Baritone Rahzé Sinclair (*né* Cheatham), described as having the ability to "move to tears", is praised as a "wonderfully sensitive" artist with "crystalline diction" and a strong foundation in music, theatre art, and dance applications.

Armed with the perspective of the intersection of mis- and underrepresented communities, Rahzé seeks to break through an otherwise homogenous music scene. In addition to performing original works, Rahzé enjoys learning and performing works from 1900-forward, by little-known and unknown composers and poets, especially artists of color and LBGTQ-identified artists. They inhabit a liminal space only accessible through a lifetime of otherization, yet extend a bridge to invite others to that space. The ticket for admission, an open mind; the reward, a journey of exploration, growth, and healing.

More than offer beautiful music, Rahzé seeks to dismantle institutional structures that prohibit artistic discovery in underserved communities; to examine the ways in which music and art are the fundamental materials necessary for crafting a thriving self; and to inspire the systemic and systematic changes that create and maintain measures that better serve those communities.

THIS 2024-25 SEASON, Rahzé joins Der Gestanke in the concert premiere of The Little Red Hen by Elena Doria Winell. Later, they will make their Telltale Opera Theatre debut in the organization's Sandbox Showcase, premiering work by Meg Huskin. Then, Rahzé will uplift the work of Bethany Younge and Kayleigh Butcher on the Der Gestanke Duos II concert in New York. Shortly thereafter, they will perform as a soloist on the Asylum Seekers Housing Network and Reservoir Hill House of Peace fundraising and benefit concert. They will also serve as a Resident Artist for Project Poetic Justice, a special two-part concert that connects professional musicians and composers with incarcerated young people. Finally, later this season, Rahzé will serve as vocal director for the Baltimore School for the Arts production of Godspell by Stephen Schwartz, and music director for the Joint BSA x Showdown Theatre Academy production of STRING by Adam Gwon (book, Sarah Hammond) in London.

MOST RECENTLY, Rahzé performed on a recital series paying homage to the works of Charles Ives, Arnold Schoenberg, and their 20th- and 21st-century offshoots at Baltimore's *An die Musik Live!* Previously, they programmed and performed in *Queer, "I"*, a feature-length recital exploring queerness as both liminal space and destination. Earlier, they made their Community Concerts at Second recital debut alongside members of the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra. Additionally, they were a featured soloist in *gallery of life*, an evening of staged art songs in honor of environmental sustainability.

OTHER NOTABLE PROJECTS include a formal address to the Peabody Conservatory graduating Class of 2024 and soloist engagement for the Johns Hopkins University School-Wide Commencement. They also delivered a live narration of Philip Glass's memoir, *Music Without Words* in dialogue with music from his *Piano Etudes*, performed by pianist Vicky Chow at the George Peabody Library.

Additionally, at the behest of the Kahilu Theatre of Hawai'i, Rahzé made their role debut as Angel Dumott Schunard in *RENT* by Jonathan Larson. Other stage appearances include the premiere of several new chamber opera works, including *The Chisel* (Galatea) by Andrew Faulkenberry and *Take Me Down* (Clark) by Michael Mills, and a role debut as Bartley in *Riders to the Sea* by Ralph Vaughan Williams. Solo and collaborative concert engagements include the *Activating the Renaissance* Recital at the Walters Art Museum; their work as a soloist in the Johns Hopkins University Black Heritage Celebration, *The Resiliency of Black Sound and Rhythm*; and the *Recital and Festival Evensong of Frederick Douglass* at St. David's Episcopal Church, where they also served as the 2022-23 Composer-in-Residence, premiering several new choral works.

OTHER PERFORMANCE HIGHLIGHTS include, in conjunction with San Francisco's Transgender District, Rahzé's Opera Paralèlle debut in EXPANSIVE, a recital showcase of transgender and agender classical artists. Additionally, they made their Kahilu Theatre debut reprising the role of Hannah before in As One during the 2022 Hawai'i Performing Arts Festival. Other season engagements include a recital featuring the music of Jake Heggie and Jeremy Earnest as a soloist and recipient of the Baltimore Motor House D.A.P. grant; their Lowell Chamber Orchestra debut for the landmark 49th performance of As One by Laura Kaminsky, with libretto by Kimberly Reed and Mark Campbell; and a performance featuring the work of Shawn Okpebholo, Leonard Bernstein, and Julius Eastman for the 2021 CAAPA Emerging Artist Recital. Finally, Rahzé moderated As One: The Work Continues..., a panel discussion reflecting on transgender and nonbinary visibility in the arts before returning to the Rise Bmore stage to deliver the words of bell hooks.

They also acted as the managing Concert Coordinator for the Summit Concert Series at Erickson Living Oak Crest Village during the 2021-2024 seasons.

AS AN ARTS EDUCATOR, they host a private voice studio of beginner, intermediate, and advanced students across multiple genres. Additionally, Mx. Sinclair maintains faculty positions at the Baltimore School for the Arts within the Music and Theatre departments. Through a holistic approach to musical and artistic development, Rahzé not only cultivates technical proficiency but also fosters a deep understanding of the interconnectedness between music, the body, expressive communication, and global community. Rahzé's students have appeared in concert, opera, and musical theatre productions locally and nationally, including at Baltimore's Center Stage, Hippodrome Theatre, John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts Millennium Stage, the Lyric Baltimore, Joseph Meyerhoff Symphony Hall, M&T Bank Exchange at the France-Merrick Performing Arts Center, and more. Matriculating high school students have been accepted into numerous summer festivals, such as the Berklee College of Music Aspire: Five-Week Music Performance Intensive, Washington National Opera Institute, Maryland Opera Camp, and college/conservatory voice programs at AMDA College of Performing Arts (Los Angeles), the American Musical the Performing Arts and Dramatic Academy (New York) Cal Arts, New York University, and Pace University.

As a member of the Pi Kappa Lamda, Epsilon Omicron Chapter, Rahzé currently holds a Master of Music, Vocal Performance and Pedagogy, a Bachelor of Music in Vocal Performance, and a Minor in Music Theory from the Peabody Conservatory of the Johns Hopkins University where they studied with American baritone William Sharp.
