Setting Bold Climate Targets for a Sustainable Future

The impacts of climate change today require bold action to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and ensure a healthy and livable future for all. As part of the City's commitment to creating a Sustainable Santa Clara, the City established a Climate Action Plan in 2013. On June 7, the City closed out over two years of community engagement and development of a comprehensive upgrade to the City's Climate Action Plan, with a unanimous City Council adoption. The newly adopted Climate Action Plan 2022 Update sets new targets for reaching aggressive emissions reductions across five main category areas: Buildings and Energy, Transportation and Land Use, Materials and Consumption, Natural Systems and Water Resources and Community Resilience and Well-Being. In developing the strategies, the City considered how actions contribute to social and economic co-benefits like emissions reductions, equity, green jobs, cost savings and others. # **Funding for Home Repair Available to Eligible Homeowners**

Is your home in need of accessibility modifications or health and safety repairs - such as roofing, plumbing, heating or cooling, electrical, termite damage repair, weatherization, or energy efficiency improvements? Income-qualified homeowners who cannot afford these repairs may apply for assistance through the City of Santa Clara Neighborhood Conservation & Improvement Program (NCIP). Since 1976, the City has assisted more than 1,600 homeowners to rehabilitate their homes, address health and safety issues, and ensure compliance with the current building code.

The NCIP is designed for owner-occupied single-family homes with gross incomes at or below 80% of County median income (\$131,750 for a household of 4, \$105,400 for a household of 2).

The NCIP program has recently changed and now offers the following options:

may be eligible when

#### **Minor Repair Grant:**

- The City's Housing & Community Services Division has partnered with Rebuilding Together Silicon Valley (RTSV) to administer a grant
- After determining eligibility, RTSV will perform a home assessment and work with the homeowner to prioritize a scope of work. The work will be completed by qualified contractors and overseen by RTSV.
- Grants up to \$25,000 are available on a first come, first served basis subject to funding availability.

#### **Major Repair Loan:**

- On a more limited basis, the Housing & Community Services Division will administer low-interest, deferred payment loans for homes needing more significant repairs.
- After determining eligibility, City staff will help individual homeowners identify significant rehabilitation needs, ways to save energy and water, and will assist with finding a qualified contractor. City staff will provide financial and technical assistance and will oversee the construction process.
- Loan amounts will vary depending on the scope of work. Funding will be available on a first come, first served basis subject to funding availability.

# City of Santa Clara Housing Element Update **Currently in Progress**

California state law mandates that all local governments adequately plan to meet the housing needs of their communities at all income levels. To fulfill that requirement, Santa Clara, like all other Bay Area towns, cities, and counties, is required to submit an adopted Housing Element to the State Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) by January 2023.

The Housing Element must include identified sites for planned housing and pro-housing policies and strategies for how Santa Clara can achieve the development of the units allocated by the end of the sixth housing element cycle in January 2031.

Under the law, the State Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) first determines each region's housing need for an upcoming eight-year planning period. The regional council of governments, which in the Bay Area is the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG), then allocates a "fair share" of the unit total to each jurisdiction through the Regional Housing Needs

Local governments are required to update their housing elements to show how they will accommodate their share of the RHNA. Because the State assigned an overall housing need for the Bay Area that is approximately 2½ times the need for the prior housing element cycle, jurisdictions throughout the ABAG region have received significantly larger RHNA targets than they did in prior RHNA cycles.

Allocation (RHNA) process.

#### **Santa Clara RHNA Allocation**

The RHNA sets a citywide target for housing production over the 8-year housing element timeframe. The City of Santa Clara has been given the following RHNA distribution for the sixth housing element cycle:

• Very Low-Income Units (0-50% of Area Median Income (AMI)): 2,872

Low Income Units (50-80% AMI): 1,653

- Moderate Income Units (80-120% AMI): 1,981
- Above Moderate (Market Rate) Units: 5,126
- Total RHNA: 11,632

More than half of the identified capacity will need to meet the State's criteria to qualify as affordable housing capacity.

For reference, 4,093 units were assigned to the City of Santa Clara in the current fifth housing element cycle (2015 to 2023).

