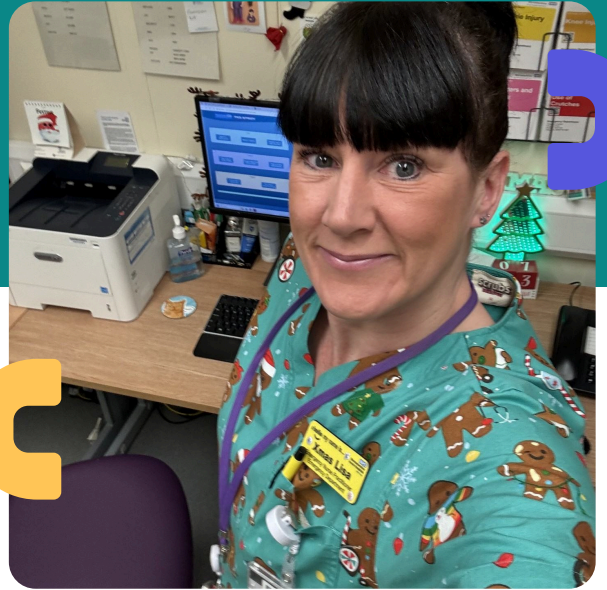


Precision at pace: Why Accurx Scribe is a game-changer for Worcestershire’s emergency front door

Pilot Overview

In November 2025, Worcestershire Acute NHS Foundation Trust (WAHT) began piloting Accurx Scribe, supporting 80 clinicians to reduce administrative burnout. To date, the project has automated over 2,000 clinical notes, with the team currently seeing an average saving of 7.5 hours of clinical time per day.

The challenge: "Memory Gymnastics"

As the pilot’s most active user we spoke to Lisa Hatful, an Emergency Nurse Practitioner to understand the shift she has seen since using Accurx Scribe. She describes going from "nightmare documentation" to digital efficiency in days. Managing demanding 12-hour shifts in the MIU, Lisa previously spent 5–10 minutes per patient manually typing notes from memory. This "memory gymnastics" - recalling complex histories and medications while tethered to a desk - created a significant administrative drain on clinical time.

Three changes Lisa noticed with Accurx Scribe

"It is incredibly accurate with complex medication lists. Even when patients mispronounce their meds, Scribe corrects them. What used to take ~10 minutes of manual entry is now seamless and takes me less than ~5 minutes."
