Greetings Airrows!


Good afternoon. Bears often show up in Native American stories as symbols of strength, wisdom and healing and who couldn't use more this in today's age? Insider Travel Tip: Bella Coola's Tweedsmuir Park Lodge



Along central British Columbia's coast there is a place called Bella Coola, so named for the Nuxalk people, who settled here 10,000 years ago and continue to live in this area today. Bella Coola is in the heart of the mythically named Great Bear Rainforest, and when I go I'll stay in the Tweedsmuir Park Lodge, where newest Tomorrow's Air partner Bella Coola Heli Sports bases its summer time grizzly viewing safari. The company operates in Bella Coola's Coast Mountains, with both summer and winter offerings. Starting this July, guests contributing to Tomorrow's Air will have their contribution matched by the company.

I love this for the chance see a grizzly, to walk through the exotic old growth forest, to drift down the Atnarko river with snow capped peaks overhead. 
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


When I first came across Claudia Bueno's work I was mesmerized. Her large scale installations use lights, motors, circuits, sound, wind, and video along with detailed

drawings and meticulous cutouts to create whole worlds that visitors call 'hypnotic.' At Meow Wolf's space in Las Vegas her piece 'Pulse' is made up of a multitude of white line drawings that are meticulously intertwined and superimposed on 60 glass panels. I find her work a provocative meditation on nature and technology together. She sees her work as a celebration of life and creation, and has been gracious enough to lend her work to the education and awareness building + carbon removal mission of Tomorrow's Air. 

Susie Strife, Boulder County's director of climate action observed in an article for The Hill, "This coalition, representing cities and counties in Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico and Utah allows

us to punch above our weight and drive rapid progress on CDR." Municipal efforts may seem small, but they are vital in setting precedent for larger efforts, and helping build momentum for carbon removal. **Until Next Time**