In the San Jose-Sunnyvale-Santa Clara HUD Metro Fair Market Rate Area AMI for a family of four is \$141,600 for 2020. Very Low-Income housing is defined as housing affordable to households with an income of \$70,800 or less.

#### **Strategies**

While Santa Clara's RHNA allocation is 2½ times higher than the previous cycle and will be challenging to address, the City has been working in the last few years on significant long-range planning efforts to support growth in several strategic areas throughout the city.

#### **Long-Range Planning Efforts**

The City is currently working on focused redevelopment within areas of the city through the development of the Patrick Henry Drive Specific Plan, Downtown Precise Plan, and Freedom Circle Focus Area. The Tasman East Specific Plan is also proposed to be amended to potentially increase capacity beyond the 4,500 units which were originally adopted with the original plan in 2018. The efforts of these and other previously approved long-

> range planning efforts could culminate in a total of over 16,000 new units that may be constructed in the sixth RHNA cycle.

### Citywide Affordable Housing Ordinance

The City also has a citywide affordable housing ordinance, which was adopted by the City Council in 2018, and which will help to deliver affordable housing units as a part of every market-rate housing development. Santa Clara was one of the first cities in Santa Clara County to adopt such an ordinance and includes a commercial linkage fee so that most types of new development contribute to the creation of affordable housing. The current ordinance requires that all rental or

ownership residential projects with ten or more units provide 15% of the units at rents or sales prices that are affordable to households

at a Moderate-Income level of 100% AMI

### **Accessory Dwelling Units**

State law has facilitated the production of affordable housing by reducing the ability of local jurisdictions to apply restrictive standards or a discretionary process for the review of accessory dwelling units (ADUs). Like most cities, Santa Clara has seen an increase in the development of ADUs and has issued building permits for 129 ADUs since 2019. This data can be used to show how the City will, in part, meet its future RHNA requirements through new ADU construction.

#### **Next Steps**

The City is currently drafting its Housing Element Update. A draft for public review will be available in June 2022.

The City Council held a joint study session with the Planning commission on April 19, 2022, which was attended by approximately 100 people in the Council Chambers and 100 people participating online. As a part of the Housing Element Update process, the City will hold additional outreach meetings in June and July 2022.

# Independent Redistricting Commission Adopts New Map

Every 10 years, cities must redistrict (adjust Council District boundaries to equalize total populations) using the new Census counts. Federal and state laws apply to this process and Cities must adopt new boundaries before April 17, 2022. These new Council Districts will be used until Census 2030 data are released.

At the July 6, 2021 City Council meeting, the City Council adopted a Resolution establishing an Independent Redistricting Commission (IRC) to conduct public engagement and recommend a new City Council District election map based on 2020 U.S. Census data.


To meet this mandate a random draw took place at a public meeting on Aug. 26, 2021 to select each member of the Commission. The 8-member commission consisted of one member for each of the City's six districts, 1 citywide commissioner, and one alternate Commissioner. Lapkoff & Gobalet Demographic Research, Inc. was hired to assist the process with their expertise and provided a plan drawing 'pieces tool' to the Commission and public for use.

The Commission held 6 Public Hearings and listened to feedback from Demographers, Lapkoff & Gobalet, as well as considered over 10 draft maps that were presented by members of the public and the Demographers.

The IRC created criteria for finalization of a final map including keeping percent deviation below 10% and keeping the map contiguous & compact. On Feb. 28, 2022 the IRC adopted Map 4A, a minimal change redistricting map which included boundary changes to Council Districts 1, 2, 4, and 5. This map kept percent deviation below 10% and kept communities of interest intact; which was criteria set forth by the Commission. Map 4A shifts an area of District 2 into District 1 and an area of District 4 into District 5. These boundary



modifications affect 2,210 residents. Additionally, the approved map minimized the number of people who would have to wait 6 years to vote due to a change in council district boundaries. The IRC also made it a priority to minimize the percent deviation in the next Census by reviewing the City of Santa Clara's upcoming development plans.

The IRC presented final map 4A to the City Council at the March 22, 2022 meeting. Council voted unanimously to approve the introduction of an ordinance adopting a new City Council District map describing the district boundaries for the City of Santa Clara's By-District elections.

## Thefts from Vehicles are On the Rise

It can happen in seconds – the shatter of glass, a quick reach inside, and your personal valuables vanish from sight. Unfortunately, it's far from a rare occurrence.

Thefts from vehicles usually involve small dollar values regarding the property stolen but take up considerable police resources. Vehicle thefts are time-consuming for the victim and costly to resolve: police report, time off work to coordinate repairs, insurance deductible for window repair, replace stolen items, etc. They also increase insurance rates and can erode residents' feelings of safety and security.

Most thefts from vehicles are crimes of opportunity – and, are easily preventable. Take these proactive steps to reduce your risk of becoming a victim.

 Do not leave ANY valuables (e.g. loose change, GPS, gym bag, purse/wallet, charging cords, garage remote, or sunglasses) in your vehicle or in your trunk. Suspects have been known to break windows, fold the back seat, and access trunks



- Do not leave cell phones, iPads or laptops in your vehicle. Thieves have been known to locate signals from these devices even when they are in "sleep mode"
- Report suspicious activity by calling 408-615-5580. In-progress incidents should be reported by calling 9-1-1. Do NOT confront suspects. Instead, be a good witness.

Law enforcement cannot conduct effective preventative measures unless the full scope of the problem is understood.

# Put the Brakes on Sideshow Activity and Illegal Street Racing

The dangers of sideshows and street racing are obvious – drivers, passengers and spectators are at risk for injury or wrongful death.

Sideshows and street racing are also illegal because of the disruption it causes for the public – blocks traffic, noise, reckless driving, speeding, and property damage. Throughout the region, these gatherings are happening more frequently, are getting bigger and have resulted in disorderly conduct.

Help the Police Department rev up enforcement of organized street racing and sideshow activity in our City. If you witness illegal street racing or sideshow activity, contact the Santa Clara Police Department via the non-emergency phone number, 408-615-5580. In an emergency, dial 9-1-1.

Text to 9-1-1 is available for individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing, incapable of speech or are in a dangerous situation where it is not safe to place a voice call (e.g. home intruder, domestic violence, etc.).

For non-emergency situations (e.g. vandalism, fraud, theft from a vehicle, loud party, graffiti, suspicious circumstances, etc.) call 408-615-5580. Depending on the nature of the call, individuals may be referred to **scpd.org** to file a police report online.

# Six simple steps to save water:

#### 1 Reduce watering to two days per week or fewer

Santa Clarans must limit outdoor watering to no more than two days per week between 6 p.m. and 9 a.m., as approved by City Council on April 19, 2022.

- Odd-numbered addresses and sites with no addresses may water Monday and Thursday
- Even-numbered addresses may water **Tuesday and Friday**

Spray irrigation zones should run no more than 15 minutes each, or less time if runoff occurs sooner. Visit **SantaClaraCA**. **gov/SaveOurWater** for drought updates and current watering restrictions.

#### 2 Replace plants with California Natives to withstand drought

Trading out traditional plants for California natives one irrigation zone at a time achieves significant water savings while transitioning to a beneficial, sustainable landscape. Acclimated to California's weather, natives barely sip water once established while providing habitat for local pollinators and wildlife. They require no fertilizer or planting amendments, helping to keep our water and soil clean. Many are evergreen, giving gardens attractive lushness with little to no water. Visit calscape.org for native plant ideas.

### 3 Water trees to ensure our climate health

Trees clean our air, combat heat, provide habitat to wildlife, and, in some cases, supply food. Strategic tree planting can significantly reduce the need for artificial cooling in homes, lowering utility bills

and taking some stress off energy infrastructure. Help preserve their health! Most trees require just 5-gallons of water every two weeks from May to October (costing less than \$0.75 for 65 gallons total, less than what the average resident uses in a single day).

#### 4 Replace your lawn with Landscape Conversion Rebate

The City of Santa Clara and Valley Water offers a Landscape Conversion Rebate of \$3 per square foot for qualifying existing lawn (up to \$4,000 for residential customers). Visit **valleywater.org** for rebate details. Wait until fall to plant to take advantage of optimal conditions: warm soil and cooler air. In the meantime, turn off your lawn irrigation to save water all summer and sheet mulch your lawn to get ready!

#### 5 Check irrigation zones regularly to catch leaks

Manually run each irrigation zone for a couple of minutes while checking the whole zone carefully. For spray, look for water running down sprinkler bodies or shooting into the air. For drip, watch for pooled water or upward spray where emitters may have failed, or tubing may be damaged. Listen carefully for unusual sputtering that could indicate tubing tears or faulty emitters. Large pools of water may indicate broken laterals underground. Disable individual zones until repairs can be made.

#### 6 Stop overspray! Sidewalks and driveways don't need water

Fix overspray right away! With the zone running, ratchet the sprinkler riser to the desired angle or adjust the trajectory of the spray head with cautious use of an irrigation screwdriver. Other issues may require replacing the sprinkler head or body. Disable individual zones until repairs can be made. Need a free irrigation screwdriver? # Owning Water Conservation Lifestyles

As California residents, we are feeling the fatigue of hearing about the persisting drought conditions. With most of the state in severe or extreme drought, it can be overwhelming to figure out what any one of us can do to make an impact. As your water service providers, we ask that you don't give up hope and know that we are here to help you conserve with rebates,



resources and tips for indoor and outdoor water savings.

Responding to drought conditions and regulations with temporary conservation measures wears us all down and is not a long-term solution. Water is our most valuable resource, second only to air. Let's make the mindset shift together and create permanent water use choices that allow us

to live water conservation rather than worry about water conservation. About half the residential water is being used outdoors, so the warm summer months are a great time to start preparing your low water landscape plans. # It's Time to Make the Change to a Drought Tolerant Garden

Lawn conversion is a trend with promise in Santa Clara as droughts persist and linger. Landscape Conversion Rebate participants in the City increased 60% in the 2020/21 water year compared to the year prior; given mid-year totals, Landscape Conversion rebates are set to double. Santa Clarans who have removed their lawns enjoy varied and resilient landscapes full of color and texture while saving water.

"The most challenging thing about the whole process was making the decision to do it," said NJ Gleason, a Santa Clara native who completed her front lawn conversion in October 2021. "I thought I'd spend the rest of my life having lawn out front. I was used to it; I had it my whole life." What changed her mind? "Saving water! Instead of being part of the problem with my corner lot lawn, now I'm part of the solution. Having that rebate meant that my city, my valley, was really working to make this environment that could live with climate change and still have beautiful gardens. I look out my front windows so much more than I ever did. And I love it!"

Santa Clara has partnered with Valley Water to offer increased rebates for the Landscape Conversion Rebate, making lawn conversion easy to love. With a straightforward online application process and Santa Clara residents eligible to

receive \$3 per square foot of lawn, the most challenging part may be choosing the plants!

Jerry Pohorsky skirted plant selection entirely: "Since I don't have any talent when it comes to landscape design, I used a company called Water Efficient Gardens to do the project of eliminating my front lawn and nearly all of my back lawn and replacing them with beautiful flowering



plants and a couple of fruit trees. The designer knew which plants to use for the project." His new landscape was completed in 2020. Last summer, his water use was 50% of his 2019 usage, a significant savings.

NH of the Forest Park neighborhood took a fully hands-on approach, turning over the lawn, installing inline drip irrigation, planting and sheet mulching entirely on her own. "I got a little sore shoveling the mulch on top," laughed the 64-year-old, "Good exercise. Everything turned out great. I like the look better. I was able to pick a variety of drought-tolerant plants that bloom at different times of the year; I pretty much have something blooming all the time." She now relishes watching hummingbirds from her kitchen window. "I was expecting the butterflies, but the hummingbirds are a bonus." Regarding the rebate process overall, "I thought it was easy," she said, "I had a lot of fun picking the plants." With many nurseries closed in 2020 because of the pandemic, she had some trouble finding plants,







but Valley Water provided an extension and answered all her questions: "I felt really supported." She's now enjoying the second year of her cottage garden as it fills in with loads of color using scarcely any water.


# **Bicycle and Scooter Share**

# Participate in the Youth Firesetter Prevention & Intervention Program

#### **The Problem**

Nationwide, more than half of all intentionally set fires are started by youths under 18. Each year in this country, fires set by youth are responsible for hundreds of fire deaths, thousands of painful burn injuries, and hundreds of millions of dollars in property loss, according to the U.S. Fire Administration:

- More than half are under the age of 15 years old;
- 7% are under the age of 10; and
- 23 out of 100 people who die in fires in the U.S are children.

#### **Community Risk Reduction**

The Santa Clara Fire Department's Community Risk Reduction Division recently accepted the leadership role for the Santa Clara County Fire Chiefs Association, Youth Firesetter Prevention & Intervention program (YFPI). The YFPI program is designed to identify, evaluate, and educate youth prone to fire setting or arson behavior. The program strives to determine the scope and impact of the youth fire setting and initiate intervention and prevention measures through the education of the child and their parent(s).

The Countywide YFPI is a recognized diversion program by Santa Clara County Juvenile Courts, allowing youth offenders to have their records expunged upon completing the YFPI program. Perhaps more importantly, it helps identify and educate their families on available resources since fire-setting is often a symptom of a more complex issue(s).

Remember, interest in fire is natural; setting fires is not! The goal of the YFPIP is to create and implement identification, prevention, and intervention strategies to address fire-setting behavior successfully. The program is designed to work closely with Schools, Community Mental Health, Social Services, Police, and Parents.

#### **Factors Influencing Firesetting**

- Easy access to lighters and matches: In many homes where a child was involved in starting a fire, they easily discovered the matches or lighter or knew exactly where to find them.
- Lack of supervision Providing supervision is essential. Parents are often shocked to learn their child was engaged in firesetting over a prolonged period.
- Failure to practice fire safety: Young children, teens, and parents often lack understanding of the dangers of firesetting and safety rules about the fire.
- Easy access to information on the Internet:
  Technology has made explicit media available to
  youths about many dangerous and often illegal
  activities for them to replicate.

- Discourage children from behaving in an unsafe manner near traffic, such as darting into the street without looking or crossing against a traffic signal;
- Encourage children to walk their bicycle or scooter in crosswalks;
- Use existing gaps in traffic to help students cross safely. When the natural traffic flow does not allow enough time for children to safely cross a street, a Crossing Guard may create gaps by stopping traffic temporarily;
- Alert motorists that pedestrians of unsafe traffic safety behaviors; and,
- Observe and report any incidents or conditions that present a potential safety hazard.

# Jenn Panko Becomes First Female SCFD Battalion Chief in Santa Clara History

The City of Santa Clara Fire Department made history last month by promoting 25-year veteran Jenn Panko to Battalion Chief, the first female in Santa Clara history to ever hold that position.

Panko began her career with the department in 1997, was promoted to Driver Engineer in 2004, to Fire Captain in 2007, and began serving on the Command Staff in temporary duty assignments in 2016. With her new role as EMS Battalion Chief, she has served in four of the department's divisions throughout her 25-years.



In addition to her duties as Battalion Chief, Panko is the department's Recruitment Team Leader, Behavioral Health and Wellness Program Coordinator, member of the department's Inclusion, Diversity and Equity Task Force, and led the City's Senior Meal Delivery Program during the pandemic.

She is a founding board member of NorCal Women in the Fire Service, a non-profit she helped form in 2018 that partners with Bay Area fire agencies to host Girls Fire Camps. These camps introduce high-school-age girls to the tools of the fire service. Nationwide only 4% of sworn fire service personnel are women. Chief Panko hopes her promotion into this leadership position may help encourage more women to consider the opportunities a career in the fire service may provide.

"It is important for public safety personnel and leadership to reflect the demographics of the communities we serve," Panko says. "As humans, we relate to familiarity. To aspire to the highest level of customer service, we must be as diverse as the community we serve to provide that familiarity to the public in gender, ethnicity, culture, and language. An extensive range of skills is required to successfully respond to the community's needs. The more diverse skills our group of responders possess, the better prepared we will be for any challenge."

Panko says she has benefited from having many inspirational role models and mentors throughout her upbringing and fire service career. She is excited to have this opportunity to carry the mentorship torch for future generations as the department's first female chief officer, hoping there are many more to come after her.
